U. S. NEUTRALITY RESOLUTION GOES TO WHITE HOUSE

Senate Okays House Amendments to Drastically Peace Program, 77 to 22; 'Rebuke' to Idaho Solon Discarded

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 24—Congress gave notice to the world today by word and action that America would react to unprecedented foreign aggression during any foreign war.

The decisive 77 to 2 vote by which it approved the amendment to the original neutrality proposal was capped quickly by another dramatic Senate vote which predicted the House's refusal to register what some termed an official 'rebuke' to Senator Popo (Idaho) for a statement, made in the English Chamber of Deputies, that the United States might become involved in another world war.

Popo Under Fire The decisive 77 to 2 vote by which it approved the amendment to the original neutrality proposal was capped quickly by another dramatic Senate vote which predicted the House's refusal to register what some termed an official 'rebuke' to Senator Popo (Idaho) for a statement, made in the English Chamber of Deputies, that the United States might become involved in another world war.

It also makes it unlawful for American ships to carry arms or explosives of any kind to any port of call, or to a neutral port for transportation to a warring nation.
