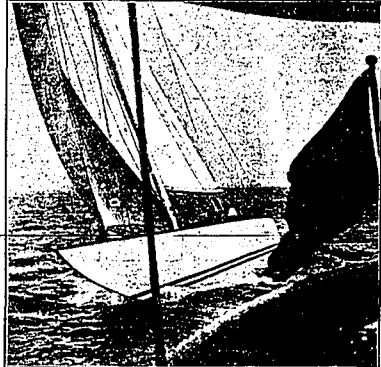

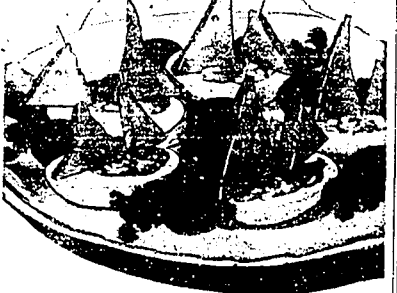

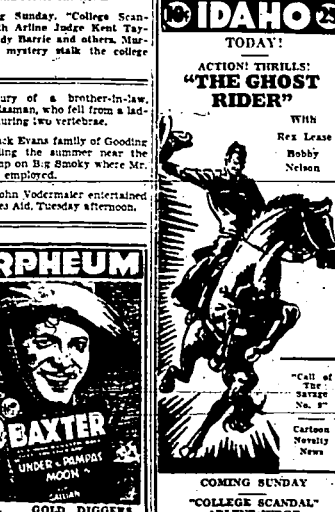
Volcanic Activity In Ocean Kills Millions of Fish
