## UTAH RE-ENACTS HISTORIC EVENTS

### Pageants and Visiting War Planes Enliven Birthday Celebration

SALT LAKE CITY, July 22.—Utah today looked backward 88 years to the summer in 1847, when the first of the Mormon pioneers first saw the great Salt Lake valley. She looked forward, likewise to the future day when an "enemy's" air fleet might menace the western United States.

While the state's birthday was being celebrated here and at Ogden with rodeos, parades and speeches commemorating the achievements of the pioneers, giant bombers and speedy pursuit planes of the army air corps gathered at the Salt Lake airport for two days of maneuvering over the mountains and valleys of Utah and nearby states.

Bombers Arrive — Preceded by Brigadier General H. H. Arnold, bombers of the seventh bombardment group from Hamilton field, San Francisco, and the 19th bombardment group from Rockwell field, San Diego, and pursuit planes of the 17th attack group from March field, Riverside, California, 75 in all, arrived here yesterday afternoon after last flights from their home bases.

The planes, comprising the first wing of the army air corps, tomorrow will divide into three groups for reconnaissance flights into as many states. Forty-five pursuit ships of the 17th attack group will fly to Boise, Idaho, and return here; the seventh bombardment group will fly to Cheyenne, Wyoming, and return, and the 19th bombardment group to Reno, Nevada, and return.

First Pioneers Honored — The arrival of the first band of pioneers was reenacted today when a party of covered wagons, bearing two of those who reached the great Salt Lake valley the year afterward, emerged from Emigration canyon and circled about a monument that marks the spot where they first sighted their future home.
