

SPaulding's Press RE-OPENED FOR DAHO

Idaho Editors at Halley
Address Appeal to
Oregon

HALLEY, Ida., Aug. 10 (AP)—Idaho editors and one of the first printed presses used in this state returned from Oregon so that it may be preserved in what is now the state's most beautiful territory and earlier days in the quarters of the state historical society at Boise.

A resolution passed by 300 members of the Idaho State Editorial association during the organization's annual mid-summer session here today appealed to the Oregon State Editorial Association, Oregon City, to return to Idaho the printing press that reportedly was used by the Rev. Henry Spaulding, one of the founders of the newspaper, at a point near what now is Lewiston, Idaho.

The association also approved a resolution calling upon Postmaster General James J. Farley to honor the Rev. Mr. Spaulding with a stamp bearing the printer's picture. The Spaulding printing press was mentioned by A. L. Alfred of Lewiston in an informal address on the history of printing in Idaho.

On Day's Program
Other speakers at today's session were Walter York of the "Organization in Printing," Preley F. Horns of Caldwell on "How the Public Got the Newspaper," and Byrd Trego of Blackfoot on "The History of Missions in Idaho," a subject on which Argo is an acknowledged authority.

Aden Hyde of Caldwell presided as president of the association and Charles Howell of Shoshone was present as secretary.

Tonight the editors met at an informal session at which C. W. West of Boise, business manager of an illustrated lecture on Shoshoni mountain scenery.

Besides the editor, L. P. Parsons of Boise, secretary of the Idaho state chamber of commerce, was present.

POLYGAMY CHARGED IN SIX AND A HALF COMPLAINTS

Many Families Move From
Arizona District Following Legal Action

KINGMAN, Ariz., Aug. 10 (AP)—County Attorney Elmo Bollinger returned here today from the isolated Short Creek settlement in the Arizona Territory, where complaints had been signed and filed against six persons charged with living in a state of polygamy.

The complaints, Bollinger said, were signed by J. M. Childers, a resident of Short Creek.

Childers alleges a "sordid and obscene" habitations, the complaints were filed against I. O. Spencer, Silvia Alford, Brock Johnson, Helen Hill, John Harkins and a woman identified only as Jane Doe.

The complaints' subject filing of Childers against the other five was deferred pending further investigation.

Requests Hearing Date
Bollinger, who reached here late Friday after a two-day journey from Short Creek, said that he had requested Justice of the Peace to set a preliminary hearing of the six accused persons for August 17, but he will not know the date until the preliminary hearing is held on that date until a deputy sheriff arrives from Short Creek Tuesday.

Bollinger said filing of the complaints had resulted in a number of families of the United Order of Beethovens, which includes polygamy, moving from the Short Creek district. The county attorney said he was of the opinion the families would be scattered.

Bollinger said the investigation into the practice of polygamy at Short Creek was completed. He said it had been reported to him that an 18-year-old youth in the district has three wives.

Tax Collections Reported By Treasurer As Best In History

JEROME, Aug. 10.—Financially Jerome county stands higher on the ladder than it has at any time since the creation of the county in 1919, Earl P. Kennedy, Jerome county treasurer, revealed here today in making public a report of recent collections of current and delinquent taxes.

June collection of current taxes total \$116,597.62, the largest in many years. In addition, \$69,979.90 in delinquent taxes, penalty and interest, said by Kennedy to include the greatest delinquent tax collection in the county's history, was collected by his office.

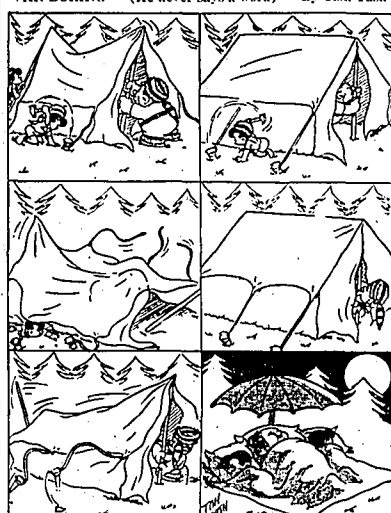

SUBWAY DISPUTE HEADS TO DECISION

District Judge's Ruling Paves Way for Appeal to Supreme Court

BOISE, Aug. 10 (AP)—Without ruling on the merits of the case, Judge Charles E. Winstead here in Third district court yesterday paved the way for immediate appeal of the \$150,000 Nampa subway case to the supreme court.

The action was instituted several weeks ago in an attempt permanently to restrain the state department of public works from construction of a subway under the Oregon Short Line Railway company tracks at Nampa.

Although the contract was awarded by the state of Idaho to the company of Salt Lake City weeks ago, building of the "underpass" has not started because of uncertainty resulting from pending litigation.

After hearing arguments today and yesterday by attorneys and the plaintiffs' attorneys, Judge Winstead this afternoon decided a motion by the plaintiffs to strike certain portions of the state's answer to their complaint, overruled a special demurrer of the plaintiffs' attorneys and sustained a general demurrer which raises the question of sufficiency of the state's answer.

Strikes at Delay

In view of the importance of an early decision of this controversy by the supreme court of the state, because of the public interest both at Nampa and elsewhere in the state where similar projects are under way, without giving the matters involved any consideration whatever, I have decided to deny the motion to strike, to overrule the special demurrer, but to sustain the general demurrer to the answer," Judge Winstead's brief opinion read.

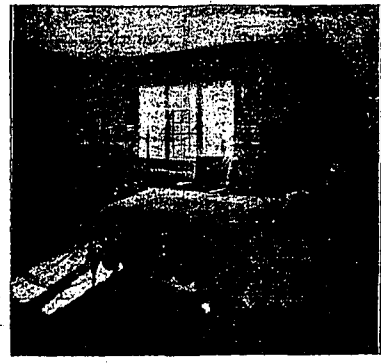
"In this way," he concluded, "there will be no delay to either side in bringing the case for the immediate consideration of the supreme court."

Judge Winstead fixed 2 p. m. August 12, at the time any further evidence necessary will be heard in behalf of the judgment that will be formally entered then in accordance with today's decision.

The proceedings Monday will be purely routine.

"We will appeal to the supreme court immediately to settle permanently this controversy without further delay," William Broderick, attorney for the public works department, announced.

Rare Operation Cures Joe's Heart; Now He Faces 'Celebrity Problem'

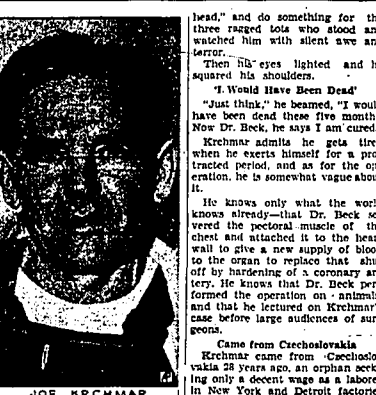

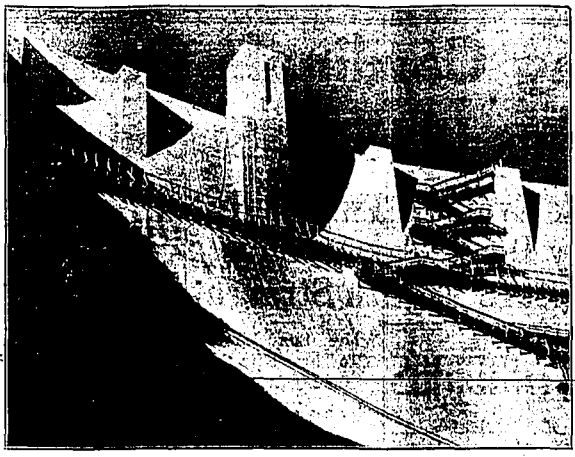
COMMISSION DENIES MEAT-RATES SLASH

Idaho Livestock Growers Hail Decision As Victory

BOISE, Aug. 10.—A decision handed down yesterday by the Interstate Commerce commission at Washington, D. C. denying reductions in freight rates on fresh meats and packing house products from Chicago, Missouri river and other eastern points to the Pacific coast and mountain states, was hailed here today as a victory for Idaho livestock growers.

The Idaho public utilities commission was one of the intervenors in opposition to the reduction of the rates. Granting of the reduction would have had the effect of depriving the Idaho livestock growers of the Pacific coast and western states markets and would have required shipment of most of Idaho's cattle and hogs to the eastern and middle western packing houses where they would have been converted into fresh meats and packing house products and then would have been shipped to the west coast markets and intermountain points. The commission declared tonight in a statement given out by W. B. Joy, secretary.

PROPERTY VALUATION ASCENDS AT GOODING

GOODING, Aug. 10.—Gooding county's real and personal property increases in assessed valuation over last year, according to the abstracts of the tax rolls as completed a few days ago by Auditor Bert Johnson, and filed with the state auditor at Boise. A total of \$37,183 is noted on the personal property roll and \$33,628 on the real property roll.

CITY WATER RATES REDUCED AT GOODING

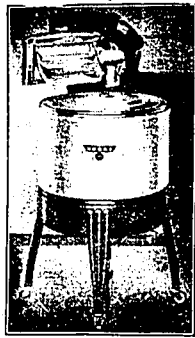
