Twin Falls Contractor in Line for Godwin-Curry, North Side Roads

BOISE, Sept. 24 (AP)—D. J. Cavanaugh of Twin Falls offers the lowest figure for two highway projects on bids were opened by J. H. Stemmeler, director of highways.

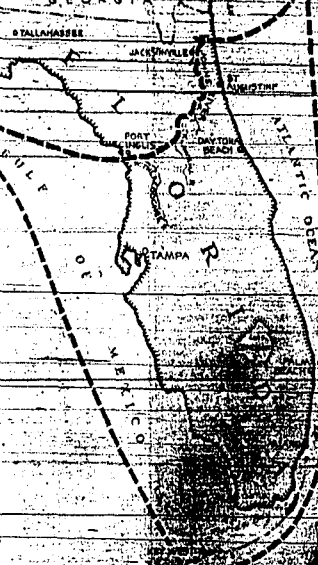

Idaho Professor Sees Climb to Higher Prices

BOISE, Sept. 24 (AP)—An inclined to believe, just by the time we get through "free-hand" spending by the federal government, further price "adjustments" will have taken place so that the cessation of spending will not affect business conditions adversely.

Dr. C. G. Craus, professor of economics in the University of Idaho school of business administration, spoke at a luncheon in the September issue of "Telephone," national telephone journal.

It is also inclined to believe that the security markets will make available further volumes of credit, a good part of which will flow into channels of consumption.

While recognizing that the above is not a ruling, price in general, due largely to the tendency toward credit expansion—Dr. Craus does not expect them to advance rapidly. "Our silver policy is not conducive to higher prices," he says. "Our gold policy is not conducive to direct influence toward higher prices."

With a slow and very irregular advance of prices—or, at least, a strong level of prices—sufficiently stable to permit a moderate supply of goods in the channels of trade, he believes that the tendency to promote social legislation of regu-

H. O. MILLNER TAKEN BY SUDDEN DEATH

First Postmaster of City Succumbs; Family Arrives for Rites

Seized with a sudden heart attack at his home, 501 Main avenue west, Harry O. Millner, ex-Twin Falls first postmaster and brother of Charles Millner, died unexpectedly yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. At his bedside when he died was his wife, Mrs. Julia Childs Millner, who came with him to Twin Falls in 1904, among the earliest pioneers of the project.

Family Arrives John O. Millner, a son, member of the WPA staff, arrived from Pocatello yesterday afternoon. Brought from Los Angeles, his two daughters, Mrs. Mary C. Smith and Mrs. Ruth A. Conley, will arrive today. Funeral arrangements are in abeyance pending their arrival.

For the past several years Mr. Millner owned and operated the Millner ranch on Falls avenue, north of Twin Falls. In the early days of this community he established and operated the first lumber yard known as the Millner Lumber Company in 1902, the same to Millner and during the construction of the camp conducted a saw house. The family moved to Twin Falls in 1904.

Mr. Millner was born March 20, 1866, at Lancaster, Wisconsin. He married Julia Childs at Atlantic, Iowa, October 8, 1890.
