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BUSINESS BOOM AT BURLEY PREDICTED

Many New Buildings Erected as Plans Continue for More

BURLEY, Sept. 25—Things are looking up in Burley. Considerable activity in business lines and building is being shown, evidenced by recent transactions and those contemplated in the near future.

Actual construction work is in progress on the rerouting of U. S. 30 north highway directly through Main street west, rather than a jog south four blocks down Crestview avenue, as at present. This has caused various business interests, predominantly all the downtown, to secure locations on that section of the new boulevard to run west from Overland avenue.

Company Reels Location
Owners of the Arcadia dance hall have been approached by a large company to construct with a probable lease or sale. A committee of the Eka lodge has been appointed to investigate the feasibility of purchasing the two-story building, now occupied by it and the Palm Garden dancing pavilion. It is thought that to prevent the Eka purchase is made, the lower floor will be leased to one of Burley's leading motor companies. The building, a two-story brick, is directly across the street from the Thrift theatre on west Main street.

New Recreation Hall
According to President of the church, a new recreation hall will be built here shortly at a cost of approximately \$10,000. Construction work on which he said will probably begin within the next sixty days. The site "partly arranged for" he said, is across the street west of the tabernacle, but this is subject to change, since no definite deal has yet been made for the ground.

A new all-Italia mill is already under construction south of the stock yards by William C. Fioer and Jim Peterson. John Burgess has well under construction a large addition to his apartment building in the center of the city near the Christian church. A new court house is in the offing.

Pool Hall Moved
The Dido pool hall has already moved into new quarters in the Washington hotel building and work is now in progress in the building formerly occupied by the Dido pool hall. It is thought a new cafe to be operated by Mrs. Madie Burroughs.

The Burley Hardware company will of necessity have to seek new quarters between now and the first of the year, following the purchase by L. S. Shantz of the building formerly owned by it for the local Safeway store. George Burroughs, owner of the hardware concern, which is one of Burley's pioneer business enterprises, is also the owner of several choice lots near the new federal building. Speculation has been made a business home, although he had made no definite announcement concerning the location out of the city at the present time.

IDAHO IN LINE FOR \$20,000,000 GRANT

State WPA Administrator Lays Plans for New Works Projects

BOISE, Sept. 25 (AP)—With \$20,000,000 already promised by the works program administration for projects in Idaho, J. T. Wood, state WPA administrator, today outlined a limited plan for works projects which will, when finished, cost an estimated total of \$20,000,000, the sum asked for from the federal government.

In a round-figure breakdown of the WPA funds, Wood pointed out that the state highway program will cost approximately \$4,000,000, and the water program, which includes projects such as dam and irrigation projects will be allocated an estimated total of \$17,000,000.

Other general programs and estimates of funds to be used are: Mine reclamation, \$1,000,000; housing, \$2,500,000; flood control, \$2,000,000; drainage, \$1,300,000; and airports, \$1,700,000.

The remainder of the money will be distributed among other projects not yet decided upon.

Preliminary Steps
Applications for approval of miscellaneous projects to total \$2,000,000 are expected to be submitted to Washington, D. C. today, Wood said.

As a preliminary step toward receiving all eligible funds, Wood said that WPA projects have already been started and will cost \$434,541.

They include reservoir projects, locating schools, building city streets, school improvements, etc., and various miscellaneous projects.

Work Relief Goal
"I was informed in Washington that we may use the money for projects which we deem worthwhile and although specific projects have been approved by the administrator, Harry L. Hopkins, we may not carry them through to completion, money on a similar project. Our only restriction in handling the funds is that we must remain within the established plan for work for which the money was intended.

The \$20,000,000 is merely a preliminary estimate and we hope to speed up the work and launch our program so that by November 1, everyone in the state who is out of work will be taken from the rolls.

"I am satisfied that the total amount of money will be given to us. If any of our requested projects are not approved, they will be those that are considered of general importance and will in no way interfere with our state work.

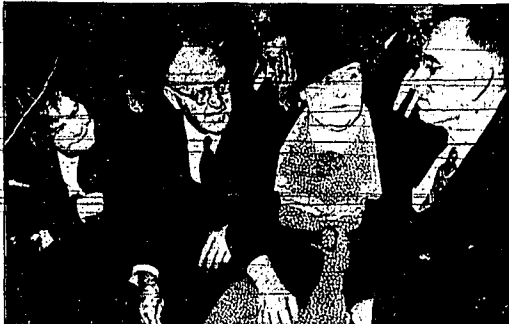

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LOWER-FREIGHT RATE ON APPLES ADVANCED

NASDAQ, Idaho, Sept. 25 (AP)—The Union of Nampa, secretary of the Idaho Shippers Traffic Association, announced tonight that the emergency freight rate on apple shipments from Idaho to middle western markets will be effective between October 1 and 31.

The advance was estimated by him at \$6 a carload or 30¢ per ton on the 1933 crop.

Baltic Sea Power Issue Revived In Capitals of Northern Europe

BY ELMER W. PETERSON
RIGA—Latvia (AP)—Reports that Russia is preparing to build up her naval strength will no loss of time, with the recent Anglo-German rapprochement as a stimulant, are already circulating in well-informed circles here.

With such reports, and with new destroyers and submarines building in German harbors, the well-founded suspicion is that the construction of Baltic sea power has been revived.

WARSAW (AP)—Former Premier Laczinski believes the naval forces of Baltic countries have no chance to counter-balance the fleet Germany is building in the Baltic.

We are appealing to the Polish people with the slogan, 'All eyes on the Baltic,' General Sikorski said in an article that added:

Germany is trying to become master of the Baltic. The Baltic is Poland away from the sea, by partitioning Lithuania, and by annexing both Estonia and Latvia so as to make the Baltic a closed sea in order to import raw materials, during a war, from Sweden, as she did in 1914 and 1918.

Food Shortage Recalled. Russia, forced to operate in a small sector and with the Gulf of Finland ice-bound three months of the year, can do no more than build defensively, it is argued.

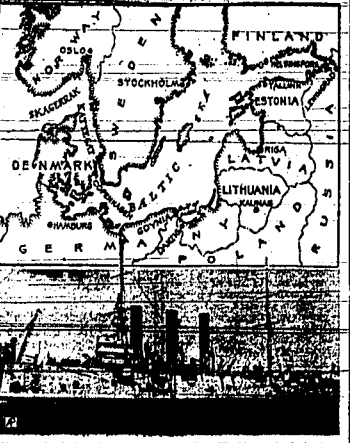
For the Baltic states in general there is an uneasy feeling that food, security and continuity of food supply, a problem caused by the disruption of the German and Russian fleets after the war, may again be subject to threat.

Each Faces Problems. For both Sweden and Denmark, it is pointed out, a problem of the future in the event of a neutral arrangement for control of the Baltic, will be the preservation of neutrality at the entrance to the Baltic.

Finland, which has the Aland Islands as a strategic defense point, is especially exposed to naval influence, and besides has memories of the food shortage caused by the allied blockade in 1918.

Latvia, likewise has been influenced through sea power and receives most of her revenue from her naval vessels from gaining control.

Latvia also saw the possibilities of sea power control in the world war, and Lithuania has its highly important port of Memel to consider.



Nations bordering the Baltic Sea, recalling World war food shortages, are discussing the Anglo-German naval agreement which the Baltic right to a fleet was reserved by Great Britain. The fleet power seen in the Baltic is the German and Russian fleets, with the Kaiser Union, Italy and France and the smaller states of the north are figuring what might happen if the fleet power of the water-lanes.

The warship is the Soviet grader "Anvers."

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BUYER ACQUITTED OF FELONY CHARGE

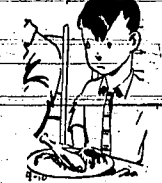
