

BILLS IN HOPPER TO END TASK OF SPECIAL SESSION

Lawmakers Begin Consideration of Eight Measures After Governor Outlines Reasons for Call

(By The Associated Press) Boise, July 8.—After hearing Governor Ross personally request enactment and amendment of highway laws to permit the state to use hundreds of thousands of dollars in federal funds it cannot now legally expend, the first day of the 23rd legislature's second extraordinary session came to a calm close tonight.

Both houses met shortly after noon today with Speaker Troy Smith (D-Clatsop), and Lieutenant Governor C. P. Mix (D-Latah) presiding in the house and Senate, respectively.

1000-Word Message Both bodies quickly set up virtually the same organizations that functioned during the special and regular sessions earlier this year and then recessed until 3 p. m. after they heard Governor Ross' message at a joint session.

The governor appeared a few minutes later and read his 1000 word statement carefully after prefacing his remarks with the statement: "This message is going to be short. And I hope the session will be short, too."

He reviewed the necessity for now law and for the state to lose \$1,278,000 in federal funds if once they were not enacted.

He urged the passage of a law to place a tax on each unit of automobile caravans to reimburse the state for the use of its highways.

There appeared to be little to indicate tonight that any compromise would break up to keep the lawmakers here from their homes.

### Roosevelt Taxes Would Raise \$118,000,000 to \$91,500,000 Annually

Secretary Morgenthau presented to Congress figures estimating that Roosevelt taxes would raise \$118,000,000 to \$91,500,000 annually. He urged strict earmarking of this amount for reducing borrowing and the public debt.

Restraint of new taxes to increase the high taxation rate indicated corporation levies was the estimated White House attitude.

Editorials from authoritative London newspapers telegraphed here indicated England was withdrawn from opposition to Italy's aims. But editorials in afternoon newspapers here left it to be understood England may still try to help Ethiopia indirectly.

The Glomias d'Italia renewed negotiations that Britain is furnishing Ethiopia with war materials and is mobilizing troops on the Ethiopian border.

# Collective Responsibility

**LONDON, July 8**—A reassertion that the responsibility for preventing an Italo-Ethiopian war is collective and not an individual one was made to the house of commons today by Sir Samuel Hoare, foreign secretary.

Opposition members badgered him for information in a renewal of attacks on Britain's recent offer to Mussolini to avert fighting by giving Ethiopia a port.

Frankly conceding he was unable to say under what conditions Italy is prepared to conclude a settlement with Ethiopia, Hoare also admitted he was unable to make a statement on the government's position until Thursday.

His attitude was interpreted as meaning Britain has almost given up hope that France would step in and help shoulder the League of Nations' responsibilities, although other quarters said England has not regarded war as inevitable.

An indication that the door to British negotiation with Rome has not been closed was the revelation that Sir Eric Drummond, ambassador to Italy, has been in touch with Falvio Stucchi, undersecretary for foreign affairs, there.

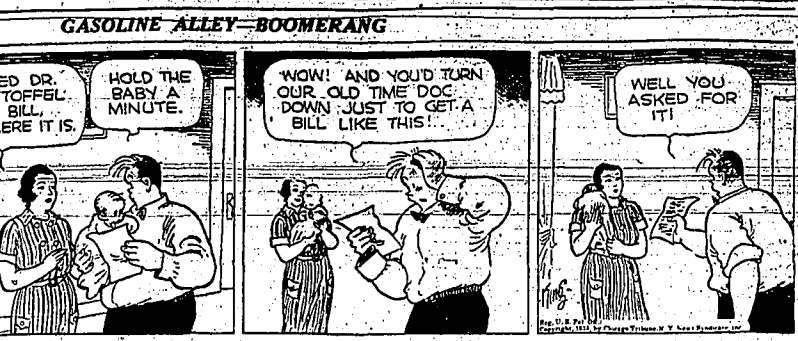

ROBBERY SUSPECT HELD FOR TRIAL

IDAHO HOLSTEIN SETS NEW RECORD FOR STATE

MOCOVO, Idaho, July 8 (AP) - Idaho Walker Notion, purebred Holstein-Friesian cow bred and owned by the University of Idaho, recently completed the year's test for new state records in both milk and butterfat production over Idaho cows of all ages and breeds, living and dead.

ATTORNEYS ARGUE TOLL BRIDGE SUIT

Federal Judge Takes Attack on Company's Defense Under Advisement

BOISE, July 8 (AP) - Judge James Alger of Portland, Ore. here in federal district court today heard attorneys' arguments for and against the Twin Falls-Idaho Intercity Bridge company, as a Washington state corporation, failed to qualify under the constitution and laws of the state to do business as a corporation in the state prior to acquisition of a franchise to collect tolls.

The bridge spans the Snake river which divides Twin Falls and Jerome counties at a point about two miles north of Twin Falls on the main highway from southern Idaho to Hally.

At the time of its construction it was regarded as the highest bridge of its kind in the world.

Strikes at Corporation In moving to strike defendants' affirmative defense, Hackman set forth three principle arguments:

1. That the Twin Falls-Idaho Intercity Bridge company, as a Washington state corporation, failed to qualify under the constitution and laws of the state to do business as a corporation in the state prior to acquisition of a franchise to collect tolls.

2. The bridge company could not qualify under its articles of incorporation, to acquire a franchise to collect tolls or acquire real estate, as a landowner.

3. That the company should have applied for the franchise before the commissioners and not to the county commissioners and petition for permission to construct the toll bridge.

The arguments were taken under advisement.
