AMERICAN FALLS, Idaho, Aug. 31.—(By The Associated Press.)—The refusal of District Judge J. E. McDougall of the Fifth judicial district to order his release on a writ of habeas corpus, Judge McDougall said he "couldn't believe the officers were guilty of framing the man by the name of Cushman."

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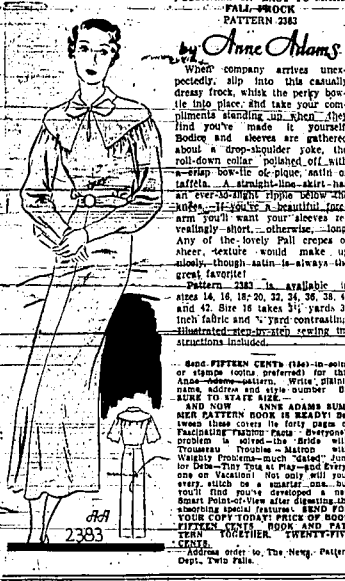

Emperor Haile Selassie, confronted with the probable loss of his realm to Italy, chose to turn over more than half of his territory to British and American interests, before losing the power to dispose of it on his own terms.

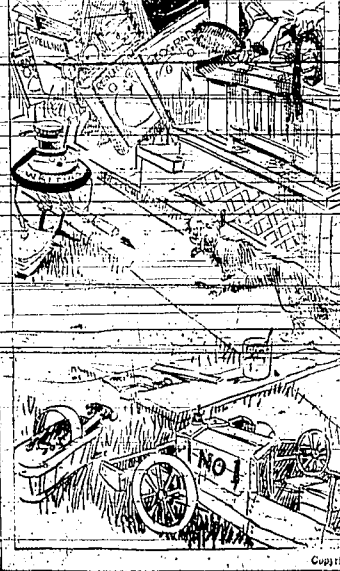

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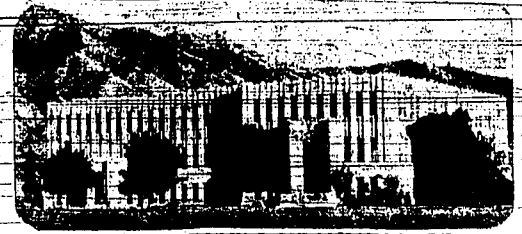

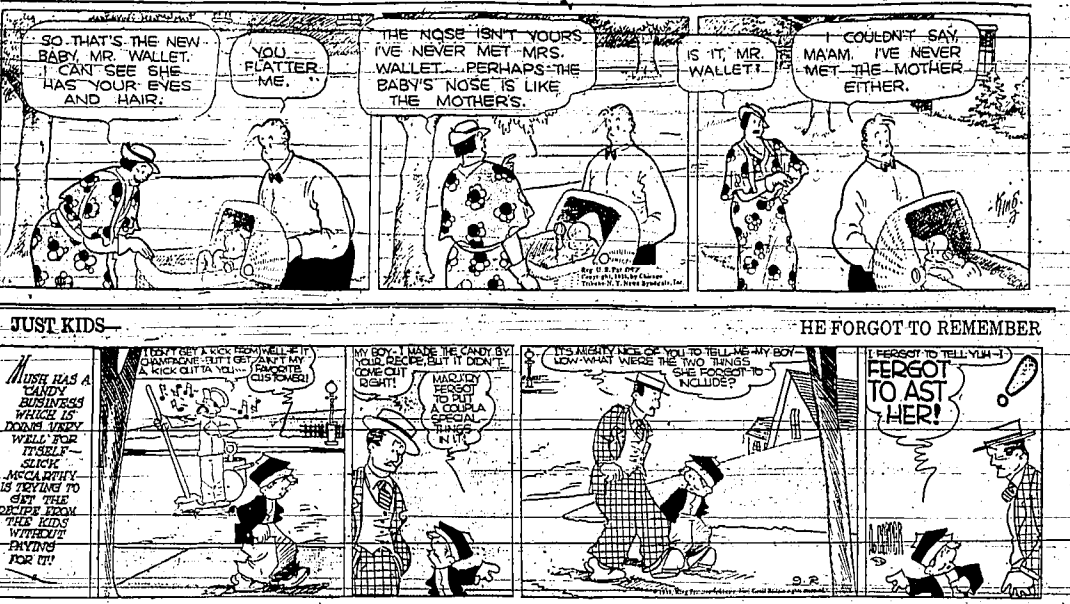

Continuing Improvement Essential to Twin Falls Growth, Expense Impels Study

The history of Twin Falls people's continued to serve the community without additional construction until the installation of the present mechanical filtration plant in 1919.

As early as 1904, investigations were made at intervals for a satisfactory, adequate source of supply for domestic water for Twin Falls. The sources considered were the Snake River, the Devils Creek, and other large springs in the Snake River canyon in the vicinity of Twin Falls.

The present Twin Falls mechanical filtration plant was constructed for a capacity of approximately nine million gallons per day, which would be sufficient for the present population, except for the fact that less than one-third of the demand from 1919 to 1929 was met during the day time hours, and the remaining 6 to 7 million gallons more than 100 per cent of the demand during the day time hours.

The great majority of water systems in existence today, for large or small communities, are being supplied from ground water sources, developed through series of wells or galleries from which, in many instances, the water is pumped hundreds of miles. Unpolluted water is essential and the cavernous water structure underlying the Twin Falls tract, makes this a problem for careful consideration.
