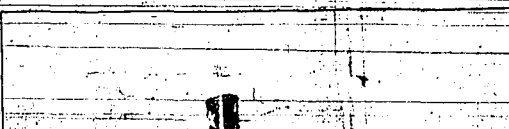

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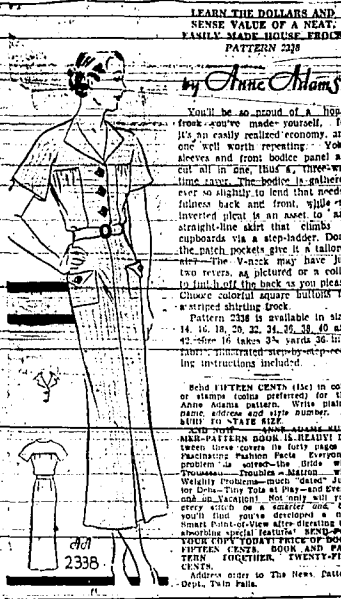

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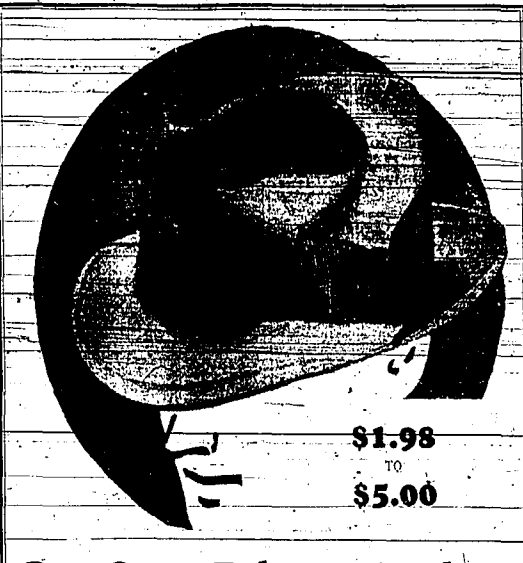

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IDAHO FARM PRICES CONTINUE DECLINE

Potato Market Slump Carries Fruit and Vegetables Down

BOISE, Sept. 5 (AP)—The general average of prices received by Idaho farmers for their products on August 15 was 20 per cent of pre-war and at this level was 2 points lower than on July 15, Richard C. Ross, federal agricultural statistician for Idaho, announced today.

On the whole, Idaho farm prices have been declining steadily since December, 1934, but are still higher than at the same time last year when the average was about 87 per cent of pre-war, he said.

Grain prices improved somewhat during the month prior to August 15, but fruit and vegetable prices declined about 30 per cent, due chiefly to the very low prices received for certain potatoes. The index of all crops rested at 89 per cent of pre-war, a decline of 8 points during the month.

The general level of livestock prices at 100 per cent was a point higher than July 15 and 23 points higher than on August 15 a year ago. The price for hogs was 100 per cent, but sheep prices were 81 per cent.

State Department Mediates for Britain, France in Senate Inquiry

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—Acting as a mediator between the Senate and the British and French governments, the state department has taken custody of a truck load of J. P. Morgan and company records.

The ledger, accounts, letters and papers of all kinds, cover financial transactions carried on by the New York banking house as fiscal agent for the two governments between 1914 and 1917, when the United States was a neutral.

The records were brought from New York to the state department today in a guarded, heavily loaded truck.

Committee investigators have access to the documents.

The plan was worked out after the two governments objected to having the records turned over to the Senate committee. They presented to the state department the view that the records of transactions carried on for the two governments were their property. As such, their representatives contended, they should be immune to seizure by a Senate committee.

After discussions with committee officials, Morgan company officials said the department would take custody of all papers and books relating to two Morgan company accounts.

These were the "British government treasury account" and "Government of France committee on government France."

TREASURY OUTLINES FEDERAL FINANCES

Seeks to Bring Budget Appropriations and New Taxes Up-to-Date

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—At President Roosevelt's direction, treasury officials were today working to speed up the revision of governmental finances. Modernization of the January budget is the light of appropriations and new taxes voted by congress as the objective.

The work was pressed by Secretary Morgenthau, studying figures for the first two months of the fiscal year, observed they were "without president's budget," as published in January, and included \$245,000,000 of "recoverable" loans.

"The more you get into it for the first two months, the better it looks," he commented, but declined to say whether he thought the government would stay within the estimates for the full year.

Long Contemplated
The revision of the budget was contemplated by the president when he sent his original figures to congress in January. It was planned to include the revised estimates of tax collections as affected by both business changes and tax legislation in the local appropriations bills.

Officials and bookkeepers of the budget bureau were busy today with the new budget ready for publication in about a fortnight.

Figures for July and August, the first two months of the 1938 fiscal year, showed total expenditures of \$1,249,000,000, receipts of \$977,000,000, a deficit of \$272,000,000 and an increase of \$331,000,000 in the national debt.

Ways Lending Activities
Morgenthau called attention to the lending activities of various agencies—\$168,000,000 loaned to the commodity credit corporation and an almost equal amount advanced to the Reconstruction corporation for a total of \$376,000,000. At the same time, he said the FVA received repayments of \$131,000,000 in excess of new loans, leaving a net of \$445,000,000 in recoverable loans for the year.

The president's January budget estimates forecast a deficit of \$1,000,000,000 for the year. On that basis, a two-month average deficit would approximate \$800,000,000. Actually, however, the \$272,000,000 deficit was computed with an estimated \$1,429,000,000.

SOVIET RANKS EIGHTH AS CUSTOMER OF U. S.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—Soviet Russia became the eighth largest foreign purchaser of United States goods last year, the state department delivered its anti-communism protest training friendly relations.

Commerce department figures showed today that Soviet purchases, totaling \$5,320,000, were more than double those of June, 1937, and more than 50 percent higher than those of 1936.

Only 10 days ago the government protested against "flagrant violations" by the Soviet of pledges against commencing trade relations with the United States.

For the first seven months of this year, however, Russia ranked only 21st among the American customers, but bought goods valued at \$15,000,000 compared with \$9,112,000 in the same period last year.

WOMAN INVESTIGATOR STUDIES LIQUOR CONTROL
BOISE, Sept. 5 (AP)—Miss Elizabeth Lane of New York City, instructor at the Hazelden Foundation liquor study committee, came to Idaho today to study the Idaho liquor control system.
