

CRUELTY CHARGED TO SUGAR HEIR

Wife of John D. Spreckels, 3rd., Sues for \$1000 Monthly

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 8 (AP)—John D. Spreckels, 3rd., heir to the Spreckels sugar fortune, today was named defendant in a separate maintenance action in which Mrs. Roxana Gloria Spreckels seeks \$1,000 monthly.

Coincident with the filing of the suit by Mrs. Spreckels, her attorney disclosed that the sugar heir is now in Reno, Nevada, seeking to establish residence for the purpose of obtaining a divorce.

Cruelty was the basis of the separate maintenance suit filed by Mrs. Spreckels, who charged her husband kept her virtual prisoner in their home in San Francisco, threatened her bodily harm, stayed away from home without explanation and gambled away large sums on horse races in Texas.

Young Spreckels received \$2,000 a month from a \$1,000,000 trust set up by a San Francisco bank, Mrs. Spreckels said. She asks in addition to the \$1,000 a month, an equal division of the community property. She also asked \$15,000 for attorney's fees and the custody of her two daughters.

The complaint recited that she sued for divorce in San Diego, California, last October 16, before the baby was born and was granted \$100 temporary alimony monthly. After birth of the child, there was a brief reconciliation, she said, during which she signed a property agreement "dictated by my husband" which she said she agreed to be declared invalid.

GERMANY'S YOUTH TAKES UP QUARREL

BERLIN, Aug. 8 (AP)—Hitlerites' fight against state "rowdies" brought sweeping decrees today against World War veterans' organizations, Jews and Free Masons. The heated political feeling was shown in a fight of youths near Krefeld. Fifteen boys, aged about 15, members of the Hitler youth organization, were set upon by youths dressed as "rowdies" when returning on bicycles from a meeting in Foesen. A Hitler youth leader was seriously injured and another less seriously hurt. Secret police said they had arrested the assailants. Veterans' Stahlhelm or "steel helmet" organizations were discovered in Berlin, Brandenburg, Pommern and Eastern Mark by order of secret police. Property of the formations was seized. An official communique said the groups were rallying points of both reactionaries and Marxists who oppose the Nazi regime. Steel helmet national headquarters said the disolutions do not affect the national organization, which still exists through repeated dissolution, however, its membership has dwindled. On Saturday last the Masonic lodges in the Reich will be dissolved, the Volkskammer spokesman, Hitler's newspaper, announced. The Jewish culture band in Berlin was forbidden to arrange stage performances by Arya Glemier dramatists, including the classics of Goethe, Schiller and Lessing. They may, however, produce plays by Shakespeare and other foreigners than a century or two old, he declared.

Jacobs immediately went on a shopping tour with his prize match, which he figures should draw a gross of more than a quarter of a million dollars. The Sporting Club of Illinois, headed by Sheldon Clark, millionaire sportsman, asked for several days to study the situation, but announced it would not be outbid by New York or any other city for the important battle.

Three Alternates
Jacobs had three alternates. He could stage the fight in Chicago under the auspices of the Sporting Club of Illinois, a newly organized group composed of wealthy Chicago apartment; he could run it at New York, probably at the Polo grounds, under the sponsorship of the Twenty-first Century club which he is promoter; or he could stage it out and do it himself. The latter possibility was abandoned. The fight would be held at either Soldier field, scene of the Jack Dempsey-Otto Fuston spectacle of 1927, or at the White Sox park, which could be arranged to seat 10,000 to 15,000.
Jacobs said, "Naturally, I want the place that can offer the largest gate. My mind is open on the matter."
Louis, in all probability more than a year has battered his way as a dangerous contender for the title held by Jimmy Braddock, was elected the new champion. "I'll fight anywhere," he said without a change of expression. "I lick Baer just as easily as I licked the Ancil Hoffman, manager of Baer, who watched Louis stop Dempsey."
