

Distinctly new impetus is lent to the possibility of a Federal air base being located somewhere in the Twin Falls area by the animal solution of the Twin Falls area by the animal solution with the Twin Falls area by the with nouncement of a new national policy with respect to air defense which calls for the establishment of military flying fields through out the country.

Huge frontier air bases are to be located

in six specified areas of which the Pacific Northwest is one and the "Rocky Mountain Region" another. Alaska and three Atlantic locations will provide for the rest of the six

There can be no question but what this section of Southern Idaho has something to sell when it comes to the matter of natural advantages from the standpoint of air trans-portation, military or otherwise. To the south of Twin Falls lies a tract of land miles in extent with no natural barriers, free of fogs, clear of anything remotely approaching a storm area and with a year 'round climate which leaves little to be desired. If such an air base were established anywhere within striking distance of Twin Falls the advan-tages which would accrue to this city would be enormous. Probably a base such as that contemplated would require a permanent personnel of hundreds of men and their fam-ilies. Huge hangars would have to be built. repair shops, hospital facilities, commissary and living quarters would be required. Sup-plies of all kinds would flow to such a base in a steady stream.

The bill providing for the establishment of these huge air headquarters has been signed by the President and an amount estimated at one hundred twenty millions will be expended for their construction

It is a matter of pride with us not for a high official to be kept majestically uncartooned but to show democratically that he "can take it."

There is a new flurry of fear in many quarters as a result of revelations at the international Communist congress at Moscow.
