SENATE DEMOCRATS OPPOSE 'RIDERS' TO WEALTH-TAX BILL

Administration Forces Agree to Speed Adjournment of Congress by Resort to Debate - Choking Tactics

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Senate administration forces agreed today upon an effort to outlaw "riders" to the wealth tax bill and to speed adjournment by resort to debating tactics.

The decision announced by Senator Robinson, the Democratic leader, apparently cast the bonus issue as the question for next January's session and started rumblings of opposition among Senate Republicans.

Quickly after the Democratic agreement, a non-inflationary bonus payment bill was introduced by Senators Byrnes (R-Ore.) and Stewart (R-Ill.).

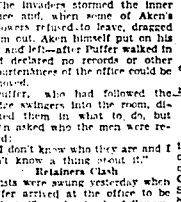
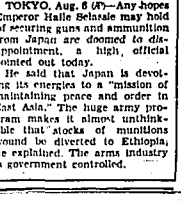
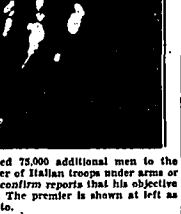

FATHER OF CHILD NAMED BY COURT

Decision Supports Contentions of Former Air-Line Secretary

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6 (AP)—Superior Judge Fletcher Bowen today ruled that Royal Leonard, former transport pilot, is the father of a two-year-old boy named Regina, born to Mrs. Florence Suddarth, former airline secretary.

The decision was handed down after a dramatic questioning of Mrs. Suddarth by the jurist.

"You know better than anyone else who is the father of this child," Judge Bowen asked.

"Royal Leonard," answered the blonde divorcee.

"Is there any possibility that someone else could be the father?" the judge continued.

"No, there is not the father of the child," replied Mrs. Suddarth, "then I am not the mother."

On the date in March, 1934, that Suddarth maintained the accused Leonard to pay \$150 a month for the child's care until she reaches 21.

Water to Be Turned Into New Municipal Plunge at Harmon Park

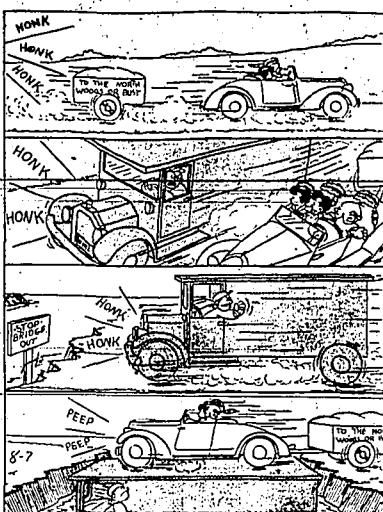
Twin Falls new municipal swimming pool will not be opened until late this week, according to an announcement last evening by Mayor Duncan McD. Johnson at a meeting of Twin Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce. Formal opening, however, will not be held until labor day when dedicatory exercises are tentatively scheduled.

The junior chamber, sponsor of the pool, decided to open the new plunge to the public this week in an effort to keep the youth of Twin Falls away from the unsanitary conditions in waste ditches near Harmon Park.

Three diving boards, a diving tower, a pier and a wire fence to divide the pool from the rest of the park will be completed before the end of the week. Ten foot stairways are being constructed at each end of the pool and a four foot walk around the pool is under construction. Food will be laid around the banks of the pool.

AAA sugar beet production control benefit payments totaling several thousands of dollars are soon to be distributed among Idaho growers, directors of beet growers' associations from Blaine and Jerome counties were told at a conference here yesterday with E. T. Johnson, University of Idaho extension economist and director of the sugar beet program in Idaho, and C. C. Love, representative of the AAA.

Payments to be distributed at this time are the final payment on the 1933 crop or estimated yield, and the initial payment on the representative yield for 1935.

The final payment is to be 75 cents per ton, and the initial payment for 1935 is to be 80 cents per ton.

Sugar beet acreage in Twin Falls county is approximately 2000 acres, and in Jerome county approximately 1500 acres. Representative yield in this district, as determined under AAA regulations, is 11 tons per acre.

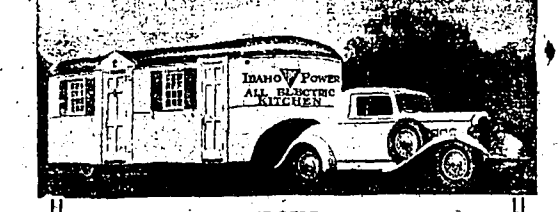

Huelobson, former superintendent of schools at Deary, Idaho, as his assistant today, and named Miss Mabel O. Nye of Boise, his secretary, shortly after taking on his new work. All persons between the ages of 15 and 25 are eligible for aid, he said.

"The youth work relief program is expected to provide employment for approximately 150,000 youths; college aid is to be made available to about 150,000 young men and women; high school aid is extended to more than 100,000 needy youths; and the post-graduate program is to provide part-time employment to a selected group of several thousand," he explained.

An average of \$15 will be paid to recipients of relief and applicants must be filed with the head of the institution which the applicant intends to attend, Godfrey said.

He will have further information regarding the Idaho program after he attends a conference in Washington, D. C., later this month, he said.

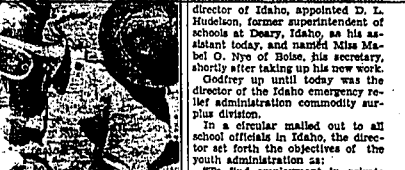

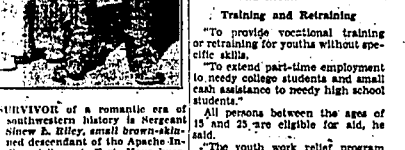

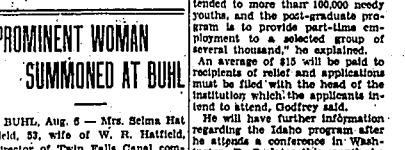
