

HIGH-SPEED 'FLYING FORT' CARRIES TWO AIRMEN TO DEATH

Designer-Pilot and Co-Pilot of Secretly Constructed 'Attack Bomber' Killed in Crash at Los Angeles

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18.—A secretly constructed monoplane, described as an "attack bomber" and capable of carrying 1,200 pounds of bombs with a cruising speed of 250 miles-an-hour, crashed late today at the municipal airport, killing its designer and co-pilot, Thomas Van Stone, 32, and the co-pilot, Donald Blue, 27.

The plane, taking off on its first test flight, fell from a height of 100 feet, instantly killing both men. Earlier in the day, after the plane had been flown from Glendale, Calif., where it was built in a locked room of the Airplane Development Corporation, Van Stone, a mechanical aviation man, had conferred behind closed doors with Van Stone regarding the ship. Officials of the company, which is a branch of the United States army air corps, one official of the company, who refused to identify himself, said the plane was to be manufactured here on a large scale for export to China and South America.

GOOD BEET YIELD

K. C. Barlow Credits Fly Resistant Seed With Changed Conditions

TWIN FALLS, Sept. 18—In an official statement issued here Tuesday, K. C. Barlow, vice president of the Idaho Beet growers association, stated that in a new distribution he established that a satisfactory yield of beets will be harvested in the lower Snake river valley for the year 1936.

This, he said, has been made possible through many contributing factors, chief among which have been the introduction and use of fly resistance seed, better cultivation methods and more favorable moisture conditions.

It now seems, he continued, that because of the satisfactory conditions of the beet industry, the farmers will want to plant more beets in 1936 than were planted in 1935. "But," he pointed out, "the beet planters planned to beets in 1936 under the AAA are limited. It is highly desirable that the 1935 beet growers and those who intend to plant beets in 1936 indicate the number of acres they would like to plant in 1936, through signing an "intention to plant" application, which will serve as a basis for the 1936 sugar beet acreage.

Some states, Mr. Barlow pointed out, have already secured the signatures of intended plantings from the growers. This procedure of securing the additional 1936 sugar beet acreage for the lower Snake river valley has the endorsement of the local sugar beet organizations, the factory district representatives, the sugar company, and others interested in the beet industry.

LAND-HUNGER

It is important, in this Ethiopian game, to keep one's eyes on the ball. The game itself is part of a general ferment working throughout the world, and the ball is the land question. The term "land" naturally implies the resources and business opportunities that go with it.

If Standard Oil interests or other American interests obtained vast land rights in the troubled realm of Ethiopia, it might be good for Ethiopia and might bring some benefit to America; but it would not solve the big problem, which is the easement of the population-pressure of Europe. It would only make that problem look more urgent.

Statements strangely ignore the big facts while they putter around with diplomatic tack-hammers. What is Italy to do? What is Germany to do? Asia is crowded except for Siberia, and Russia has it bottled up. Australia is habitable and fruitful only around the edges. America is held now for Americans. Africa is, for practical purposes, the only remaining pioneer continent.

Great Britain and Russia cannot permanently keep half the world's area bottled up for themselves. Half of Ethiopia cannot be safely bottled up for 75 years by any black monarch or any white dictator, for the use of a small economic group. Britain, France and Belgium cannot keep vast empty tracts of rich African territory, seized during the World War, bottled up by sanction of the League of Nations. Even the western hemisphere may not be held securely against Old World pressure.

Arms and legal documents do not settle things. Basic realities remain. Basic problems continue demanding solution. There can be no peace or assured prosperity in the world till they are recognized, and the first sign of such recognition would be an intelligent partition of Africa.

MORE DEATHS

Death had a bigger harvest in this country last year than the year before. There were more people, of course, but a larger proportion of them died. The deaths were eleven per thousand against ten and seven tenths per thousand in nineteen-thirty-three.

The chief cause was heart trouble and other diseases of the circulatory system. This might have been expected. Depression is hard on people's hearts. Vital statistics in the early years of the business slump may have been deceptive. The true story of this economic period, in terms of human life, is yet to be told.

That old wizenet about a postman's holiday is still valid. Fifteen thousand postmen, conventioning in Cleveland, celebrated the occasion by a good, long parade.

School is fun, too, for about three days.

Disaster always arouses nobility. (Baker, Oregon, Democrat-Herald)

The one bright side to any great natural catastrophe like the recent Florida hurricane is the fact that such a tragedy invariably does bring to light innumerable acts of individual heroism.

News stories from Florida have been full of such acts. Sailors engaged in rescue work, members of inland relief corps, doctors and coast guards and nurses and train crews and all manner of ordinary folk—all of them have shown repeatedly that the human race's fund of heroism is its capacity for self-sacrifice in times of stress, its ability to breathe.

There seems to be something about human nature that makes it appear at its best under pressure. We go along in ordinary times and witness the pettiness, the selfishness, and the innumerable little ignominious traits that all of us are forever displaying, and we begin to wonder that man is such a great shaker after all.

When something like this hurricane comes along, confronting thousands of obscure folk with pain, danger and death, and inevitably we discover that the race has deep reserves of nobility.

THE PROBLEM OF JOBS

The three, W. E. Leonard, state chemist, Lewis Williams, state commissioner of public welfare, and A. L. Klotz, bacteriologist, will arrive here today to meet with physicians, county and city officials, Mayor Duncan McD. Johnson said last evening.

To Investigate Housing
The state men are also slated to investigate housing conditions which are described as "unsanitary" along with disposal of sewage.

The mayor, in a statement yesterday, explained that the municipal water supply has anything to do with any of the typhoid cases and cited reports of Dr. Peterson, state bacteriologist, three local physicians and Miss E. LaFong, district supervisor of nurses for the I.H.R.A., as authorities for his statement.

Miss LaFong reported three cases of typhoid within the city limits and in more or less quarters of the city and stated that all cases can be traced to use of untreated ditch water or to unsanitary housing conditions.

Mussolini's Headquarters Enriched Evening, Afternoon Sees Novelty Shoe

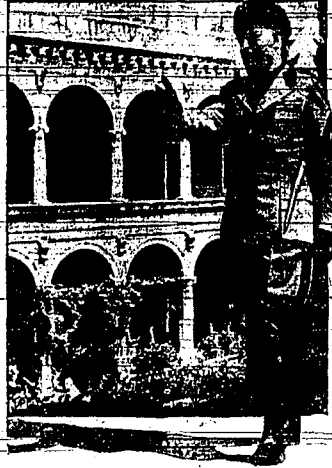
Art Bequeathed By Philadelphia Woman Adorns Rooms

BY ANDRUE BEADING HOME OF MUSSOLINI'S headquarters, the Palazzo Venezia, has become the scene of a modern ceremony with the reconstruction of another wing comprising magnificent reception rooms.

The decorations of an American woman, the late wealthy Mrs. Henrietta Wurz of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have been used to adorn it. Mrs. Wurz, long a resident in Italy and a strong admirer of Mussolini, left to Il Duce her art and antique furniture collection when she died April 3, 1933.

The remodeling of the wing is completed, but that section of the palace has not yet been thrown open to the public. A particularly brilliant occasion on which to reveal his new treasures to the official and diplomatic elite of the capital.

Despite problems arising from his Ethiopian policy, Premier Mussolini has pushed the work of reconstructing a wing of his headquarters in Rome to provide palatial reception rooms. This photograph of the interior was taken by Andrué Beading, chief of the Associated Press Bureau in Rome when he was invited to be the first visitor to the new wing.

Metamora, of German origin, was a military judge at Constantinople during the war. Eight years ago, impelled, as he says, by admiration for Mussolini, he came to Italy to live and work. He started a ceramics factory at Vietri sul Mare, near Salerno, which has become one of the biggest in Italy. Visitors to the new wing of the

palace can step onto a balcony and look down upon one of the prettiest courtyards in Rome. The Venetian police seem enough from the outside, has one of the most graceful views in its two courtyards to be found anywhere in Italy.

On the 15-centavo is a reproduction of the plate used in his books, while on the 1-centavo is a scene from the play "Bolivar" with the Alcatraz bridge and the Alcatraz of Toledo in gold.

Hauptmann, in Prison a Year, Awaits Decision on His Appeal

TRENTON (AP)—A year has passed since Bruno Richard Hauptmann's arrest, and now it is almost time for the court to decide whether to announce its decision on his appeal from the Lindbergh kidnap-slaying.

It was a warm sunny day, that September 20, 1934, when Hauptmann's arrest was announced in New York. He had been arrested two days before. The world largely considered the claim of the authorities—that the kidnaping and slaying were solved—and then turned to weigh the prisoner's chances.

Would he accept his fate, or would he fight against what appeared to be an overwhelming odds? Hauptmann chose to fight and a fighting still, striving for calmness in the death house of state prison, counting the days to mid-October when the court of errors probably will make known its decision. His case, in one aspect or another, has been in seven courts.

Lindbergh Identified Voice
Hauptmann fought from the beginning. He has indicted September 20 for extortion by the Bronx grand jury. He was based on the payment of the \$50,000 Lindbergh ransom on April 1, 1932, at 81, Haymarket square. The silent German carpenter pleaded innocence and bail of \$100,000 was set. Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, in disguise, looked Hauptmann over. He identified his voice as that of the man who took the ransom from Dr. John F. (Jaffel) Cook.

On October 8 a Hunterdon county grand jury at Flemington indicted Hauptmann on a murder charge. Governor A. Harry Moore signed extradition papers the next day and on October 10 New York's governor, Herbert Lehman, granted the request.

Hauptmann got a stay of extradition October 11, but five days later the supreme court in Bronx county ordered him extradited. He appealed. The court of errors and appeals division rejected the appeal, and that night Hauptmann was taken to Flemington.

Trial Lasted Five Weeks

He was arraigned October 24 in Flemington and pleaded innocence to the murder charge.

His trial opened January 2 and on February 13 a jury of eight men and four women convicted him of first degree murder. Supreme Court Justice Thomas W. Trenchard immediately sentenced him to die the week of March 18.

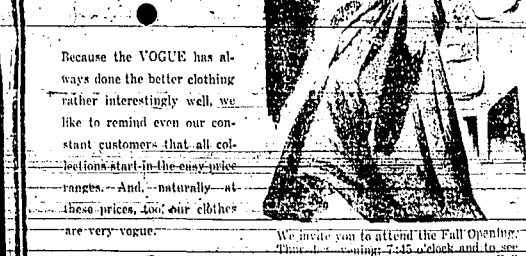
