

EDUCATION BOARD TALKS REFUNDING

Interest Bill on \$450,000 Bonded Debt Claims Attention

MOSCOW, Idaho, Aug. 1 (AP)—Refunding of bonded indebtedness on buildings, most of them dormitories, at various educational institutions of Idaho was discussed today at the concluding session of the state board of education.

The total debt which the board hopes to refinance is \$450,000. State Superintendent John W. Condie reported. It consists of bonds now outstanding at 6 to 8 per cent interest. Memorial gymnasium at the university here is one of the buildings, Condie said, adding that this institution has done very well in handling its principal and interest payments.

Some others, however, have found the burden too great and a lower interest rate will be sought. A bonding institution will report on the possibilities at the board's next meeting, September 15.

Salary Schedules Discussed

New salary schedules for teaching staffs, as voted by the legislature, were discussed and all institutions were directed to submit tentative schedules under the legislation.

The board set September 15 for the first meeting of the state teachers' association. The state superintendent will submit a detailed plan on the technical process for selection of reading texts.

FARLEY LASHES AT ROOSEVELT CRITICS

Postmaster General Declares Cost of Government Greatly Reduced

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1 (AP)—President Farley today told a Democratic luncheon group that routine government expenditures now are "thousands of millions of dollars per year" less than they were when President Roosevelt came to the White House. Farley, who lashed out sure at critics of the administration, spoke to the Democratic county committee of San Francisco, which honored the occasion's executive at a luncheon.

"The only extravagance that can be used by the government," the administration," he said, "is the money it has expended in feeding the hungry, giving work to the jobless, and changing the business balance of our ledgers from red to black."

Tax Payments Increased

"For example, the amount paid in income taxes last year was \$200,000,000 more than the year before."

"Take the amount of income tax you have paid and figure what it would be today and you will find that it has increased by \$200,000,000 more than the year before. This is the year when the government has done for business."

"Farley, who will sail in a few days for Hawaii, pointed to the two huge bridges now under construction across San Francisco bay as tangible evidence of the success of the program and added he was informed California's cash sales over last year are up \$65,000,000 over last year."

"Franklin's Requirement"

"Strong D. Roosevelt, when he came to the White House, felt that he was charged with leading this nation out of the depression," said the national Democratic chairman said. "For three years the country has made the greatest recovery... I will not say that no effort was made during this period to fight the depression, but nothing was tried except the puny expedients that have served to check minor economic diseases... It required strong measures to get us out of the depression. I do not urge that in the administration of these measures there may not have been mistakes and errors, but they were a great purpose and the result of these measures is the difference between the country's condition today and what it was on March 4, 1933."

Lindy's Boyhood Home Advised to Adopt New Name

LITTLE FALLS, Minn., Aug. 1 (AP)—The little Falls, George Steffy, Yakima, Wash., pointed to the appropriate name for the boyhood home of such a distinguished flyer as Colonel Charles Lindbergh.

Good flyers, Steffy says, don't fly but they do have happy landings. Why not make that the name of the Little Falls?

"Since you have contributed to the nation and the world such a distinguished son," Steffy wrote A. Stone, secretary of the Little Falls chamber of commerce, "and since this is hardly common to the behavior of a good airman and father, since everything else (just about) is being changed or attempted to be changed, may I suggest that possibly the name of Happy Landings, Minn., as a new name for your magnificent town?"

"I'm really serious, Happy Landings! The name in itself implies air-mindedness and that name, I'll bet you, would be inseparably linked with the famous colonel and go down in history together. Colonel Lindbergh—Happy Landings!"

Stone doesn't see just how the change could be made now.

Tenants On Probation In Novel Social Experiment

EL MONTE, Calif., Aug. 1 (AP)—In one of the federal government's social experiments, painters and carpenters are putting finishing touches on 100 one-acre homesteads here amidst the walnut groves of San Gabriel valley.

Within a few weeks there are one, two, three and four-bedroom houses with their vegetable and fruit gardens. The government is providing the materials of the industrial and low-salaried "white collar" classes. The homesteads are within easy reach of jobs in Los Angeles, Pasadena, Alhambra and citrus close by, but the families are expected to make most of their living from the good earth and children with which each place is to be stocked.

What Payroll Requirements

The families will be probationary tenants for one year on these miniature farms. After that, if they have fulfilled various requirements, they will be permitted to purchase their homes and land for \$2700 to \$3000, depending on the number of bedrooms.

There will be no down payment, and monthly payments of around \$10 will be spread over as long as 30 years.

It is one of the government's subsistence homestead projects, conceived as a means of affording low-salaried breadwinners a better living for their families than is available in factory districts. Tenants will be required to work on their own homesteads and correct any rent delinquencies.

The families already have been chosen. Income of most of them ranges from \$50 to \$75 a month. Managers of the project estimate each homestead can produce virtually all the farm products necessary for ordinary family life, plus surplus with this soil and climate, only about three hours work daily by one man would be necessary, it is estimated.

As an example of what can be done, one experimental acre garden has already been brought to production. It has 29 kinds of vegetables ready to eat, nine kinds of berry bushes in bearing, flowers galore and 25 young fruit trees set out. Many of the products will be available for canning for off-season use.

Each House Different

In building the houses, the workers' type "contingent" effect was strictly avoided. Although only 100 types of plans were used for the 100 houses, each differs somewhat from the others. These differences were achieved largely through siding, color schemes and hangings of the house furnishings.

PRESIDENT VOICES HOPE FOR PEACE

Terse Statement Points to Government's Ideals

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—President Roosevelt today voiced America's hope for maintenance of peace between Italy and Ethiopia.

He employed just 50 words in a public appeal timed to coincide with friendly efforts of the League of Nations to settle the war-tainted dispute. Without departing from a neutral position in the controversy, Mr. Roosevelt said:

"At this moment, when the council of the League of Nations is assembled to consider ways for composing by pacific means the differences that have arisen between Italy and Ethiopia, I wish to voice the hope of the people and the government of the United States that an amicable solution will be found and that peace will be maintained."

While merely a statement of this government's ideals and not communicated officially to any other government, the president's move was regarded as adding prestige to the league's peace efforts at Geneva.

DAY IN WASHINGTON

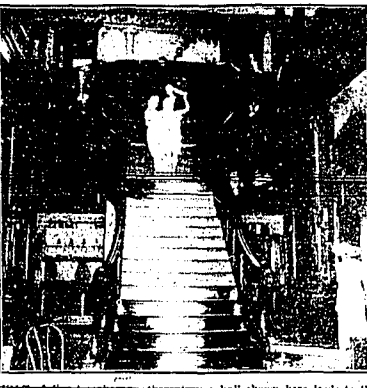

LAW MAKERS ADD TO AAA LITIGATION

Justice Department Starts Drive to Block Tax Recoveries

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Congress apparently was determined tonight to pass the new farm-proceeding taxes to recovery suits in the courts.

Senate and house conferees on the AAA amendments reached a tentative agreement—expected to become final before the senate is to retain senate provisions permitting processors to sue for repayment of processing taxes provided they can show the levies were not passed back to the grower or onward to the consumer.

But while the hours lawmakers have key to the service the last question, the senators agreed to permit restoration of house language authorizing use of 30 per cent of custom receipts to help finance the export of surplus farm commodities.

The set-back to administration requests for an absolute ban on tax suits coincided with a justice department campaign to make such recoveries difficult.

Attorney General Cummings said at his press conference that more attorneys might be hired to help handle the mass of AAA litigation.

"The unusual volume and character of these cases has thrown a heavy burden on the tax division," Cummings said. "We may have to put on more men in the tax division, if we can find men suitably trained."

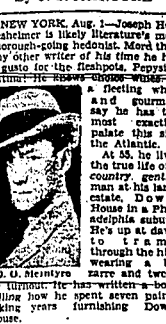

J. Stemmer, director of highways, said tonight, when informed of the request, that federal regulations require us to have an 80-foot right of way. Twin Falls county residents will be absolutely impossible to widen the present highway.

Explains Situation "The situation," he explained, "is this: The road originally was built on a 50-foot right of way. Now those farmers down there, whenever a fence post rots out, put a new post on the road side of the fence, thus cutting down our right of way so that by the time a few more fence posts rot out a bicycle will have trouble getting through."

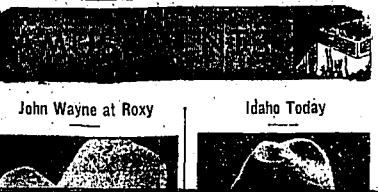
NEW SYSTEM ADOPTED FOR TELEPHONE BILLS

A new and improved method of issuing telephone bills will be introduced in Twin Falls in the near future, according to an announcement made today by M. E. Dolling, manager of the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company here.

Under the present practice, of issuing bills all statements for the territory served by the Mountain States company are issued on the first of each month. A distribution of billing will now be made so that bills will be issued throughout the month in six equal groups. Each subscriber will receive but one bill a month after the new plan is effective, but mailing will be made on a different date than formerly.

There will be no change in the regular August 1 bill but the next statement received by subscribers will introduce the new arrangement. The adoption of the plan, known as rotation billing, will enable us to provide better service to our customers," Mr. Dolling explained. For example, under the present practice, with all bills issued on the first of the month, charges for long distance calls are included only up to the 21st of the preceding month. The new plan will permit the inclusion of all charges and credits up to the date of the bill. The appearance of the bill itself will also be improved.

The change to the new plan in Twin Falls will be made September 16 and in the future all local telephone bills will be dated the 16th of each month. No bill will be issued

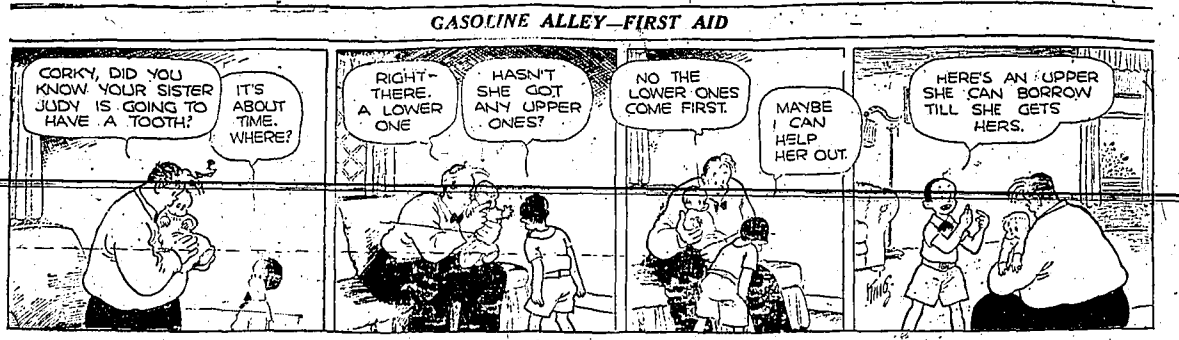
