President 'Announces Cancellation Of Event House and Senate Conference As Precautionary Health Measure

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8—Cancellation of the national Boy Scott jamboree planned here August 21 was announced by President Roosevelt today because of the prevalence of infantile paralysis in this section.

The president acted after a conference late in the day with Hugh S. Cumming, surgeon general of the public health service; commissioner George Allen of the District of Columbia, and Dr. James West, chief scott executive.

A White House statement said the number of infantile paralysis cases "was not considered to be unduly alarming" but it was decided "it would be to the best interests of the scotts and all concerned to cancel the Jumbore."

A STRAW IN THE WIND?

The election of a Republican congress in Rhode Island is not so important in itself, but cannot fail to arouse great interest as the result of the first congressional balloting since the 1934 elections, when an overwhelmingly Democratic Congress was sent to Wash-

Democrats maintain that the election of a Republican in a normally Republican state is nothing to be excited about, while Republicans point out that the only clearly defined issue in the campaign was the New Deal, and the New Deal lost.

It is true that there is no reason to regard the first Congressional district of Rhode Island as a good sample of sentiment over the country as a whole, but the fact that the previous holder of the contested seat was a Democrat, elected by a big majority at an-other election, shows a very decided change of opinion among the voters concerned.

If the Republican party regains strength to a similar extent in all the districts that have been regarded as normally Republican, a Democratic majority will not be returned in 1936. The Rhode Island election by no means indicates that such will be the case, but it does bring home the fact that it is

UNCLE SAM'S OWN BUSINESS

The demand of Senator King of Utah, that the Senate sever diplomatic relations with Germany, arouses sympathy in this country but goes beyond the legitimate duties of the United States Senate.

He declares that "the Hitler government has been oppressive to the Jews, oppressive to the Catholics and has not discharged its proper obligations to the United States." The last of these three charges, though vague, might justify senatorial investigation. The first two are clearly none of the business of the United States government.

The sympathies of the American people, and of the officials representing them at Washington, go out to oppressed minority groups, religious and otherwise, in all lands, and especially just now to those suffering from the narrowness and crucity of the Hitler regime in Germany. But this is a matter with which our government, and the Senate as an arm of the government, has nothing

The Constitution, while guaranteeing re-ligious and political freedom in this country, gives no warrant to the government for championing such freedom in other countries. If it undertook to do so, in this or any comparable case, we should soon be in hot water with many foreign powers. American citizens may properly protest privately against such persecution, but our govern-ment has no more business intruding in the internal affairs of other countries than they have intruding in ours.

CCC MAKES GOOD

The report of the work of the Civilian Conservation Corps for the two years from April, 1933 to April, 1935, contains an impressive list of practical accomplishments. In that time the young men of the Corps have waged effective warfare against crop-destroying rodents. They have reduced losses caused by beetles, moths and other inects. They have built more than one million "check dams" in gullies to control soil ero-

sion. They have done other flood-control

They put in nearly two million man-days fighting forest fires. They reduced fire har-ards on more than a million acres. They erected more than two thousand look-out towers and houses for fire detection, and built thousands of miles of service roads and trails through forests, principally for fire protec-

These boys also planted two hundred and inety-one million trees and made surveys for improvements of water and timber re-sources. The value of the work they have done is estimated at half a billion dollars.

All of this work was a by-product of the real work of the CCC, which was to salvage real work of the CCC, which was to salvage a few hundred thousand young mon from the ruinous idleness the depression had forced them into. They were drafted from street corners and marshalled into a productive army to serve their country with useful, health-bringing and character-build-
