(By The Associated Press) NAMPÁ, Idaho, Sept. 10.—A complete and "effective" boycott of wool, lamb and mutton, the Idaho Wool Growers' association today was promised by the Idaho State Federation of Labor if the woolgrowers, by February 1, 1936, fail to reach an agreement with the sheep shearers' union, according to the executive committee of the labor federation, meeting here in their 20th annual convention, unanimously passed a resolution today against the practices now employed by members of the wool growers' organization, who are accused of paying shearers less than five cents per hour below the recognized shearing rate.

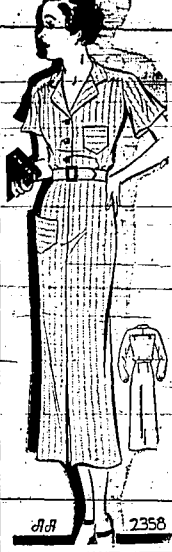
SURVEY SEARCHES FOR PINE BEETLE
