U.S. PROBES 'SALE' OF JOBS AT DAM

Agent Investigates Alleged Labor 'Racket' on Grand Coulee Project

GRAND COULEE DAM, Wash., Aug. 22 (AP)—A federal department of justice investigation of the Grand Coulee power dam has been "sold" under way here today, reliably informed sources said.

At least one "G-man" this source said, has been at work here 10 days checking on persons believed to have received money on their part in the building of the dam for other persons.

In a signed affidavit one laborer charged he paid \$10 to another man to bid for the job.

It was emphasized that the Mason-Wash-Arkham-Kier company, holder of the construction contract, was not involved in the racket.

The National Reemployment service revealed it has suspected for some time that job "padding" was going on, but has been unable to obtain evidence enough to convict participants.

California Tar and Feather Two Men and Trounce Three Others

SANTA ROSE, Calif., Aug. 22 (AP)—Vigilantes operating amid the crack of gunfire and the burning of gas bombs, tarred and feathered two men and soundly thrashed three others here today for being "communist agitators" among fruit pickers.

Then almost as quickly as they came, entered the night riders, being nearly 400, vanished into anonymity but were said to be ready to strike again should "red" agitation resume in the rice field and orchard area.

House In Line For American Neutrality

Committee Revision Makes Mandatory Clause Of Senate Bill Temporary

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Mandatory neutrality legislation effective only until next February 29 was pressed tonight toward house action, with President Roosevelt's sanction.

Sweeping beyond traditional American policies, the temporary resolution would place a mandatory embargo on exports to belligerents, license munitions makers, authorize the president to keep America off the ships of belligent nations except at their own risk, and provide other preventative.

The president's approval was reported to have been unqualifiedly given. He had emphatically disapproved of any mandatory, permanent neutrality law before this session of congress, however, and the senate's ready acceptance of the legislation was believed to have prompted him to call last night's White House conference at which Chairman McReynolds (D-Tenn.) of the house group received his view.

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ETHIOPIA'S RULER DEFENDS ITALIANS

ADDIS ABABA, Aug. 22 (AP)—Emperor Haile Selassie, faced with severe difficulty in holding his position in Ethiopia, has threatened with death any Ethiopian who menaces or assaults an Italian, it was learned tonight.

But following upon the shooting of Baron Mussolini, an Italian count, which Ethiopian officials described as accidental while he was on a hunting trip.

Baron Falson himself tonight described the shooting as purely an accident. He was seriously injured, but attacks of cholera which he had here, where he was brought today, said they were hopeful of his recovery.

A general mobilization has not been proclaimed in Ethiopia, but concentration of troops has been reported in the Italian border.

With his American advisor, Edward Everett Gibson, at his side, Emperor Haile Selassie tonight (tensely awaited and then studied news of the action by the British cabinet, but there was no immediate comment.)

Foreign merchants here, fearing Italian aviators may drop bombs if he is shot, are hoarding supplies and goods outside the capital. Insurance against war jumped in rates tonight.

The government here ordered an inquiry to determine the circumstances of the shooting of Baron Mussolini.

The emperor was greatly disturbed by news of the British cabinet's action. He had adopted a resolution forbidding the export of arms, and had placed his main hope upon American munitions firms to supply the country's needs.

The Ethiopian army began construction today of a strategic road from Hawassa through Trencher to Addis Ababa.

Spokesman For Rome Avers Sanctions Mean War

Hostile Acts Cited

(By The Associated Press) The British cabinet in an emergency meeting Thursday decided to press for sanctions by the League of Nations against the aggressor in Italy.

Other developments in the crisis included: Rome—The authoritative newspaper Giornale d'Italia, in an editorial, urged London to take the invocation of sanctions would mean war.

Addis Ababa—Emperor Haile Selassie, ruler of Ethiopia, said that he would employ a fleet of Italian warships in the Red Sea to assist Italy.

BRITAIN BENT ON PREVENTION OF WAR

Cabinet Calls for League's Most Drastic Sanctions Against Aggressor

LONDON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Great Britain, an advised informant told The Associated Press tonight, will go to any length under the league pact to try to prevent war in Africa.

If other powers join her, she said, the necessary military and economic pressure upon the aggressor but to the use of military force in self-defense. (In other words, if all agree.)

NAZIS IMPOSE RULE OVER CONFESSIOANAL

German Priest Fined 500 Marks for Advice to Mother

BERLIN, Aug. 22 (AP)—The secret of the Catholic confessional was placed into jeopardy in Germany today when a Roman Catholic priest, Father Horoba, was fined 500 marks (about \$200) for "abuse of the confessional chair."

The state attorney at Gletwitz prosecuted the priest for allegedly attempting to dissuade a woman during a confession from sending her son into the Nazi labor service.

She afterward told her husband and he denounced the confessional as a "house of shame."

Pleading that the confessional is secret, Father Horoba—a war veteran with medals—declared himself a supporter of the present regime, but said he had orders from his bishop to see that the religious training of young men in the labor service was not neglected.

Called Clear Case
The state attorney, acting on special instructions from Franz Guertner, minister of justice, said this was a clear case of "political Catholicism."

(High German Catholic clericals are meeting now at Fulda to consider the Nazi drive against "political Catholicism." A dispatch today indicated a compromise might be sought.)

Every Catholic, the attorney asserted, should be urged to report such "gross abuse of the confessional chair, constituting a perfidious attack on the state."

The court held that "the belief of the Catholic mother that her son's fate and his duties as a spiritual adviser."

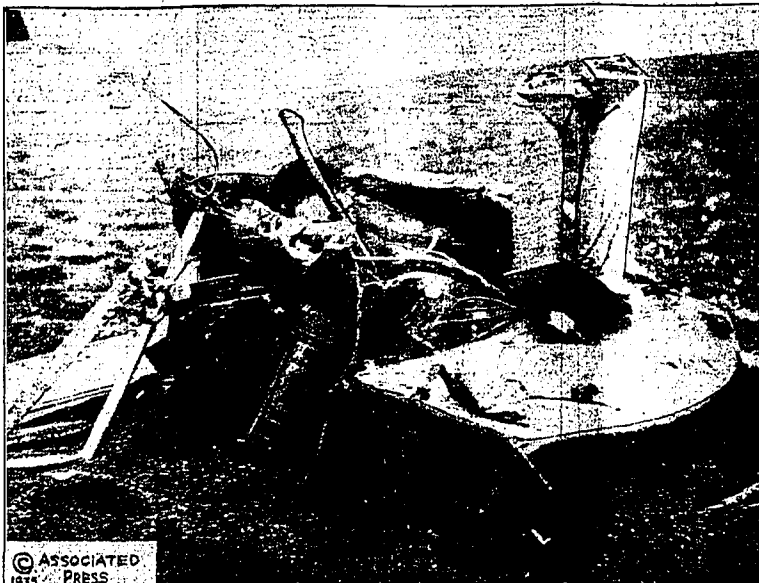

Ethiopian 'Money' Varies From Salt To Old Car Tires

ADDIS ABABA, Aug. 21 (AP)—All manner of things are used as currency in this medieval African empire, from salt to worn-out automobile tires, and a good wife will buy a wife.

As Ethiopia is cut off from the sea, she has no means of getting natural salt, and is forced to import it. The price is correspondingly high. This makes one of nature's most common gifts almost a luxury. A suit of clothes, a horse or a camel can be bought for salt.

In the barter and exchange markets almost any old thing is accepted as "money." The Associated Press correspondent saw tin cans and empty bottles being used as currency. Old tires, which makes cut up and used as soles for shoes, are eagerly sought after as "currency."

The Ethiopians, to be sure, also have regular money. This consists mostly of the old Maria Theresa silver dollar, worth normally about 50 cents.

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Three Men Indicted For Slaying Of King

AIX-EN-PROVENCE, France, Aug. 22 (AP)—Three actors in a drama that precipitated a European war were formally indicted for the slaying of King Alexander of Yugoslavia as battle clouds again hovered over the continent today.

The three, Ivan Rajich, Miro Krayj and Zvonimir Popsechil, were handed over to the criminal courts more than ten months after the crime. They will be tried on double charges of complicity in the assassination and association with known criminals.

The three Croat revolutionists, accused of aiding a Bulgarian to slay a Yugoslavian king, have been locked in solitary confinement.

Salesman to Try Manufacturing in Defunct Car Plant

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 22 (AP)—Roy S. Evans, a smiling young southerner with a record of successfully selling automobiles came north today to try his hand at manufacturing them.

Less than an hour after his bid for the bankrupt American Austin Car Company's plant at Butler, Pennsylvania, had been approved by Federal Judge R. M. Cotton, the Atlanta dealer set wheels moving to start production.

Within ten days he expects to have ready enough parts for the 10,000 Austins now running," Evans said. "Then we will begin making new cars. Within a year's time we expect to invade the foreign fields."

Evans said a group of southerners purchased the plant for \$5,000 cash, assuming a \$150,000 mortgage, \$10,000 in overdraft interest and \$35,000 in taxes. They plan to buy more than \$250,000 in new machinery.

The 33-year-old Atlanta is taking active charge of the plant, moving his headquarters temporarily to Butler. He said his first offer came from J. L. Green, a Los Angeles distributor for 4,000 cars.

The Austin plant, built in 1920, has been idle since last December.

Bergdoll Addresses Appeal To President

Houswives May Boycott Butchers But Meat Shortage Keeps Price Up

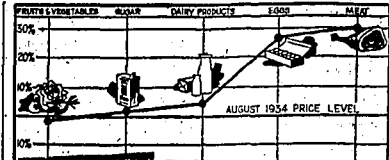
By ALEXANDER R. GEORGE WASHINGTON (AP)—The boycott of butcher shops by embittered housewives in Detroit has not the high price of pork chops and other meats back into the headlines.

Food experts say more money is spent by working-class families for meat than for any other food. So when meat prices soar, that old trope of the consumer, High Cost of Living, takes the stage.

Supplies Heavily Depleted It takes time, they point out, to rebuild supplies which were heavily depleted, particularly by the small feed crop for hogs and cattle in 1934 which resulted largely from the protracted drought.

The shortage of pork, including lard, continues particularly acute production will be only about two-thirds as large as a year ago.

More Wheat Available In a majority of other food lines, however, the buyer's outlook is a bit brighter. Supplies of food in general—and supplies largely of grain—are expected to be slightly greater than in 1934 and about equal to the average amount consumed in the years 1929-1933.

While the biggest reduction in food supplies has occurred in meat and lard, there are 7 per cent less Irish potatoes; 5 per cent less eggs; 2 per cent less milk; 3 per cent less rice; 1 per cent less canned fruit and 1 per cent less chicken meat than in 1934.

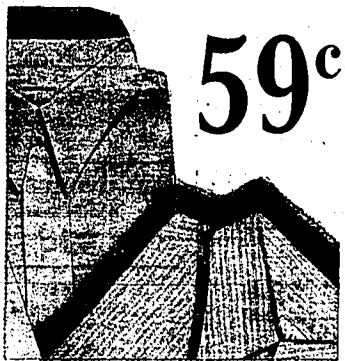

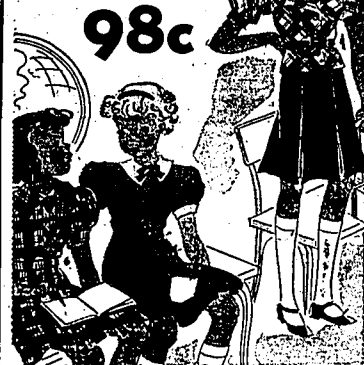
