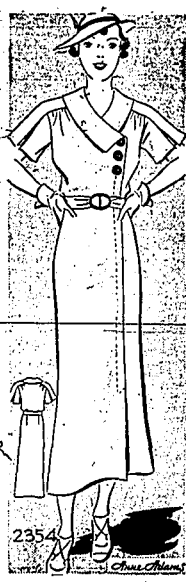

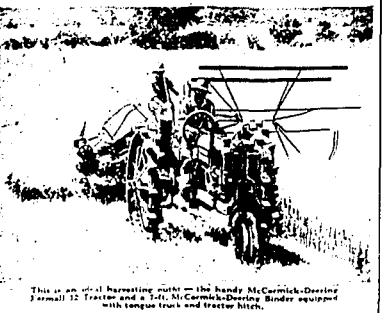

MAGICIANS PUZZLED BY MYSTERIOUS RAY

Celluloid Ball Floats Free in Air Under Influence of New 'Power'

'HOLLYWOOD' Chief, July 27 (AP)—A 'phantom ray' which appears to make things float unsupported in the air, caused Pacific coast magicians coming here to sit up and take notice.

The 'phantom ray,' described as a modification of Nicola Tesla's famed 'death ray,' was introduced by its inventor, James Stoppard of Portland, Ore.

Stoppard, accountant by trade, blended science with his hobby of magic. He put some electric gadgets—called 'gimmicks' by the profession—into two cabinets and proceeded to start the assembled prestidigitators.

Room Darkened

The room was darkened. Switches snapped shut. Blue sparks flew. Four feet from the projector, which resembles a short-barreled glass gun, Stoppard let loose of a white celluloid ball six inches in diameter. It floated free in mid-air, oscillating gently as though hovering over an air jet.

Stoppard asked a pair of glasses over, under, before and behind the ball. There was nothing holding it. The ray came from a Tesla coil, creating a path of ionized air which supports a light spherical object," explained the inventor.

Five hundred magicians, interested today in this amazing power, covered the room could not untangle a string of rope from which L. O. Gunn suspended a lead down, after twirling from a straight-jacket three fingers above the stage.

Gunn twirled on a rope and for 15 minutes, his own face glowing purple, while he helped try to wrangle the strands so it would pass through the pulleys. Then someone thought to rotate Gunn the opposite way. The rope unknotted and he was lowered to the pavement.

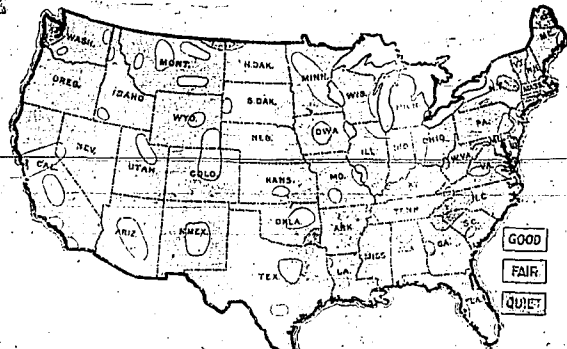

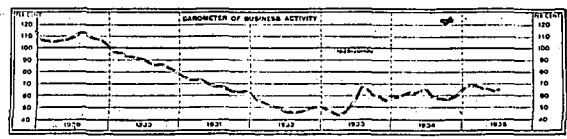

U. S. Chamber of Commerce Business Map



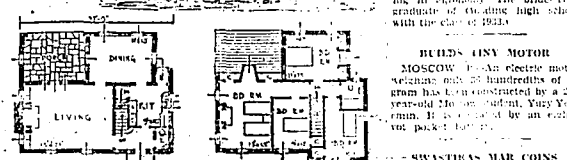
This map represents business conditions in every state of the Union as shown in August, 1935, issue of "Nation's Business," official publication of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

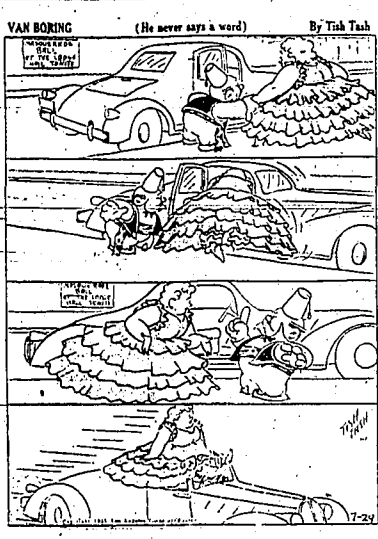

Same Mate Likely To Be Selected In New Choice

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., July 27 (AP)—If you had to do over again, the chances are 99 to 1 you would marry the same man or woman. If you now are happily married, says Dr. Lewis M. Terman and Dr. Paul Bultenweiser of the Stanford university faculty.

Their conclusion is reported in the current issue of the Journal of Social Psychology.

Dr. Terman and Bultenweiser, respectively head and technical assistant in the university's psychology department, put the marital affairs of 300 couples under the microscope by means of questionnaires.

The 300 couples were selected from happily married, less happily married and divorced groups, most of them live near here.

Important discoveries were made. An extremely small factor in marital happiness and that there is no great difference in the number of children in happy and less happy families.

The professor asked:

"Would you marry the same person?"

Among husbands in the happy group, 99 declared they would. The other said he would not marry at all. Of the wives, 99 said they would, too, but the other said she would marry a different man.

Less happy husbands and wives told on the question, 57 each say they would marry the same person. Twenty-seven husbands and 26 wives said they would marry someone else, while 15 husbands and 21 wives said they would not marry at all.

On the matter of settling domestic arguments, 92 husbands and 87 wives reported adjudicating rows by "mutual give and take." In the less happy group, 69 husbands and 74 wives gave the same answer.

Principal reasons for domestic disputes in the order named, were given as disagreements of affection, friends, intimate relations, including mother-in-law, table manners, finances.

OMAHA, Neb., July 27.—(By Mrs. Wilma Jaeger, 54, of Columbus, mother of two children, today was slowly turning to stone in the University of Nebraska hospital here as attending physicians admitted they were practically powerless to help here.

She is suffering from a hardening of the muscles, caused by too much calcium in the tissues, Dr. Francis Bass, superintendent of the hospital, explained.

Although she suffers from sun pain, the rare disease has affected her mouth and jaw muscles and she is unable to eat or drink much. Her body is completely rigid from her neck down, forcing her to lie flat on her back.

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VICTORY IN LIQUOR DECISION DISPUTED

Attorney General and Commission Both Claim Result Favorable

HOISE, July 27 (AP)—Opinions were still divided today between the Idaho state liquor commission and the attorney general over a decision which was declared in Pocatello here by District Judge J. H. Downing declared the Idaho liquor law constitutional.

The liquor commission, defendant in the case instigated by Attorney General Bert H. Miller, was holding to its blanket opinion of yesterday when it declared a victory. Likewise, the plaintiff held that the decision of Judge Downing gave it everything it wanted.

The liquor commissioners declined to comment further upon the decision, saying that "it is all over now and we're satisfied."

Attorney General's Version

Attorney General Miller, however, ribbed somewhat upon his original statement and said that "if the decision is rendered in favor of the law, the general effect of the decision may be said to be this: the effect would be to strip the right of the liquor control commission, before its construction by the courts, to refuse to issue a license to the applicant, and to strip of its finery and its absolute right of any personal rights which are reduced to a running race which must conform to the traffic laws fixed by the constitutional rights of the private citizen."

"As viewed by the attorney general, this case is one of the most successful and progressive steps taken in this administration, and conforms to the trend of enlightened opinion that laws which are enacted and costly to the state and people, should be eliminated by which use of the declaratory judgment act has been made in this case, to anticipate the questions certain to arise and formulate a definite standard of private rights, for guidance of the courts in the future, and the executive officers of the state, in the performance of their duties."

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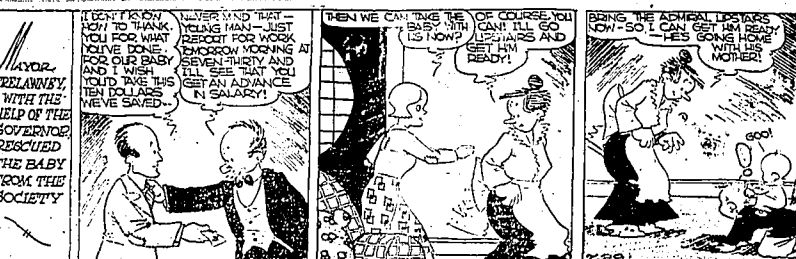

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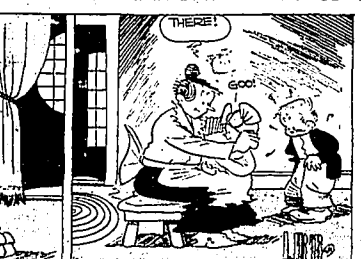
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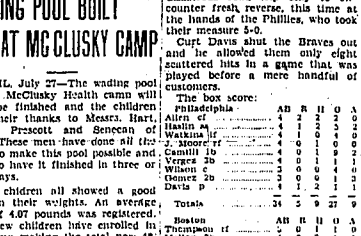
