Now it is time for our naval experts to slt up nights and our jingoes to get excited, as Japan's did recently when our fleet was playing around in the Pacific. The Japanese navy is holding its annual grand maneuvers. The games will continue for two months

or more, and the final phase, as the admirals call it, which doubtless involves the heavy strategy and big shooting, will be carried out in September in "the Northwest Pacific between Japan proper and the Kurile

"What is fundamentally wrong," says "What is fundamentally wrong," says Mr. Ludlow, "is the theory on which these houses are designed, which comes from supposing that people act according to reason, while the fact is that reason just brings us the facts and sentiment makes the decision. And the everlasting sentiment about the house we are going to live in is that it must be "homelike"."

Flat foors, which characterize nearly all these ultra-modern houses, may be scientific and may keep out the weather and may save money. But gable roofs, with their ancient traditions, are built into most people's notions of home. They suggest coiness and safety, and are always capable of being made beautiful with a little artistic treatment. The Georgian type of house has long been popular with a flat roof, but in it the flatness has been redeemed by an attractive


