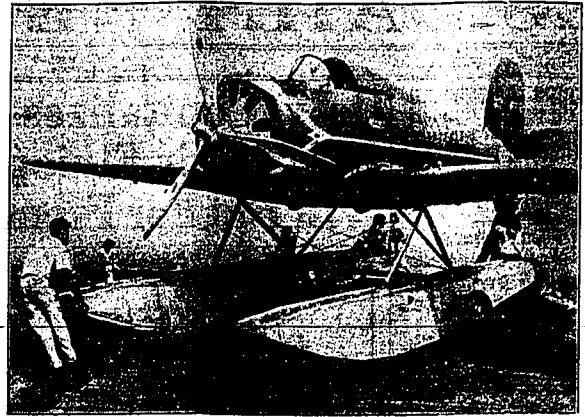

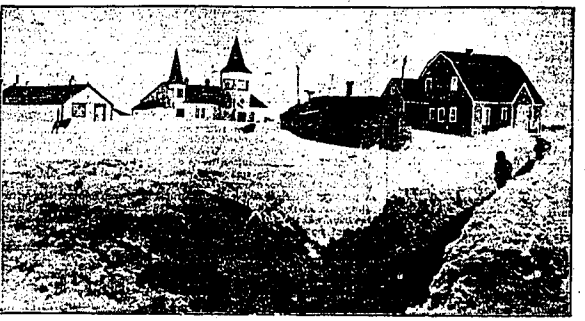

## Alaska Sourdoughs Recall 'Soapy' Smith's Demise

SEATTLE, Aug. 17 (AP)—How "Soapy" Smith met his end was one of the stirring events of Alaska gold rush days recalled at the Seventh International Sourdoughs' stampede and reunion here today.

"After Soapy was done away with there was a call for a hanging bet," square-jawed Godfrey Chelander recalled.

The end of "Soapy" came at Skagway, said Chelander, a pioneer of the Alaska rush and later "father" of Seattle's Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition in 1909.

He said Smith was Alaska's "No. 1 bad man" and that the Skagway pioneers finally decided to dispose of him.

There was Soapy, chief of a gang of gamblers, bunco men and strong arm gentry, with a rifle on his

shoulder, growling "you better go slow; I'm due to kill somebody," Chelander asserted.

"And there," he added, "were the Skagway boys, rifics on their shoulders, facing Smith.

"Twenty minutes later, Soapy was dead. The boys wanted to clean up the gang right then. We had some of Soapy's lieutenant locked up in a room over a grocery store. One of them, Slim Jim, got so excited at the cries of the crowd that he jumped out of a window. But we defended the prisoners, later turning them over to the government."

Chelander, now 76 years old, came to the sourdoughs' stampede from Los Angeles, where he has made his home for the last five years.

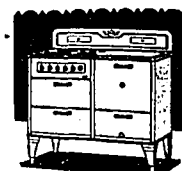

### TRUCKMEN'S FIGHT AGAINST 'OUTLAWS'

State Organization's Chief Disclaims Quarrel With Railroads

(By The Associated Press)  
BOISE, Aug. 17.—Groundwork for legislation which will prohibit operations of independent or "outlaw" truck operators in Idaho was laid today at a meeting of the Idaho Motor Transport association here which was also attended by farmers and truck operators.

Protests against the railroad companies for charging "excessive" rates for shipments of agricultural products from Idaho to other states were dropped at the session as the association directed its drive against the independent truckers.

Unconcerned About Rails  
E. W. Jewell of Orofino, president of the Idaho Motor Transport association, told the group that "we don't care now what the railroads do. They can raise their rates or lower them, but we will still go on trucking, not only because the trucks are cheaper to use but because we can give producers better service."

"At first, the increase in rail rates has been hard on everyone concerned, but with development of truck service we have found that there is no comparison between the service that the railroads give and the service the trucking lines give."

"Our battle now is not against the railroads, but against the independent truckers who wreck the service. We intend to ask for legislation protecting us against them."

Fight Against 'Outlaws'  
"The national trucking law will be a benefit to everyone but until it goes into effect, which may not be until next July, our only course is to do the best we can. But we intend to fight the 'outlaw' truckers until then."

"They have caused a loss to legitimate transport companies who have been duly licensed and have obtained insurance, and their practices are against all and any fair business dealings."

Developed Under New Deal  
"Our fight now is for regulation of the trucking business."

Roy B. Thompson of San Francisco, representing the American Trucking association, told members at the meeting that "under the new deal, the truck was developed and the trucking industry, for the first time in history, united and developed a code of fair competition. The trucking industry was recognized as the second largest industry in the United States. It developed a code which included more state and federal officials to the state and importance of this industry."

"The independent truckers indicated that motor trucks must be regulated by the federal government and that they should be regulated just as the railroads."

"That is what we want and what we intend to fight for."

Delaware Rape Railroad  
Carl L. DeLong of Twin Falls, executive secretary of the Idaho Trucking association, told the meeting specific examples in which the railroads reduced rates for Idaho wood growers on shipments to Portland, but had refused to follow the same practice with other producers of the state. The reduction was made, he said, after trucking entered the picture.

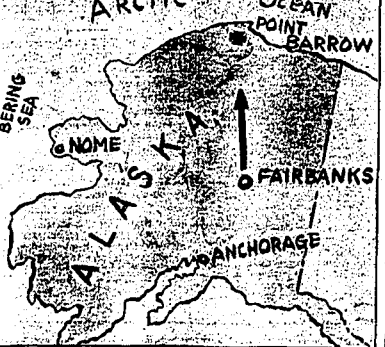

**Neighbors For New Communities May Be Lined Up By 'Sociometry'**

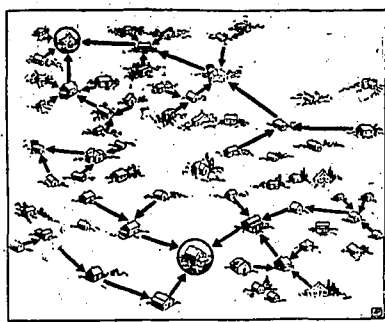
**By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor)**  
**NEW YORK (AP)**—A new social science, sociometry, which measures human interrelationships, is being planned by the federal reclamation department.

Even some race prejudice barriers are solved by the tests of sociometry. These indicate, in planning a migration, what families to move and how they will fit happily into a new community.

Thousands of families face resettlement in the Tennessee valley project. There are other groups waiting in nearly every state for transfer to rural regions of better land or to industrial communities.

New York Psychologist's Idea  
Sociometry is the idea of J. L. Moreno, M. D. of New York, a leader in psychiatry. He began this work in war-torn Austria in 1920, when he transplanted bodily to new areas. He has continued in the United States until his methods have been studied in communities totaling, near and abroad, about 40,000 persons.

**'Map' Indicates Social Unit Leaders**



On this sociometric map of a community, each house represents a family and each arrow shows the choice of one family for another as a neighbor. The social units, groups or gangs, which last years to grow, are thus revealed. Some of the families are isolated—no one wants them, and they want no one. The two houses in circles represent families which make a whole group, as shown by the directions of the arrow chains.

Here and there a family, or its head, appears as potential leader of a large group. This is not a case of one person getting all first choices. It appears on the map as a series of sufficient chains, in preference leading ultimately to this head.

**Breaking Bias Factors**  
The map shows socially balanced structures. These are groups that take years to build, that cannot be replaced when breakup risks failure in a new community. Such groups may be transferred bodily in the migration.

They cannot be transferred successfully when their leaders are antagonistic. This principle of group living is used to select the sociometric units from the other two communities which might combine happily in the new settlement.

Former Utah Congressman Directs Fire Against 'Third Party'

LEWISTON, Mont., Aug. 17 (AP)—Frederick C. Loofbourou, former Utah congressman tonight counseled Montana Republicans meeting here to bide their time in formulating a 1936 platform and not to be "treacherous with regard to their presidential nominee."

After assailing the national administration as "third party" which he charged was "undermining the foundations of a Republican government," Loofbourou advised caution about the next Republican platform.

Mrs. Ethel Arnold Heroine of Uphill Battle to Victory

Wife of California Baseball Player Scores Surprising Win Over Kay Stammers In Wightman Cup Series

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Writer) FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 17 (P)—Executing a swift, sensational reversal of form, America's women tennis stars rallied to sweep the last three singles matches of the Wightman cup tennis series with Great Britain today and keep possession of the international trophy for the fifth straight year.

The heroine of America's uphill fight to victory on the turf courts of the West Side stadium was a California ball-player's wife, Ethel Barnard Arnold, who capped the climax of her debut in Wightman cup competition by conquering the redoubtable Katherine (Kay) Stammers, crack English outstrip, in the deciding match.

Beaten soundly the day before by Dorothy Round, the English No. 1, and conceded little chance of upstaging her by being first today, Mrs. Arnold gave a superb exhibition of fighting spirit and shot back to capture a thrilling match, by scores of 6-2, 1-6, 6-3.

The triumph for the diminutive Los Angeles matron, unranked nationally since 1926 when she was No. 6 on the United States list and out of competition almost entirely for the past two years, was the climax of a remarkable rally by the home forces. The British entered the final half of the series leading 2-1, but after a set of stunning singles decisions yesterday, only to have the cup defenders settle the issue with three consecutive victories.

It was just as well for the sake of this country's supremacy in women's tennis, that Mrs. Arnold came through the pressure with the result after but the British doubles team of Evelyn Dearman and Nancy Lyle nevertheless rallied to beat Carolyn Sabcock and Dorothy Audus, American pair, in the seventh and final match, 3-6, 6-4, 6-1.

The final score 4 to 3 as the United States emerged triumphant for the fourth time in the Wightman cup.

Sarah Palfrey Fabry of Boston and Helen Jacobs, three-time American singles champion, paved the way for Mrs. Arnold's decisive conquest. Together they scored America's first point by winning the doubles yesterday. Mrs. Jacobs had yielded to the fiery stroking of Miss Stammers in a similar match. Today Mrs. Arnold returned to the courts to trounce Phyllis Stanford King, 6-0, 6-2.

The crowd of 8,000 tennis fans confidently expected the Stammers to even the count again, sending the series into the final doubles match for decision. But every one else, with the exception of Mrs. Arnold, the Californian lifted her game to superlative heights, with the cup at stake, and thoroughly justified the confidence placed in her by the United States selection committee, which named her to take Mrs. Fabry's place as No. 2 singles player.

By GLENN BARR (Associated Press Foreign Staff) TOKYO, Aug. 17 (P)—The finest swimmers of the United States and Japan began a three-day competition for world supremacy here tonight, with the Japanese winning three of the four races. The Olympic pomp and ceremony marked the event, attended by a crowd of 15,000.

The invading American team escaped a whitewashing by capturing a close victory in the 500 meter medley relay. The time was three minutes, 20.2 seconds, the best recorded in competition. In the backstroke lap of the relay, Taylor Drysdale of Detroit gained a two meter lead over Kichiro Yoshida. In the second or breast stroke lap Jack Kincaid of the University of Michigan held this advantage against Reizo Koke, Olympic 200 meter breast stroke record holder. With his team mate, Peter Fick of the New York Athletic club assisted to victory in competition with sprinter Yusa, member of the Japanese team which set a world record for the 800 meters relay at the last Olympic games.

The point score of the opening evening gave Japan 14 and the United States 7, counting first places as three, seconds as two, and thirds as one.

Koke won the opening event, the 200 meter breast stroke, 2:45.6, equating the world mark set by J. Cartonnet of France in 1922. His team mate, Tetsuo Hamuro of Nihon university was second, and Johnny Higgins of Okeleyville, R. I., took third.

#### Flower Exhibitors at Twin Falls Show Told of Garden Aids

Choice varieties, sturdy plants and like planting, make for good fall snapdragons, advises Mrs. W. T. Leslie, winner of first place in the snapdragon class at the Assenation Guild Flower show last year. Mrs. Leslie's prize winning blooms were flame and copper colored, carefully chosen for size of stalk, and artistically displayed.

Mrs. Ernest Stietler, another winner last year, advises that the soil must be kept up, if we are to expect good snapdragons.

"Cut the flowers back," says Mrs. Stietler, "as soon as the bloom begins to fade, and the new blossom will come within two weeks, if conditions are favorable. She says that a soil invigorator may be applied advantageously at this time, and this application may help to assure time blossoms for the flower show which will be held Saturday, September 7, in Twin Falls.

### FORECLOSURE ASKED ON BUSINESS BLOCK

#### Koto Building Involved in Claims of Receiver's Certificate Holder

In the district court in Twin Falls yesterday, Bruce Robertson started suit for foreclosure of \$3250 receiver's certificates that were issued as a lien against the Koto building on Main avenue north, that was built in 1920 and insured in 1921 for \$20,000. Immediate appointment of a receiver for the property also is asked.

Defendants named were the High and Fritchman company of Boise, which obtained title to the property in January, 1933, under foreclosure of a deed of trust which it held; Martin and Martin, Boise attorneys; Fred R. Feuton, former receiver, and Frank H. Chamberlain, holder of receiver's certificates.

Recites Proceedings  
The complaint, which was drafted and filed by Chapman and Chapman, Twin Falls attorneys, recites that Feuton was named as receiver when the High and Fritchman company started foreclosure on the deed of trust in January, 1931, against the builder, the late Tom Koto, and others. Receivers certificates for payment of delinquent taxes and insurance and for making needed improvements were issued under authorization that the district court here granted in November, 1931.

Robertson claims to have acquired the receivers certificates issued in the following amounts to Ed Straus, \$500; Anna B. Robertson, \$600; John D. Robertson, \$300; College of Idaho, \$250; Frank H. Chamberlain, \$2,500. No part of the principal has been paid, he alleges, and interest has not been paid since October, 1932. Certificates in each instance matured in October, 1933.

CHILD MARRIAGE BANNED BY SOUTH AFRICAN LAW  
PRETORIA (AP)—The death knell of child marriages has been sounded in South Africa.

Hereafter, except in special circumstances, there will be no weddings of boys under 18 or of girls under 16.

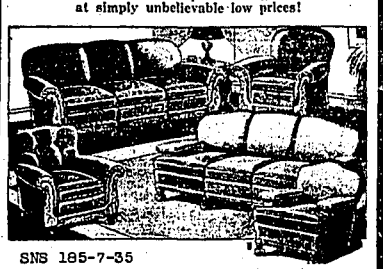
Where the new law will have its most marked effect is in the prevention of marriages between old men and young girls—by no means unusual in the past.

Official records show that in 1932 a man of 75 married a girl of 16, and six girls who hadn't reached 16 married men of more than 50.

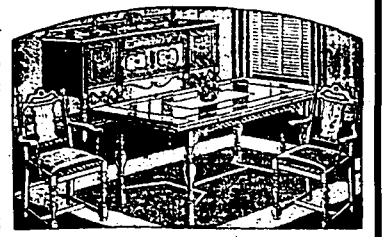
