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19 PERSONS HURT WHEN FAST TRAIN STRIKES WASHOUT

Wall of Water Rips Away Section of Track Ahead of Great Northern Flyer; Heroic Work Saves Lives

(By The Associated Press) BAINVILLE, Mont., July 5.—Hurling down a hillside minutes ahead of the Empire Builder, fast Great Northern westbound coast train, a wall of water fed, by a cloudburst early today ripped away a section of track.

The last block signal a mile down the track had not yet registered the trouble and the 15-car train struck the washout at fifty miles an hour. The locomotive and eight coaches leaped the roadbed. Two day coaches, a combination dining-dormitory car and the baggage car, churned in the muck and rolled over the lands of wheat, field 100 feet from the right of way.

Herolan Saves Lives Young railroad officials set the injured at 10, with only two persons, a tonight and the head brakeman, being seriously hurt. There were 100 passengers on the train. Most of the injured were passengers credited with having saved the lives of several of the train working men. The rescue was guided principally by flashes of lightning, the rescuers carried the victims into the right cars, comprising mainly of Pullman coaches at the car.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Inability to obtain White House guidance on the rates to be imposed under President Roosevelt's wealth-tax program today left House tax-bill drafters assertively puzzled and bewildered.

Prisoner, Victim Of Hoax, Escapes From Road Camp
