Flood Takes Lives When Dam Bursts

TURIN, Italy, Aug. 13 (AP)—Estimates that more than 600 persons—possibly 1,000—may have perished in the bursting of a hydro-electric dam in the vicinity of the Alexandrian town of Orava were made tonight by rescue workers. The raging waters, pouring through the shattered dam on the swollen Orba river, had water an area of 43 square miles in the vicinity of Orava, today. A vast volume of water, stored up by mountain storms, swept over the

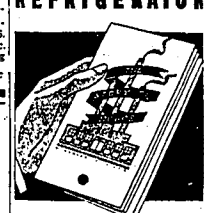
countryside, washing away scores of houses, wiping out small factories and crumpling a half dozen railroad and highway bridges. The rescue workers, troops and police, who were rained with supplies to the stricken area from the city of Alessandria, said they could compute no definite toll of the dead until daylight.

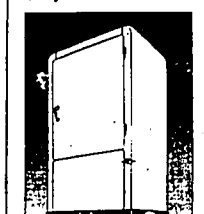

AN OPPORTUNITY Distinctly new impetus is lent to the possibility of a Federal air base being located somewhere in the Twin Falls area by the announcement of a new national policy with respect to air defense which calls for the establishment of military flying fields throughout the country.

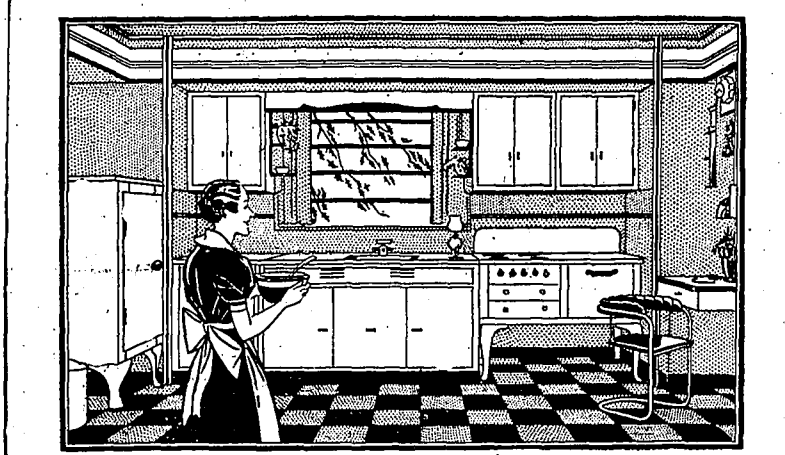

IDAHO ORCHARDISTS WAR ON RAILROADS

Pre-War Rates Demanded With Truck Haul As Alternative

BOISE, Aug. 13 (AP)—If members of the Idaho State Horticultural association board of directors have their way, freight rates on farm products shipped from this state will be slashed to prewar levels or truck haul will be used exclusively to transport Idaho agricultural produce to market.

At a meeting of the board here today that line of action was decided upon in two resolutions which were adopted.

They called for an increase in the assessed valuation of the property of the Union Pacific Railway company and the Pacific Fruit Express company and for use of trucks in moving Idaho farm products. Rates are not reduced materially.

Addressed to Equalization Board. Both resolutions were ordered transmitted to the Idaho state board of equalization which now is in session.

Members of the board are former State Senator J. H. Beaver of Twin Falls, George M. Wood of Emmett, H. W. Weeks of Boise and Clyde I. Rush of Mesa.

They are president, vice president, secretary and treasurer, respectively, of the association. The trucking resolution is similar to one adopted recently by the Idaho Vegetable Producers, Inc., of Twin Falls, of which former State Representative E. R. Pettigrove of Hansen is president.

It sets forth that the railroad company pays approximately 11 per cent of the ad valorem tax in Idaho; that more than 50 per cent of all the farm products purchased in southern Idaho go to pay the railway company for moving the fruit; that the price of produce in Idaho is higher than in other states; that farmers and other business institutions of southern Idaho pay 80 per cent of the ad valorem taxes, and that the freight rates charged by the Union Pacific Railway company, and the amount of crops taken to pay their freight rates, is all out of proportion to the load which is being borne by the farmers of southern Idaho.

Calls for Truck Haul
The potato resolution charged that freight rates are prohibitive and that farmers cannot pay the cost of producing their crop and pay present rates without suffering a financial loss, and requests the officers of the Idaho Vegetable Producers, Inc., to contact the large manufacturers of trucks in the United States to arrange, if possible, with some trucking company to move Idaho farm products by truck exclusively to all markets.
It requested that dealers of farm produce in the state lend their assistance in working with the trucks to the extent that no farm products be moved by rail until such time as the Union Pacific Railway company will grant prewar rates on all commodities moving into and out of Idaho.

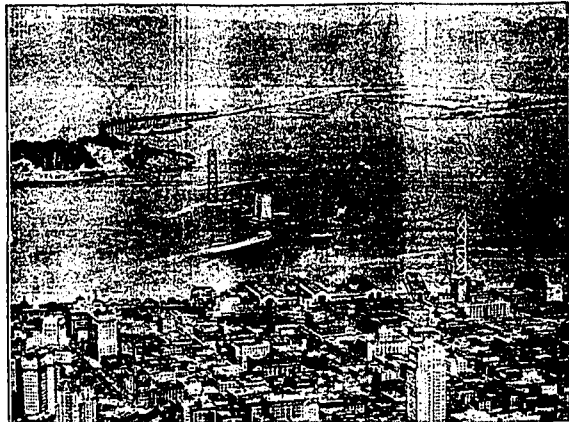
NEW FIELD EXAMINER FOR PWA IN IDAHO

Cables Spin Web Across San Francisco Bay As World's Biggest Bridge Takes Final Form

First Suspension Unit Spans A Mile Of Water



Engineers expect to complete the San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge by November, 1936, two months ahead of schedule. This view shows the catwalks built out over the bay for a mile. SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Working the curving ferryboats it will replace, the \$15,000,000 San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge, largest in the world, assumes day by day more of the final shape which will span against the San Francisco bay skyline.

Construction work, begun two years ago, is now more than half complete. The entire project is ahead of schedule, and Chief Engineer Charles H. Purcell of the California toll bridge authority has promised his superiors, Governor Frank F. Merriam and Earl Leo Kelly, state director of public works, that the bridge will be ready for public use November 1, 1936, two months ahead of the scheduled date.

Two Bridges Involved
The great bridge, 8 1/2 miles from end to end, actually involves two bridges—one the two-mile-long suspension spans from San Francisco to Yerba Buena Island in the middle of the bay and the other cantilever and truss bridge from the island to Oakland—a tunnel through the top of Yerba Buena and the approaches on both sides of the bay. Its two decks will be capable of handling 30,000,000 vehicles a year. The upper deck will provide six lanes for automobiles, and the lower will carry two interurban train tracks and three lanes for heavy trucks.

In length, it is three times that of the great Fifth or Fourth bridge in Oakland. On the San Francisco side its lower roadway will be from 185 to 220 feet above high water. The tallest piers rise 50 feet above sea surface; the deepest pier is sunk 235 feet.

Dreamed of since 1856
The dream of bridging San Francisco bay has been held by Californians since 1856, but only within the past few years other cantilever and truss bridge have been strung into place.
On the eastern half, steel work is being placed together to close the remaining 1000-foot gap. The last 1400 feet, which will form one huge

phases of construction now is under way—the "pinning" of the cables under the "pinning" of the cables from which will hang the suspension spans between San Francisco and Yerba Buena. Two by two, the 1724 wires which will make up each cable are being strung into place.

On the eastern half, steel work is being placed together to close the remaining 1000-foot gap. The last 1400 feet, which will form one huge cantilever span, will be erected by glider out over the water from each side until it joins in the center.

Traffic Details Remains
Already completed, of course, are the anchorages, piers and towers and work is being pushed on the complicated approaches. The task of laying the decks on the suspension side and the flooring of the structure still lie ahead.

Behind the tower structure, details of the transportation system remain to be determined. Engineers and traffic experts foresee the likelihood of marked changes in the volume of traffic, now handled by passenger and automobile ferries.

Terminal facilities, particularly at the San Francisco end, must be established for the electric trolleys which will bring commuters across from the East bay districts.

"I knew that day at the station that I couldn't marry him," she felt on. "But for anything in the world, not even for—" She stopped abruptly.

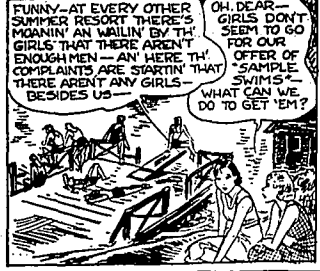
"No even for what, Laurie? Why were you going to marry him? For his money, for his position—for what else?"

"—Money!" She broke down. He was all she wanted in the world. He was her happiness; he was her man. Nothing mattered but that he should know the truth.

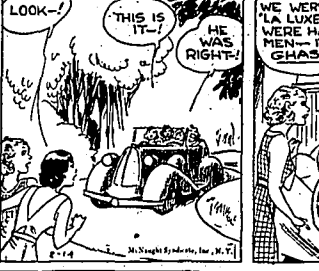
