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HOPE OF FINDING HIGH-SPEED ARMY PLANE ABANDONED

Searchers Believe Oil Spots on Ocean Mark Graveyard of New Ship Piloted by Lieutenant Arthur Skær

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, July 31.—Army-circles tonight virtually abandoned hope of finding a missing super-speed pursuit plane after two searchers agreed oil "slicks" on the nearby ocean probably marked where the ship and its pilot plunged into the water.

The plane, built by the Northrup corporation and capable of a top speed of 325 miles an hour, was taken up on a test flight yesterday afternoon by Lieutenant Arthur H. Skær Jr.

Lieutenants Fred Phillips and W. Alford Spencer, members of a wide spread aerial search directed by Lieutenant William Van Dusen, agreed that the oil, sighted less than a mile from the Vincent Island house, probably marked the plane's graveyard.

Coast guard craft which searched the area reported the oil spots were clean and not like the discharge of a ship's bilge.

Not a "Mystery" Plane Army officers said specifications for the plane had been widely advertised by the war department, with every aircraft construction company invited to compete in bidding for its construction.

The oil spots were all that could be found by more than a dozen army planes under Major William A. Frye that cruised-uncertainly over the Palom Verdes hills and along the coast of the Vincent Islands.

One spot was described as 30 feet in diameter, and the other as about 15 feet. They were composed of clean oil.

Designed for High Speed The plane that Lieutenant Skær took aloft yesterday at 2 p. m. on a scheduled test flight of only a few hours represented a startling advance in military aircraft, it was designed to fly at 325 miles an hour for 200 miles.

Lieutenant Van Dusen said that because of the heavy fog yesterday morning it was not possible to have plummeted into the ocean unaided.

POLICE OF BERLIN TAKE PRECAUTIONS AGAINST DISORDERS

Foreign Observers Believe Nazi Germany's Economic Crisis Behind Many-Sided Attack Upon 'Enemies'

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, July 31.—(AP)—Extraordinary police precaution against possible trouble were instituted in Berlin tonight shortly after impartial foreign observers declared Nazi Germany's economic crisis lay behind the reich's vigorous, many-sided offensives against "state enemies."

Count von Helldorf, Berlin's new police president, instructed his men to hold themselves ready for eventualities in the event that the capital outwardly was normal.

Earlier usually reliable sources said they understood stout troops and members of the party's "political organization" also had been ordered to the scene.

TAX ON WHEAT ASSAILED IN IDAHO

Federal Court Grants Temporary Injunction to Milling Firms

BOISE, July 31.—The constitutionality of the processing tax imposed upon wheat processors under provisions of the federal agricultural adjustment act will be tested in the United States district court for Idaho here August 2.

This became a certainty when Judge C. C. Cavanaugh here late today granted a temporary injunction sought by two Idaho cities, Idaho processors to restrain John Wiley, internal revenue collector for Idaho, from collecting the tax from them. Among other things the plaintiffs charged that Congress in passing the tax measure clothed the executive branch of the government with legislative powers and that the tax is too severe.

The plaintiffs are the Jones Brothers Elevator and Milling company, operated by Jedd Jones, Jr. and Lawrence D. Jones, and the Crowthers Brothers Milling company, Inc. both of Malad City. Mr. Wiley and John A. Carver, federal district attorney for Idaho, are named as defendants.

30 Cents A Bushel

Under provisions of the tax a charge of 30 cents a bushel is imposed upon processors by the federal government for each bushel of wheat processed.

The tax is collected monthly by the collector of internal revenue, who in turn forwards it to the United States treasury.

It is later distributed among wheat growers who sign contracts to reduce their acreage in wheat. Judge Cavanaugh will hear arguments in the case upon his return from the Pacific coast to where he will go tomorrow for a vacation.

At that time he will determine whether the injunction will be made permanent, or shall be vacated.

The temporary restraining order prevents the internal revenue collector from attempting to collect the tax from the two plaintiffs. It does not apply to other processors similarly situated.

Similar suits have been instituted in other federal district courts recently, but the question brought up here today has not yet been acted upon by any higher federal tribunal in so far as he has been informed, Judge Cavanaugh said.

The race will begin at Los Angeles, with planes handicapped so as to reach Cleveland on the opening day of the races.

Of the 357, 153 have been built or are being built in Boise, Cayser said.

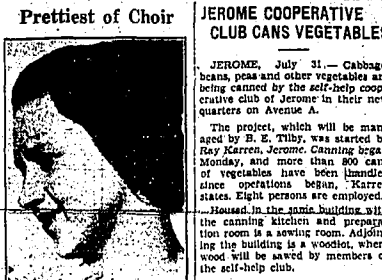

MOTORISTS CRASH CRUST DRIVING IN SALT LAKE BED

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, July 31.—Belief the dry bed of Great Salt Lake could be safely crossed by automobile resulted in a family of four being stranded for 18 hours, exposed to the burning heat of the day and the chilling cold of the night.

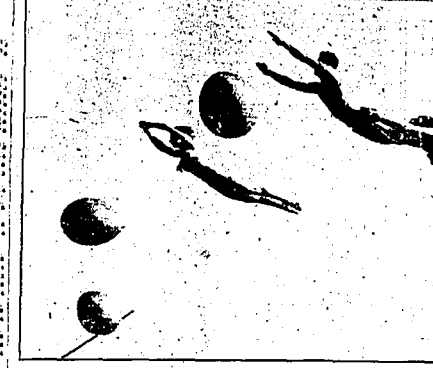
