Spectacular Riding Climax To Program As Fair Nears Close

Floyd Stillings, World's Champion Bronco Buster, Provides Big Thrill For Huge Crowd At Flier

FILER, Sept. 13.—Floyd Stillings of Marshfield, Oregon, winner of the world's championship bronco busting crown at Madison Square Garden in 1924, rode into his own astride a spinning load of dynamite here tonight to provide the biggest thrill yet witnessed at Twin Falls county fair and rodeo, which will complete a five-day engagement at the fairgrounds here Saturday.

Stillings captured first money in the bronco-riding with a deadlock for second place going to Nick Knight of Cody, Wyo., riding a white Arabian of Dillon, Montana.

The final day program of the fair will be featured by a diversified racing schedule in the afternoon and the rodeo finals under the footlights in the evening. The program will also contain several acts taken from the rodeo state, will get underway at 7:30 p. m. and the entertainment in the rodeo will come off at 8 o'clock.

Following the rodeo a fireworks display will be given through the courtesy of the Shell Oil company.

A crowd gathered tonight to parade the midway, with exhibits and see the riders hit the dirt at the rodeo arena.

HOPKINS NAMED TO DIRECT SIX WEEKS EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

W. H. Hopkins, Director of Ultimate Self-Liquidating Permanent Improvement Plan Under Presidential Set-Up

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. HYDE PARK, N. Y., Sept. 13.—President Roosevelt announced today a six-weeks employment campaign under W. H. Hopkins with plans for an ultimate self-liquidating permanent improvement program to be directed by Secretary Ickes.

With this demarkation the quarrel between Ickes and Hopkins over expenditures of the four-billion-dollar work relief fund seemed to be settled, at least for the time being. Hopkins is the most ardent supporter of the program.

Obviously with a thought to his declaration of recovery, the president reiterated the idea of saving and directed that in the next congress legislation be enacted establishing revolving funds to provide jobs for unemployed persons to the government.

He announced an order for a list of permanent projects to be submitted by Secretary Ickes and held down the following rules for them: They must be of nature that contribute to the nation's welfare; they must be such as can be completed within a year; they must be in a region where there are sufficient people on relief rolls to do the job, and they must meet a requirement that an average of 850 is paid in wages for each worker.

Stating he expected to regard previous legislation from the executive and "trust" re-education funds, Mr. Roosevelt also said he was calling here Jesse Jones, chairman of the National Industrial Corporation, and Morris Cato, director of rural electrification, to seek ways to give the program a boost through government loans.

More For Cities, States "While announcing intention to announce a similar program for public works to be matched by them with \$225,000,000, the president in looking ahead pointed constantly to future self-paying and permanent projects.

After the six-weeks drive by Hopkins is over, he will be back in the employment, Mr. Roosevelt said he would check upon the progress of the program and determine the situation. He apparently is counting upon private business to pick up the slack after the work is over.

Before the more permanent public works program gets going to the public, the program will be in effect.

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. ERELYN GHESTREY, Pa., Sept. 13.—The death of blonde Evelyn Hoy, Broadway torch singer, was virtually branded "suicide" today as young Henry H. Rogers, 3rd, in whose country home she died, was released on bond.

Dr. A. B. F. Davis, who performed an autopsy on the dead actress, said "every evidence pointed toward suicide," but the official report of the autopsy was not immediately made public.

Substantiating Davis' opinion, District Attorney William Parks tonight said "nothing has been discovered that would point to homicide," adding that unless new evidence is produced to the contrary, he believes there will be no grounds for building Rogers' case on any other work.

"We don't see any motive in murder," the district attorney said, "but of course we have to try to get all the facts. We discovered certain facts and we have investigated to see if there are any more. The investigation is still going on."

Opposed By France, Britain, Italy Moves Straight Ahead With Plans In East Africa

France Joins Britain In Support of League Answer Promised To Massing of British War Ships

ROME, Sept. 13.—Italy announced tonight that it would straight-ahead with her plans in East Africa and at the same time a semi-official newspaper said the country would take "answering measures" to Great Britain's concentration of a fleet in the Mediterranean.

Commenting on the speech at Geneva of Premier Pierre Laval of France, in which he supported obligations under the covenant of the League of Nations, an official French newspaper said that Premier Mussolini's plan. The cabinet will meet tomorrow.

Mrs. Esther Zuck, Hansen, received second prize, and Mrs. Charles Orin, Filer, third prize, in this classification.

It is Alma Keeser, Filer, learns to compound pills as successfully as she bakes their sugar cakes, the pharmacy department of the University of Idaho, Southern Branch, Pocatello, will be proud of the young woman pharmacist, one of these days. Miss Keeser, who won the Flour Mills special premium for cakes baked with Idaho flour, this week for Filer, and could not be reached for her prize-winning recipe.

Mrs. Ojers generously has her premium-winning cake recipe with southern Idaho home-makes. It follows:

Prize Cake
1 2/3 cup Pike's Peak flour, which has been sifted before measuring.
1/2 cup butter, scant.
1 cup sugar.
3 egg whites.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
Pinch salt.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
Sift flour and baking powder together. Beat egg whites in measuring cup, add pinch salt and 1/4 remainder of cup with water. Pour into first mixture and beat with Dover egg beater until the mixture is like whipped cream. Add baking powder and vanilla. Bake 25 to 30 minutes.
To make a cake of the size of one Mrs. Ojers exhibited at the fair, and which you undoubtedly saw, she doubled the recipe. She topped the cake with a Seven-Minute icing.
A number of other special premium prizes were presented by the Twin Falls Flour Mills to winners in the Patriotic and Kitchen divisions. The merchandise was awarded by the Idaho Department store for the winner of the most premiums in this division sent to the Filer Women's Club. The Cinderella Food Shop's prize for the most complete display of canned foods was won by the winner of the Filer Grand.

Serving Salmon In Three Ways

Salmon is rich in flavor and high in nutritive value and an addition to one of the most economical and healthful foods for there is no waste and even the lowest grades are not expensive. Here are some unusual ways to serve this popular fish.

Red Salmon Souffle
1 cup flaked red salmon
1/4 cup white sauce
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon paprika
4 egg yolks
Free the fish or bones and skin. Place the bones in a saucepan of water and boil for 10 minutes. Drain and use the broth. Sift flour and salt and mix with butter. Add liquid remaining from cooking of bones and mix to produce a cup full of liquid. To make the white sauce: Melt 1/2 tablespoon of shortening in a European. Stir in 1/2 tablespoon of flour. Slowly strain in 1/2 cup of the fish liquid. Cook in double boiler while you prepare the ingredients.
Beat together the white sauce, mustard, lemon juice, seasoning and flaked fish. When thoroughly heated remove from heat. Add the beaten egg whites. Pour into a greased baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes.
Needle and Salmon Scallop
One 6 ounce package broad noodles
2 cups salmon broken in small pieces
1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs
2 cups white rice
Boil the noodles for 8 minutes. Drain. Mix with 1/2 cup of water. Add 1/4 quart of rapidly-boiling water to which 1/2 tablespoon of salt has been added. Drain. In a well greased baking dish—7 inches in diameter and 3 inches deep place alternate layers of salmon, noodles and white sauce and repeat until the ingredients are used up. Cover with buttered bread crumbs sprinkled with paprika and bake in a hot oven for 20 minutes.
Salmon With Grapes
Drain canned salmon, separate in large pieces, dip in melted milk, roll in soft bread crumbs, fry in hot oil. Make 1/2 cup white sauce using liquor from salmon mixed with milk. Add 1 cup tiny white grapes drained and seeded.

1/2 cup celery, diced
Blend mayonnaise gently with remaining ingredients. Arrange on crisp lettuce. Garnish with additional mayonnaise, sections of hard-boiled egg and beet slices. Serves 6.
ROAST BEEF SALAD
(Sunday's Roast—Monday's Salad)
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 teaspoon horseradish-mustard
1/2 teaspoon vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash paprika
Dash white pepper
1/2 cup cooked potatoes, diced
1/2 cup string beans
1/2 cup cooked roast beef, diced
Blend mayonnaise, mustard, vinegar, horseradish-mustard, paprika, salt and beef and salt together lightly. Serve on crisp lettuce with french rods and additional mayonnaise. Serves 6.

Desserts Should Top Off Menu With Dashing Style

Perhaps you've been in the habit of alighting your desserts, thinking that if you've spent a lot of time and thought on the preparation of the first courses of your menu a dessert carefully prepared and plated, as well, was too much trouble. That's really a mistake, for it's the dessert that's served first, you know, and it's particularly delectable, it's apt to remain in the memory, clearing even a commonplace dinner to surprising heights. The reverse is true—if your dessert is ordinary and uninteresting it is apt to tone down the recollection of a meal—whereas perfect. Here are some desserts that should top off any menu in style.

CHOCOLATE SOUFFLE
Melt 1/2 cup of grated chocolate in 1/2 cup of water, do not allow to boil; cool. Separate the yolks and whites of 3 eggs. To the yolks add 3 tablespoons of powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon of salt and 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla. Beat to a stiff, fine froth, then pour in the cooled-chocolate. Beat the whites of eggs very stiff, fold the chocolate mixture into them and mix enough to blend the ingredients. Pipe the souffle dishes with hot water, then pour in the mixture. Beat the dishes in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven for 40 or 45 minutes. Serve with a garnish of chopped nuts and whipped cream.
MARSHMALLOW WHIPP
Put in a box 30 marshmallows, cut in pieces with the scissors. Over them pour 1 cup hot liquid (coffee, pineapple or orange juice). Stir until the marshmallows are dissolved. When cold fold in 1 cup whipped cream and serve in sherbet glasses.
FRUIT ROLL
2/3 cup dried apricot pulp
2/3 cup sugar
2 tablespoons grated orange rind
1/2 cup chopped raisins
1/2 cup chopped figs
Sprinkle cake—baked in shallow pan
Press apricots—through a sieve and measure 1/3 cup of pulp.

BISQUE TORTONI
12 almond macaroons
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
1 pint cream
Heat the macaroons enough to soften them quickly so that the cake will not break. Roll in wax paper until serving time. Slice and serve plain or with lemon or hard sauce or whipped cream.

CREAMY RICE PUDDING
1 pint milk
1/2 pint milk
2 eggs
When cool roll in wax paper until serving time. Slice and serve plain or with lemon or hard sauce or whipped cream.

Modern Magic with STRINGLESS BEANS

BEANS and the beautiful 10-1/2 very old story, but the magic made with beans has been the best of fashion. Of course, the best have had a stringy variety to enable him to digest the stringy varieties digested the fearful plant who mottled "No. 10 To Pump" the soon that laid the golden egg and the magic harp, but the stringless bean is well adapted to modern taste and the kitchen. Garnish with slices of two hard-boiled eggs. Serves 4.

Surprise in a Bun: Or you can hide away your stringless beans in some place where they are not likely to make your guests appreciate them all the more. Who would expect to find them in a bun? Here is one for instance. In bread slices as baked sugar wafers. Cut two half-teaspoonfuls of sugar, remove seeds and remove out all the stringless beans. Beat with eggs, and gather two cups soft bread crumbs, can teaspoon sage one-half-teaspoon salt, a few dried pepper and one-half cup melted butter, and add enough canned bean liquor from tea to four tablespoons to moisten. Add one cup stringless beans with salt-sauce. Bake slowly at 275 degrees—until puffed, and remove from heat to cool, and a half. Serves four.

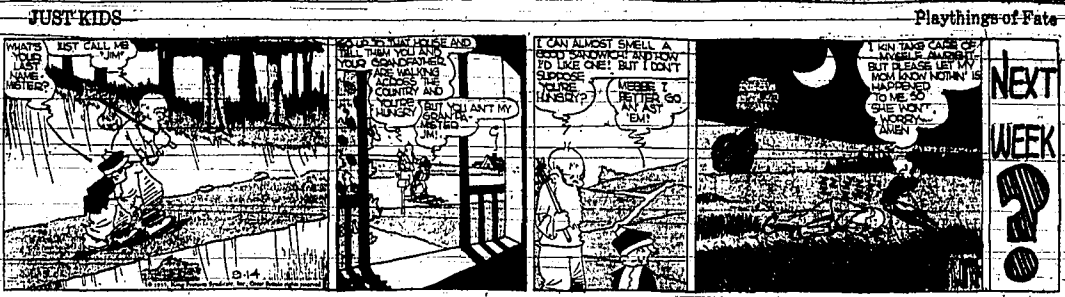

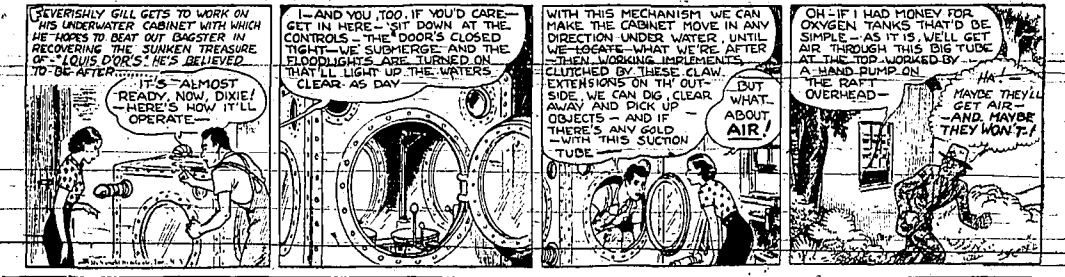

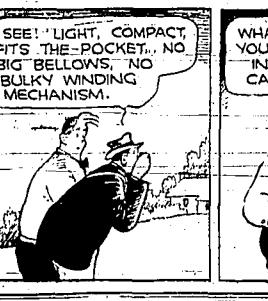
