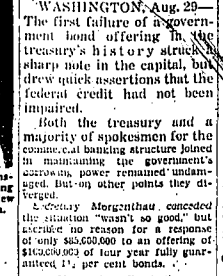

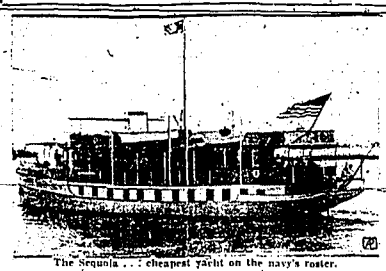

CLASSROOMS CALL IDAHO'S STUDENTS

More Than One-Fourth of State's Population in Schools

BOISE, Aug. 29 (AP)—More than one-fourth of Idaho's 450,000 residents will attend the classroom call of the state between September 1 and October 1, John W. Goodie, state superintendent of public instruction, estimated today.

One hundred twenty-five thousand children in grade and high school classes will be taught by 4,200 instructors, and 5,000 boys and girls will be in the hands of their teachers. The parks of the knowledge and wisdom of more than 400 professors who preside in the state's institutions of higher learning, including the University of Idaho, Idaho State College, Boise State College, and the Inter-mountain Institute at Weber and various parochial and other private schools in the state.

Higher Enrollment Expected Besides the students who will attend the various public institutions of higher learning, the enrollment in the Nazarene college at Nampa, the College of Idaho at Caldwell, the Boise Junior college at Boise, Oreg. college at Coalinga, the Inter-mountain institute at Weber and various parochial and other private schools in the state.

During September, also, the physically unfortunate boys and girls enrolled in the state school for the deaf and blind at Coalinga, and the Industrial school at St. Anthony will resume their studies.

"Enrollment, generally, especially in the institutions of higher learning are expected to be higher than last year," Mr. Goodie noted.

There was one detail in the national picture, he did not overlook—the turnover of teachers during the past few months.

"Many of them who know our boys and girls and the problems peculiar to our state, have resigned because of the prevailing relatively low salaries in Idaho and because of the opportunities they have had to obtain better salaries in other states," he said.
