

LEGAL RESPONSIBILITY

No event for years has attracted so much attention to the legal profession and produced so much constructive comment about it as the recent convention at Los Angeles. Leaders of the bar at that gathering took up big problems of their profession in a broad and fearless way, examining current legal practices, pointing out weaknesses and failures and urging higher ethics and larger public responsibility.

Dean Pound of the Harvard Law School

explained the deterioration of criminal courts by the preference shown by superior students and lawyers for commercial or business practice. School courses in commercial and corporation law usually have the ablest professors, and the most intelligent and best educated lawyers are likely to specialize in this field.

It must be admitted, however, that the tice have not always been superior chically to the "criminal lawyers." As a rather con-servatice newspaper observes:

"The history of many a receivership in recent times, the organization of unaubstantial companies, the stretching out of utility rate litigation over unconscionable periods of time, suggest as law a conception of ethics and as low a standard in the putsuit of justice as the criminal bar is likely to produce. Sometimes there is not a great deal to choose between civil and criminal trespassers on the rights of others, nor between their apologists in the law."

Another unfortunate thing is the frequent weakness of legal talent engaged in public service, compared with the able and highly trained practitioners of "corporation inw".

Surely there can be no more honorable calling than the service of city, state and na-tional government in shaping legislation and representing the public in court. Both for its own honor and for public welfare, the legal profession needs representation in this field by lawyers of the best and ablest type, placing fine public service ahead of political ambition and money-making.

CRUELTY TO LOBBYISTS

That lobby Investigating committee is said to have adopted a technique familiar in courts, but not customary in Congress. Witnesses are admitted and questioned one at a time. A witness thus has no means of knowing what previous witnesses have said. knowing what previous witnesses have said. When testimony conflicts, the first witness is recalled and asked how about it. Then if necessary the second witness is harded up again for cross-camination.

It is a severe ordeal for witnesses, what-

ever cause they may represent. But it is the way to get at the truth, and the whole truth is wanted in any matter involving public relations and national welfare. The "right of petition" Is sacred, and must always remain so. But the petitioner, whatever his cause, should come with clean hands if not a reasonably pure heart. Otherwise the right of petition itself is endangered. The first prin-ciple of-direct appeal to the sources of governmental power is that the identity and rood faith of the appellant should be clear.

CONQUERING ITALY

The American traveler and author, Richard Haliburton, who likes to go to inaccessible places and do impossible things, thought he had a brilliant idea when he undertook to "conquer Italy" on an elephant, as the Carthaginian general Hannibal did shortly

before the Christian era, And it was a noble undertaking for these degenerate times, even though Haliburton didn't have Hanni-bal's engineering difficulties. Hannibal-had to make his-own-roads over the Alns, and out through cliffs by building fires on the solid rock and then crumbling it with yinegar, which was a slow and expensive

process.
The conquering invader this time had his difficulties, just the same, when he reached the horder. Halv was defended, in true modern form, by relentless customs collec-tors. They insisted on General Haliburton paying 50 per cent of the elephant's value paying 59 per cent of the elephant's value to get him in, and the invader had to countermarch to Lucerno to raise the money. Then there were still sanitary complications. The Italian, government had to be assured that the conqueror's mount was a healthy clean.




