Mussolini needs a victory on foreign soil as a means of strengthening his roreign soil as a means of strengthening his internal defenses and improving the national morale and Ethiopia has been selected as the victim. This is the picture which the sit-uation seems to present and there is very little chance of any interference with the

Neither the League of Nations or the Kellogy peace pact seems to offer the slightest obstacle in the way of what will probably amount to the wiping out of a people. European diplomats scurry from capital to capital. Conversations are held and proposals ital. Conversations are nent and proposasic considered and through it all Italy goes steadily on with her plans. From an Italian standpoint there is of course an excuse for the yar but it is a feeble one with its origin in one or two incidents of little real importance. The real cause of the war is merely that Mussolini needs a war.

Today there is not sufficient national intelligence to render possible an effective means of preventing it.

STRANGE REASONING

The President's request to the chairman of the house Ways and Means committee, "I hope your committee will not permit doubts as to constitutionality, however reas-onable, to block the suggested legislation," comes as a rude shock to those who believed a President's inaugural oath to support the Constitution to be something more than an empty gesture.

Previously, in the case of New Deal legis-lation of doubtful constitutionality, it has been possible to believe that the administration thought, perhaps on the advice of Brain-Trusters, that the courts might allow all in-dustry with any indirect connection with interstate-commerce (that-is, all-industry interstate commerce (that is, all industry of any kind) to be taken under federal con-trol. But now that the Supreme Court has ruled otherwise, the administration is de-prived of the plea that in its opinion control of such industry is legal.

If the New Deal is to begin a career frank disregard of the Constitution, its attitude may be compared with that of the man who violates the law because he knows that his case will not come up in court for a long time, and hopes that when it does someone will have changed the law.






