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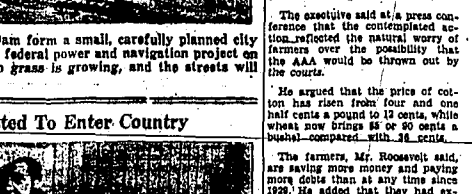
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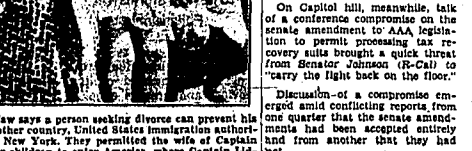

WATERMELON PICKLES
Select a watermelon with a thick rind. Peel and remove the red part, leaving on the white rind. Cut in strips and cover with brine, using 1 cup salt to

1 quart water. Let stand overnight. Drain and boil in clear water until the rind is tender but not soft.
For four pounds of rind (after peeling) boil together
1 quart vinegar,
1/2 cup pickle spices tied in a cheesecloth bag, 301 five minute. Add the rind and boil until clear. Let rind stand in syrup overnight. Remove rind and reheat syrup. Pour over rind and salt. Let stand overnight. Repeat process three times. Heat thoroughly and pack in clean hot jars. Seal immediately.

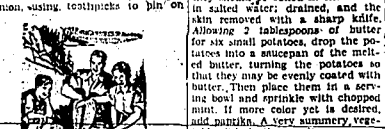

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BREAKING EGGS FOR BREAKFAST

HAS it ever occurred to you that the French word *omelette* is a combination of the words "jeune" — to fast — and "de" — which means as "de jeun" — so, whether you "breakfast" or "unfast" you're doing pretty much the same thing — breaking an omelet is quite a different thing from a puff omelet, although you have to break eggs to make it. Here's the method for making French Omelets: Beat four eggs slightly, just enough to mix the yolk and white. Add one-half teaspoon salt, a few grains pepper and four tablespoons milk, water or cream. Put a small amount of butter in a hot skillet and shake around it until well greased on bottom and sides. Pour in the egg mixture, spread cream, constantly stirring the cooked portion at the sides with a knife or spatula to allow the uncooked mixture to run out and cook. When creamy all through, roll or fold over like a half-moon and serve at once.

Another Way
And here's the way to make a puff omelet with exactly the same ingredients: Beat four egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add one-half teaspoon salt, a few grains pepper and four tablespoons cream, adding two tablespoons grated cheese just before pouring into skillet. Cut the all-grease apparatus from a 10 1/2-inch can in half-inch pieces, heat drain off any liquid, add one tablespoon butter, one teaspoon chopped parsley, and one teaspoon chopped onion and reheat. Spread over omelet just before folding. Serves four liberally.

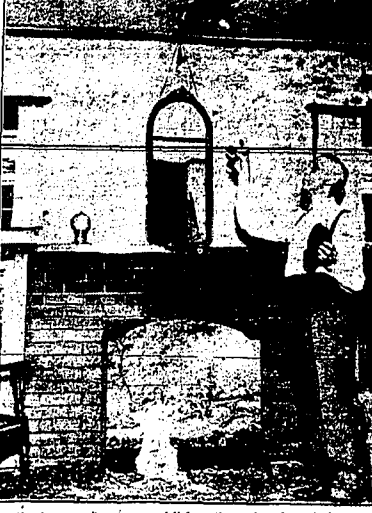

In The News

Bi-colors are used throughout in the latest issue from Guatemala, which commemorates the 100th anniversary of the birth of General Justo Rufino Barrios, former president of the republic in 1873. The stamps are issued for airmail and postage, and to continue on sale only a month.

The general's portrait is incorporated in quite a few of the designs, including all of the airmails, while the 2-centavo carries a reproduction of the legislative decree authorizing the stamps.

Ceylon has added a one-rupee brown and ultramarine to its current pictorial series. The stamp shows a view of Tricomalee, a seaport and naval station in northern Ceylon.

Two new stamps from Portugal are a 4-centavo black and 5-centavo blue, showing the ruins of a historical building.

The Cook Islands one-pence of the 1932 series now appears on paper watermarked "NE and star." When the stamps were first printed in 1932, the paper was unwatermarked. Later, when watermarked paper was used in 1933 for a change in colors for three values (1, 2s and 4-centavo), the one-pence was not included.

The United States duck, or migratory bird, stamps now obtainable without the necessity of having a hunting license or applying for one, according to philatelic quarters. Current 1s, 1 and 6-pence stamps of Great Britain overprinted "Official" were not put into use and have been returned to the storage department, apparently for destruction.

SOVIET POLAR PLANE TAKES OFF FOR U. S.

(Continued From Page One)

exception of Japanese and German, went out to the airport to see the flight of the dramatic flight.

The long narrow wings of the plane glided in the early morning rain as the aircraft climbed aloft. The crowd waved as the 550 horsepower motor roared and the ship moved across the ground.

The plane has a closed cabin and retractable landing gear. It is equipped with a three-bladed propeller. The fuselage is gray with black stripes. The plane is marked on the bottom and top of the wings with the letters "UR-200-23."

Prepared for Polar Regions

It is entirely of Soviet construction. Inside the fuselage the fliers had stored away emergency equipment designed to provide them with food and protection from Arctic cold for a period of months in the event they are forced down in the polar region.

The route the fliers will follow carries them through an Arctic zone of almost continuous daylight.

They will cross the sparsely inhabited Kola peninsula, heading out over Baranc sea approximately 150 miles east of Murmansk. The plane will fly slightly west of the fortieth meridian.

The last land sighted by the fliers before they head out over the frozen waters of the North will be Victoria Island near Franz Josef Land.

From there the Soviet airmen will fly over 1616 miles of sea and ice to Prince Patrick Island off the Canadian coast.

The airmen will fly slightly west of the 120th meridian, their route taking them over Banks Land, Great Bear lake, Fort Simpson, the Rockies and the Cascade range. From Vancouver they will follow regular air-lanes to San Francisco.

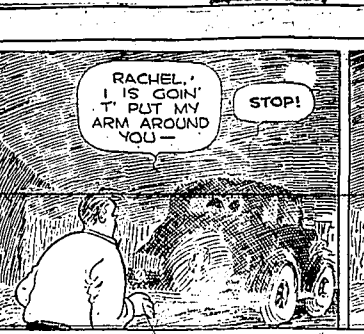

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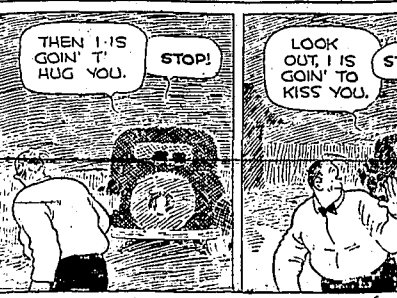
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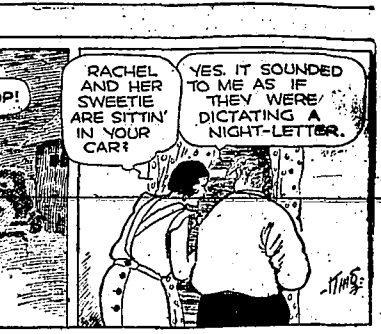
