Beet Crop Benefit Payment Announced

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Initial benefit payments on the 1935 sugar beet crop were fixed by the AAA today at the rate of 50 cents a ton, as the farm administration announced final payments on the 1934 crop at 45 cents a ton. Sugar beet growers, the AAA said, received approximately \$11,000,000 from the first payment on the 1934 crop. The total 1935 payment will depend upon prices and acreage of beets for the present crop. The 1934 payments, the AAA said, are based upon the actual production and estimated production at average yields, whichever is higher.

WONDERS FROM JERSEY

Not from the Isle of Capri, but from the Isle of Jersey, come these little cakes, known as "Jersey Wonders." They are the favorite delicacy which the natives proffer the occasional tourist. This is the way you make them: Mix 1 lb. flour, 3 oz. butter and 3 oz. sugar and flavorings of grated nutmeg, ground ginger and grated lemon peel. Beat 4 eggs. Mix with the above ingredients and knead well. Form the paste into a wrist-thick roll. Cut it into circular slices. In each slice, make two little holes. Press the left edge through the right-hand slit. Cook the wonders, three or four at a time, in a pan of deep, boiling lard. Turn with a fork, allowing a minute on each side. Turn out onto wire sieve and allow to cool.

Yellow wax beans have appeared in friendly rivalry to the green, serving beans which have contributed vitamins to the family table for several weeks now. In fact, there's not a vegetable, from celery to tomatoes, that you can't find at this season at your favorite grocer's. Summer's abundant harvest rivals that of autumn for variety.

Vary Your Pies APPLE PIE, apricot pie, berry pie, chocolate pie, cherry pie, lemon pie, peach pie, pumpkin pie, rhubarb pie. Oh, isn't there a new pie particularly appropriate for the summer months which will vary from all these good old standbys? Yes, there is. The apple pie. Pineapple grows in a land where it is perpetual summer and looms large in the tropical diet which is eaten there. No need to tell you that it's delicious, but what we can tell you is the way to make a fine pineapple pie. So, here goes: With Another Tropical Fruit. Pineapple Meringue Pie. 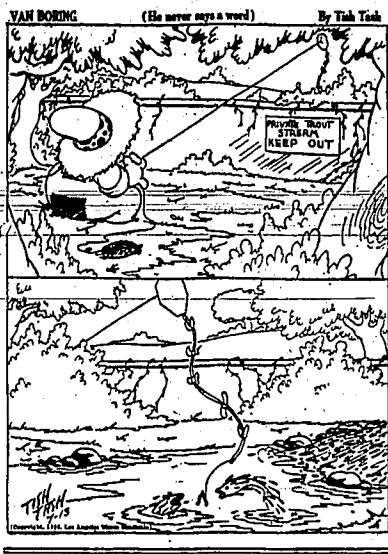

IDAHO BAR HEARS MISSOURI ATTORNEY

Speaker at Halley Convention Urges Change to Curb High Court

HAILEY, Idaho, July 12 (AP)—A change in the constitution to withdraw from the United States supreme court power to declare a law passed by congress unconstitutional by a bare majority vote, was advocated by Charles M. Hay, an attorney of St. Louis, Mo., in an address before the Idaho state bar convention here today.

Mr. Hay, speaking before several score Idaho lawyers and judges, declared the constitution has been changed to meet new conditions and new problems. It must grow yet to insure justice and promote the welfare of the people as a whole, he added. He made a fervent appeal to uphold the constitution, however, and declared one important question now before the country is federal control of business or no control at all.

A recommendation presented by Harry Bennett of Twin Falls requiring all teachers to take an oath to support the national and state constitutions was amended to embrace all state and municipal officers and employees. It was then passed by the convention.

J. L. Eberle of Boise gave a report on lawyers' income. Tonight the delegates gathered at the Hotel Nevada for a banquet. H. B. Thompson of Pocatello was toastmaster.

The convention will continue tomorrow.

HOOPS LOW BIDDER ON HIGHWAY WORK

Contractor Offers to Build Bridges, Surface Road for \$87,500

BOISE, July 12 (AP)—Bids on two highway construction projects which will cost approximately \$110,000 were opened here today by J. H. Stemmer, director of highways.

William Hoops of Twin Falls offered the low bid for construction of a 130-foot concrete bridge across the Twin Falls South Side canal, a 150-foot concrete bridge over the Oregon Short Line Railway and drainage structures and crush gravel surfacing on 5.94 miles of the Old Oregon Trail between Hansen and Murrough in Twin Falls county. His bid was \$87,500.

Other bids were Dan Cavanaugh of Twin Falls, \$86,285; Orl Nelson of Logan, Utah, \$92,437 and \$97,877; Utah Construction company of Ogden, Utah, \$94,221; C. P. Dinmore and company of Boise, \$101,781; Triangle Construction company of Boise, \$104,504; Quinn-Robbins company and H. C. Kalket of Boise, \$110,803.

The engineer's estimate was \$96,851. Bidders on the other job for furnishing of cover coat material in stockpiles for seal coating in Bonner, Boundary, Kootenai and Blaine counties were: Western Construction company of Pocatello, \$14,706 and \$17,574; and Dan J. Cavanaugh of Twin Falls, \$17,250 and \$20,816.

The engineer's estimate was \$18,200 and \$17,540. Where two bids were offered by one company, two types of construction were considered.

PLENTY OF WATER FOR IRRIGATORS

Snake River Valley's Big Projects Promised Ample Supply

BOISE, July 12 (AP)—There will be plenty of water for the large irrigated projects in the Snake river valley this season, Mans H. Coffin, director of water-resources in the state department of reclamation, commented today.

Present figures on storage and flow indicate that withdrawals of stored water for irrigating Snake river valley lands are at their height now, he said.

The withdrawal from Jackson lake which impounds more than 850,000 acre feet, is at the rate of 1400 acre feet daily, and from American Falls, which contained approximately 700,000, the withdrawal is about 16,000 acre feet daily, Coffin reported.

Water rights above Blackfoot were returned Friday to those dating prior to 1917, those dating later than 1917 being omitted.

PRICES OF FARM PRODUCTS ADVANCE Wheat, Beef Cattle, Milk Among Exceptions to Rising Scale

BOISE, July 12 (AP)—Prices urged by Idaho farmers for agricultural products averaged higher than the month previous for 10 items including such principal commodities as hogs, lambs, and wool. Richard C. Ross, federal agricultural statistician for Idaho, reported today.

Twenty-one of the 34 items for which prices are estimated averaged lower than the month previous, he said. The sharpest declines were noted in the case of wheat, beef cattle, milk (both wholesale and retail), all varieties of hay and alfalfa and clover seed. Relative

light declines were reported for such principal commodities as potatoes, beans and butter and buttermilk. Reports indicate that corn, apples and turkeys remained the same as last month.

ROSE SIGNS CARAVAN BILL BOISE, July 12 (AP)—Governor Ross this afternoon signed the motor caravan bill passed by the special session of the 23rd legislature this week. The law became operative immediately.

It imposes a tax of 14 cents on each automobile in all motor caravans which come into Idaho.

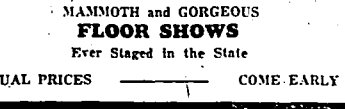

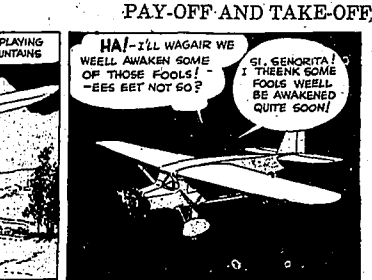
