

A LESSON

The proposal before Congress that it be forbidden to extend credit to belligerent nations in time of war shows that the United States may have learned a lesson from its experience with the last world war.
For one thing, it has been found impossible

to collect on the loans made to the Allied powers. Perhaps, as is often maintained, it is impossible that they be repaid without bringing economic troubles to both debtor and creditor; certainly the United States will never recover as much as was loaned. For another thing, the loans were directly

instrumental in drawing the United States into the conflict. They gave this nation a financial stake in the Allied cause, and made possible the commerce with the Allies that led the Germans to attack American ships. One frequently hears the assertion that

the increased trade resulting from a good war somewhere in the world would return prosperity to this country. But if that trade is based on bad credit, as all but an insigprosperity to this country. But if that trade is based on had credit, as all but an insignificant amount would necessarily be, such prosperity as it might bring would be a false and short-lived thing, leading directly to a greater depression. During the world war and subsequently, the United States prospered from selling, commodities to foreign nations, all the while loaning the money to pay for the goods and to pay the interest on former loans. Only when the depression came did we discover that instead of selling goods we had been giving them away and impoverishing ourselves.

BAD BEANS .

BAD BEANS.

Once more the warning must go out through the land: Don't try to can beans, neas, cauliflower or any non-acid vegetables by the cold-pack process. It's dangerous. Treserve your fruits with sugar, by all means. Make your catsup and tomato juice. But lay off string beans. If you have a pressure cooker and will follow directions with it, you are probably safe. If you will cook them thoroughly by the old-fashioned hot-nack method, you may be all right. Thoroughly pack method, you may be all right. Thoroughly, we said, so every inner particle of bean or pea has been raised to 212 degrees and kept there twenty minutes. But cold pack?

Nothing doing!

People have done it and lived. There weren't any botulinus germs in their neighborhood. But too many people in the last few years have eaten cold-pack vegetables and promptly died to make it worth while.

It does not pay at all to buy these vege-tables to can. Buy them to cat fresh and let the commercial canners do the rest. You'll save money as well as time and work. If you have them in your own garden, do them by steam pressure or dry them or throw them away. When you get right down to it. wouldn't it be better to discard a few dollars worth of vegetables than to take a serious chance with the lives of your family?
