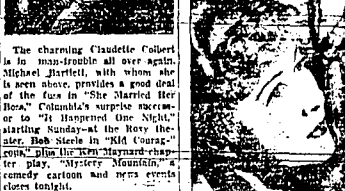

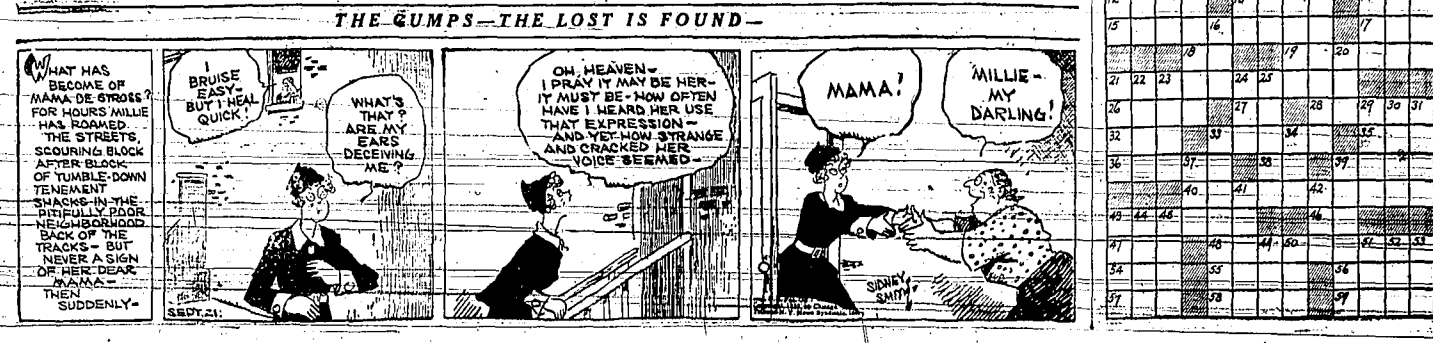

FARM COOPERATORS DISCUSS PROBLEMS AT SESSIONS HERE

State-Council Winds Up Day-Long Annual Meeting at Banquet; Board of New Officers Elected

Idaho Cooperative Council, composed of cooperative farm marketing and buying organizations, wound up an annual meeting at a banquet here last evening following a day-long business sessions and discussions of present problems and future promise for the cooperative movement in this state.

Elected president of the council for the coming year was Earl G. Sigurdson of Caldwell, president of the Western Idaho Production Credit Association. He succeeds Roy Smith of Jerome, manager of the National Cooperative Agency. John S. Feldhusen of Twin Falls, president of Idaho-Bee-Groceries Association, was elected secretary and executive manager. Earl G. Sigurdson of Boise, University of Idaho market garden specialist, was elected secretary of the council.

In addition to president and vice president, the nominating committee reports the following as members of the executive committee: Earl G. Sigurdson, president; Roy Smith, vice president; John S. Feldhusen, secretary; and Earl G. Sigurdson, treasurer.
