PRESIDENT DEFERS TO CONSTITUTION

F. D. R. Unexpectedly Mentions Document in Address to Scouts

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—In a surprise reference to the constitution, President Roosevelt called attention to the fact that the document depends upon the attitude of mind and the degree of unselfishness of cooperation that can be developed in individuals.

The chief executive spoke over the air to the Boy Scouts of America, assembled in camps throughout the country. At the outset he mentioned the constitution of the organization, although he will address the nation by radio Saturday night for the special anniversary celebration.

Speaking to the scouts tonight, the president said that the boys should be bound together in a democracy operating under a constitution whose purpose was and is to form a perfect union, established by treaty, compact, or agreement.

"The success of that constitution is dependent on the attitude of mind and the degree of unselfish cooperation that can be developed in individuals. Scouting is a means and a method for the development of that unselfish, cooperative attitude of mind."

"If you are to be successful in keeping with a promise made when the national jamboree to have been here this week was cancelled, you must be successful in accepting your responsibilities of citizenship to the people and said the scout motto "Be prepared" applies "just as much to the citizen as to the scout."

"I am before you because of your age, you actually have a part in civil affairs," he said, "and you bear responsibility in the home community. We do citizens are very proud of the many contributions that individual scouts and troops have made to the relief of suffering, to the maintenance of good order and good government."

"He expressed the hope that the jamboree scheduled for this year will be planned for some time in the future."

# AL SMITH PLEADS FOR CONSTITUTION

### Former Presidential Candidate on Record for Religious Liberty

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—Former Governor Alfred E. Smith last night coupled condemnation of attacks upon religion in Germany and in Mexico with a plea for preservation of the United States constitution.

He addressed a "victory dinner" of the supreme council of Knights of Columbus held to celebrate a recent drive. The speech was broadcast over a national radio network.

It marked a high point in the opening program of the council's 53rd annual convention, at which delegates were held by Martin J. Carmody, supreme knight, of Grand Rapids, Michigan; that nations which deny religious liberty and individual rights should be soundly censured.

**Against Radicalism**

More than 200 delegates and 2,000 guests stood and applauded vigorously at the conclusion of Smith's address in which he declared that not only the constitution but individual rights of the people should be defended against radicalism.

"I don't believe in communism, the 'happy warrior' declared. 'And I believe there is too much common sense among our people to permit us to get a foothold in this country.'

Striking at attacks upon religion in Germany and Russia, the former communist in Russia, the former governor continued:

"In Germany, a Jew isn't a man. In Germany a Catholic isn't a man. The one over there that is a man is the one who has the blood of an Aryan barbarian."

**Russia Makes Tools**

"In Russia a man is not a man. He is just a tool. He works for the state. He loses his identity. He is absorbed by the state just like a drop of water when it is dropped into wine."

He also touched upon the religious problem in Mexico involving the Catholic church and state and developed present conditions there.

"Russia, Germany and Mexico can continue this form of government only by the force of arms," Smith declared, "and it is making the citizens subservient to the state by force."

Concluding his speech with a plea for preservation of the United States constitution, the former governor urged his listeners to "keep your eye on it."

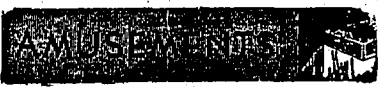

In accordance with the "Scottsboro decision" of the United States Supreme Court and a subsequent order issued by Governor Graves, two thousand Negroes now become subject to jury service in Jefferson County, Alabama. Their names will be placed on the jury roll on September 1.

The names of some thirty thousand White persons are being put on the rolls at the same time, which considerably reduces the chance of Negroes to serve as jurors. The chairman of the county jury board states that the names of some Negroes have been put on the lists in the past, but that when they have been summoned they have usually requested dismissal.

With more Negroes on the lists and with the Supreme Court upholding their right to serve, it is likely that some of them will actually perform jury service.

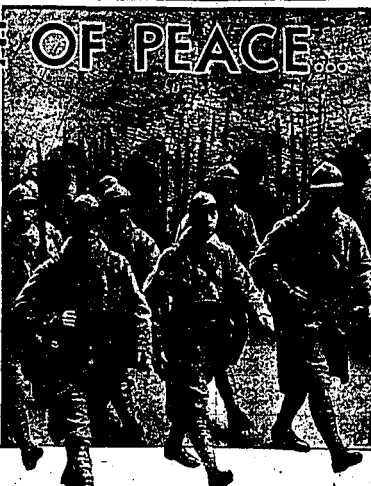

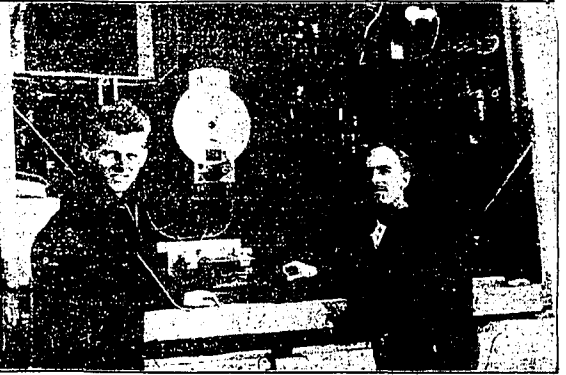
