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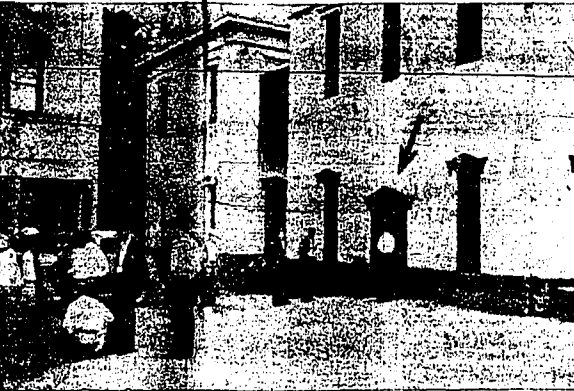

PRESIDENT DIRECTS SPENDING ON FAR WESTERN PROJECTS

Resettlement Administration and Bureau of Reclamation to Retire and Recover Agricultural Areas

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 President Roosevelt today directed federal agencies to spend \$22,000,000 to recover lands now lying idle and \$18,350,000 to retire lands now under cultivation.

The White House placed this \$40,350,000 at the disposal of the resettlement administration and the bureau of reclamation to begin the purchase of 1,000,000 acres of worn-out farm areas and the later authorization to start a series of projects designed to put 100,000 acres into cultivation within one or two years.

The program in line with the policy to buy and take 10 acres of land out of production for each acre put into use through reclamation and irrigation projects.

The resettlement administration is making the purchase of all over the country. The projects approved for the reclamation bureau to begin work on all in the Far West.

Projects in Idaho They include \$10,000,000 for the construction of canals to irrigate 30,000 acres of land in Oregon; \$10,000,000 for the continuation of the All-American canal to carry the water of the Colorado river to the valleys in California; \$1,800,000 for the completion of irrigation works on Ontario Oregon; \$100,000 for the finishing of the Pine View Oregon river dam seven miles north of Ogeho, Idaho; \$200,000 for a survey for the construction of the utilization of the upper waters of the Colorado; \$600,000 to repair the Arrowrock dam in Idaho and to complete the sub-surface drainage around Boise.

The All-American canal was authorized by congress in the fiscal year 1911. It is to displace the present intake canal of the Imperial valley in California and to carry water to the irrigated section of the valley.

Death Ends Career OF FRANK H. HITCOCK

ONE TIME POSTAL CHIEF SUMMONED

Frank H. Hitchcock, Cabinet Member in Taft Administration, Dies

TUCSON, Ariz., Aug. 5 (AP)—Frank Harris Hitchcock, former United States postmaster general and chairman of the Republican national committee, died at a sanitarium here today.

The fatal illness was attributed by Hitchcock's physicians to his efforts to resume editorial work on the Tucson Daily Citizen, of which he was publisher, despite failing health.

Known as "General" because of his service in the cabinet of President Taft from 1909 to 1913, Hitchcock was prominent in Republican circles, serving in 1908 as chairman of the Republican national committee and acting as manager of Taft's presidential campaign in 1908.

In a long period of public service, Frank Harris Hitchcock performed his outstanding work as postmaster general in the cabinet of President Taft.

His efficient conduct of the postal department resulted in the annual savings of \$1,000,000 plus at the end of the fiscal year in 1911. Also established the postal savings bank and the parcel post and started the airmail.

INCREASE IN BEET QUOTAS OPPOSED

Western Growers and Processors Endorse AAA Regulation

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 8. (AP)—Western sugar beet processors and growers, at a national convention here, endorsed by the agricultural adjustment administration here, today stood practically solid for the increase of the present AAA sugar beet marketing agreements.

Their opposed requests for more liberal crop quotas in 1935 from beetmen representing the industry in Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana and Ohio.

"Eighty-five per cent of the production in the western states," said Charles M. Kearney of Merrill, Neb., president of the United States Beet Growers association, "so why should we disarrange a program which has been the salvation of the sugar industry in the continental United States?"

The hearing here, which will continue through Wednesday, is being conducted by John E. Dillon, chief of the AAA sugar section, and Elmer Hayes, AAA marketing specialist.

Applications for marketing allotment adjustments will be heard from several beet sugar companies, including the Antigonish Beet Sugar company of Ogden, Utah; St. Louis Sugar Co., of St. Louis, Mo.; and the Great Lakes Sugar company of Detroit, Mich.

Processors and growers from California to Ohio are present at the meeting.

GREECE PUTS DOWN SHORT-LIVED REVOLT

adherents of whom were blamed in some government quarters for today's trouble.
However, labor circles blamed the revolt on the unrequited demands of the strikers.
The trouble, arising from a passive strike Sunday, flared this morning in front of the prefecture at Candia (also known as Iraklion) where the strikers gathered to shout their demands for increased wages and shorter hours.

Battles in Streets
Sharp fighting followed their defiance of orders to disband. Gunshots, shouts and raised rifles and revolvers seized and pitched battles began in the streets.
General Bakopoulas warned the strikers his men would fire unless they withdrew from the streets and when they refused, a fringe platoon of reinforcements was sent to Athens.
As two destroyers and the bombers started toward the island, where former Premier Eleutherios Venizelos led an abortive revolution last March, word came that order had been restored.
In "Touza-La-Madeline, France, the exiled former premier said he knew nothing of today's revolt and expressed surprise, through his secretary, "that he is accused of instigating it."
Martial law was declared during the rioting.

Authorities Blamed
Although the politically-harassed Greek government blamed the trouble on political foes, the Greek labor said authorities were at fault for not meeting the workers' demands for better wages.
The question of restoration of the monarchy was believed generally to have had no connection with the rebellion, although it was recalled there has been a campaign by Royalists since March to connect Republicanism with Venizelos.
Former King George of Greece, in London, denied through his aide-camp a report that the deposed monarch was believed negotiating for a reconciliation with Venizelos.
Firing in Candia ceased late this afternoon with General Bakopoulas had surrounded the city and demanded that the strikers submit.

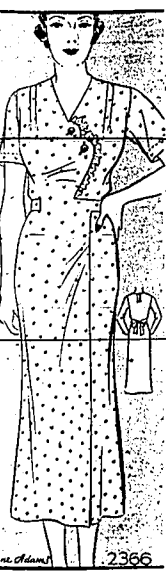

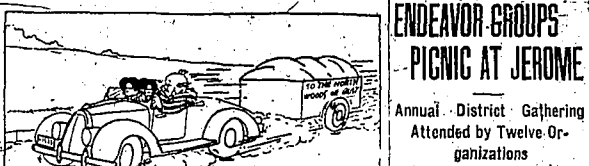

Magazines Join Campaign Against Berlin's Olympics

Protestant and Catholic Publications Urge Drastic Action—Transfer to Some Other Country Suggested

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—On the heels of the latest demands by Jewish organizations that the United States withdraw its support from the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, two church publications—one Protestant and the other Catholic—today called editorially for equally drastic action.

SALMON GETS FINAL DELIVERY OF WATER

Rotation Invoked in Last Irrigation Run for Season

A gauge reading at the Salmon River reservoir yesterday, following completion of six-day run of irrigative water, showed that water remaining available in the reservoir 2145 acre feet of water for a final run that is to be made by rotation through the Salmon River irrigation system beginning next Sunday, W. H. McDaniel, superintendent for the Salmon River Canal company, announced last evening.

A four day run will be started in lateral I on August 11 continuing to August 14.

August 12, water will be run August 11-12, then will be turned off for two days, to be resumed for two days August 15.

A four day run in lateral A will begin on August 13.

Gauge reading at the beginning of the six-day run just concluded showed 17,823 acre feet of water in the reservoir, a subsequent reading at the close of the run showing 10,785 acre feet of water remaining in the reservoir.

During the season thus far there has been drawn from the reservoir 47,511 acre feet of water, of which 27,290 has been actually delivered to the farms, the superintendent stated.
