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GRAIN, SPUD CROPS UP TO FORECASTS

Spring Wheat Prospects Improve; Heavy Yields in Irrigated Areas

BOISE, Sept. 15 (AP)—The September 1 crop report indicates that grain, hay crops, potatoes and most fruits are up to the forecast. Production was forecast a month ago, Richard C. Ross, federal crop statistician for Idaho, reported today.

The bean crop was the only important crop for which a material shortage in production was reported. Spring wheat prospects improved somewhat during the month and Idaho's crop is now forecast at 2,030,000 bushels. The total wheat crop is now indicated to be 1,970,000 bushels, the same as last month and barley at 8,820,000 bushels, an increase of 17,000 bushels during August. Phenological yields of irrigated grain and hay are reported to be only fair yields are being harvested at dry land crops.

The state hay crop, forecast at 2,030,000 tons, is indicated to be larger than average, though fairly short—appreciable of some of the clover hays are spotted.

Potato Forecast Unchanged

The potato forecast is the same as a month ago, or 21,780,000 bushels.

"Some growers fear frost and report damage from hot weather, shortages in irrigation water, and poor soil, but on the whole good yields and quality are promised," Ross said.

The bean crop, forecast at 1,740,000 bushels, is indicated to be a month ago due to more serious blight damage in the important Twin Falls area, and in other areas. The northern Idaho crop was reported in only fair condition due to drought.

The September 1 estimate of the nation's 1938 bean crop is 23,200,000 bushels, which is 200,000 bushels less than forecast a month ago, but 1,440,000 bushels more than the 1928-1932 five-year average.

A best crop of 200,000 tons was forecast. This compares with the total 1934 crop of 294,000 tons, and the average of 480,000 tons.

Good fruit crops were still indicated on Sept. 1. The apple crop was forecast at 4,777,000 bushels, of which 4,390,000 bushels are estimated as comprising the commercial crop.

The prune crop, now forecast at 16,480 tons, is much larger than was expected earlier in the season.

"In view of the deep concern of this government and the widespread anxiety of the American people for the maintenance of peace, it is our duty to call upon the signers of the peace pact to continue to keep their pledges to abstain from resorting to force to settle international disputes." The president's statement is a part of the peace pact ceremony in Washington, D. C., today.

Blanket Of Clouds Shrouds Northwest

A WISE MOVE

Perhaps, when announcement was made some months ago that the institution known as the Twin Falls County Fair would be resumed after a lapse of three years, there may have been some lingering doubt in the minds of a few as to the advisability of the step.

It requires but a glance at the grounds to dispel any such idea. While figures are not yet available it is altogether likely that when the gates are closed for the season it will be shown that the attendance was the greatest in the history of the Fair. Warm sunny days with just the right amount of nip in the air of evenings have contributed in considerable measure to the success of the institution but there is the added point that the public as a whole is hungry for entertainment and the Fair supplies the type most widely approved.

Programmes to date have been uniformly good. Exhibits are at least equal to those of any previous year. The races and entertainment features generally draw large crowds and the bid time Fair atmosphere pervades every nook and corner of the grounds. In point of arrangements for the care and comfort of patrons as well as the thousand and one details of operation of such an enterprise the management seems to have earned general commendation.

Twin Falls County, it appears, was wise in deciding upon a resumption of the annual County Fair.

EARNED INDIGNMENT

As a result of a riot occasioned by police effort to subdue a turbulent mob of strikers in Minneapolis, two persons not even remotely connected with the strike are killed by flying bullets.

The riot itself resulted in a list of injured amounting to upwards of a dozen, while blocks of the city were drenched with tear gas and the orderly conduct of business and industry thrown into confusion.

Strikes are apt to be like that, which is perhaps the best of all reasons why the strike as an industrial weapon should be absolutely outlawed if a means can be found of bringing this about without injustice to the interests concerned. The destruction of property, the maiming of men and women and the taking of human life should have no part in the settlement of any question arising out of the relations of employer and employee. Everybody knows there should be some better way but unhappily human ingenuity has apparently been unable to devise it.

Some strikes are justified, some are not but it is a question whether there is any justification whatever for the ends to which a majority of strikes seem to lead.

There is no better earned indignment against society than the strike and its all too frequent consequences.

FRIENDLY ARROWS

Perhaps the sport of archery has not been revived in vain. At any rate, a young white man recently shot and killed, with a bow and arrow, an owl which had already been missed by two Indians.

The successful Bowman was Donald Collier, son of the United States Indian Commissioner, who has been a group of anthropology students learning, at first hand, the culture of the Kiowa Indians.

In a shot thirty feet away. The interpreter took a tree at the bird and missed. The Indian-hoist got a bow-and-arrow from his house and shot, also in vain. Then, with solemn-Indian-courtesy, the bow and arrow were handed to the white guest who was asked if he would like to try his skill. He brought down the owl.

THE REVOLT AGAINST DEBT

Signs indicate that the American people are at last awakening to the danger of tax-creating, property-confiscating bond issues.

Five weeks ago a special election was held in Rhode Island, in which the voters were called upon to pass on a number of proposals for building public works, and carrying on other activities in the name of relief.

The "dope" missed. Rhode Island citizens voted down all but one of the measures, by heavy majorities. The measure that passed provided for direct taxation of the taxpayers with unnecessary, and expensive public works.

A short time later the voters of California met a similar crisis at the polls. Several measures which would have put that state's tax burden still farther into debt, were on the ballot.

These elections, in widely separated states, are symbols of the national trend of thought. The most menacing governmental ventures of recent years have been those which have piled debt upon debt, put government into competition with private business, increased taxes, weakened state credit and created ineffectual agencies for the purpose of raising money to create normal jobs because private industry, sole source of productive employment, is afraid to take chances in the face of confiscatory taxation, legislation and regulation.

We are drawing capital into tax-free bonds where its chief benefits accrue to our growing bureaucracy, not to the people or the state.
