

"It has become suddonly popular, for the first time in years," writes a business com-mentator, "to take an optimistic view of recovery. It is no longer popular to be a pessi-Here, indeed, we have turned a corner,

Thinking back, it may occur to some of us that we tried that mental corner before, away back in 1930 and 1931. It was popular away back in 1930 and 1931. It was popular, then to dany the reality of the business slump and to fight our fear and gloom with doses of cheerful psychology. Finding after a few brave afforts that that wouldn't atop the deflation, we finally gave up and waited for our doom, or trusted to the economic cycle for run its course. run its course.

to gun its course.

What is the present optimism based on?
Partly on reassuring business indications;
many of the statisticians curves trend upward. Partly, too, we reason out that with ward. Partly, too, we reason out that with the vast deficit of gopda and services needed, the tide must turn and general business ac-tivity be renewed. Purposeful private and public efforts are credited for some of the improvement. But on the whole, it is prob-ably fatalism as much as anything else—a feeling that things must come back, regardless of statistics or politics or psychology this time, at least. And so they come back.

TAXING THE RICH

One of the surprising things about the government, "share the wealth" tax plan, accessondent writes, is that a Washington correspondent writes, is that "there is so little opposition to any phase of it." He is speaking not merely of the at-titude in Congress, but the apparent attitude throughout the country, among business men and even in the stock market. There is no great mystery about the mat-ter. The very rich are a very small minority,

and are not talking very loud just now anyand are not talking very loud just now any.

The depression has tamed most of them and has decimated their ranks. The number of persons in the country with incomes of a million dollars or more in 1929 was five hundred thirteen, and in 1933 had been reduced to forty six. It cannot be much mora than one hundred this year. Moreover, the political and economic power of leaders of finance and ladustry is far less than it was a few years ago; their wings clipped by new a few years ago; their wings clipped by new

legislation as well as their own losses.

They cannot make much trouble for any taxation program, especially one that aims to take more for public use from heirs to great fortunes.

Small business men and small corporations are very willing to have the big fellows assessed more heavily on incomes, because it is to their own advantage. In tentative schedules for the new tax scheme, small business would have its taxes reduced, thus gaining an advantage it has insisted that it failed to get through NRA.

The additional burdens for the rich may not really be very great when they are worked out. Whatever the increase, it is easy to see how public sentiment can be strongly in favor of it. The fellows in the middle brackets, however, will still pay most of the
