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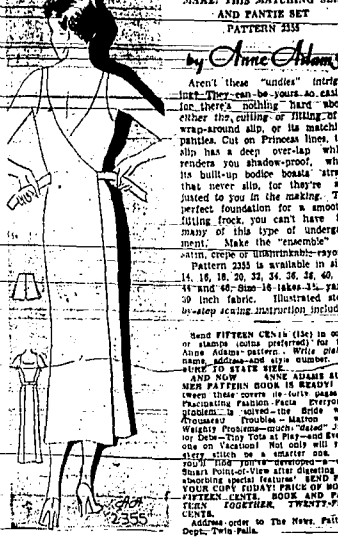

WATER IN MONTANA SOUGHT FOR IDAHO

Ross Announces Plans for \$5,000,000 Diversion From Hebgen Lake

HEBGEN, Mont., Sept. 26 (AP)—A plea by Idaho officials to divert any excess Montana water into Idaho, where it is needed for irrigation, was studied today by Gov. Frank H. Cooney, state engineer, J. S. Jones and John Tucker, PWA engineer.

The mountains gave consideration to the matter as the result of a personal appeal made by Gov. C. Ben Ross of Idaho and W. W. Paris, Idaho state engineer, and water commissioner.

Governor Ross, explaining his state's need, said the shortage of irrigation water was most acute in the Snake river valley, across the state border from Butte and county, Montana. He also revealed that Idaho has planned \$2 water storage projects to cost from 10,000 to \$20,000 each.

Dam Across Yellowstone

While details of the Idaho officials' plan as discussed at a long conference were not made public, the Idaho officials were reported as willing to build a dam across the upper end of the Yellowstone river in Montana.

The dam, they said, would be sufficient to meet all irrigation and power needs of the Yellowstone and Missoula river valleys. If this were accomplished, they estimated, there would be a surplus of water in the Madison river which might be diverted into the Yellowstone tunnel boring the continental divide.

Governor Cooney of Montana, before the conference, said that all of Montana's needs for irrigation and domestic water and for power should be met before any plan for diverting water from Montana to Idaho should be transferred to another state.

Good Deal of Problem

BOISE, Sept. 26 (AP)—Frequent water shortages on irrigation projects in the eastern and southern Idaho will be eliminated if plans to bring 800,000 acre feet of water annually from Hebgen lake in Montana to Idaho are realized, Governor Ross declared here shortly after returning from Helena, Mont., where he conferred with Governor Frank Cooney.

The plan has the approval of the Montana legislature, and the United Reclamation service will send a survey crew immediately to map the details of the project, which would require construction of a tunnel about six miles in length through the continental divide, the governor said.

The water would be diverted from Hebgen lake through the tunnel and canals a distance of 8 1/2 miles to Henry's lake on the eastern boundary of Idaho.

The work would be done under the present plan, by the United States Reclamation service at an estimated cost of \$5,000,000.

Rockefeller Arrives At 80th Milestone

LAKELWOOD, N. J., Sept. 26 (AP)—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., backed in the sun on the lawn of his country home today and probably let his thoughts drift back to the humble job, his first, he took just 80 years ago.

He was 18 when he accepted a post on September 26, 1885, as an assistant bookkeeper and office boy with a Cleveland, Ohio, production commission concern. His salary for the first three months was \$10 a month, but two months later he resigned to become a partner in a similar business, and his march to success was started.

Owner, Firemen, Forewarned, Wait For Barn to Burn

ALBANY, Ore., Sept. 26 (AP)—D. E. Neborgall knew his barn was going to burn down. So did the state fire marshal and an insurance company. They knew it, Neborgall said, 10 days ago. But nothing could be done.

Tonight the barn burst into flames which destroyed 200 tons of hay, 25 tons of grain and 100 tons of stags. Neborgall said his loss was around \$20,000, partially covered by insurance. The fire department was aided by a favorable wind, preventing the fire from spreading to nearby farm buildings.

Two days ago, Neborgall said, he detected a strange smolder odor in the large structure. Investigation showed the walls were unusually warm. Fire officials gave the verdict "spontaneous combustion." He had attempted to remove the hay and grain would merely have exacerbated the conflagration, they declared.

G. O. P. CHIEF HITS 'FORCED SCARCITY'

Party Recognition Seen of Demands of Agricultural Mid-West

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Action of Republican leaders in establishing a Chicago headquarters was viewed by one spokesman today as an indication of party recognition of demands of the agricultural middle west.

"The east realizes that it needs the west," added Harrison K. Spangler, executive committee member from Iowa, "and the west needs the east for Republican success in 1936."

Spangler gave this view in an interview after Chairman Henry F. Fletcher of the national committee disclosed that the executive committee had authorized creation of a division of Young Republican activities in the national headquarters to encourage and assist Young Republican clubs and leagues.

In an earlier formal statement, Spangler, the Iowa lawyer, said he would direct the party's Chicago activities; such activity is a policy of forced scarcity and will cause deep resentment among agricultural people, and added:

"The west has urged the arrest for raising more than five bushels of potatoes without a brain trust because you will be delivered from jail by his neighbors."

"He would never advocate executive," he continued.

Although the G. O. P. executive committee meeting closed last night, Spangler said he would give details of the Chicago headquarters with National Chairman Henry F. Fletcher.

Several Twin Falls players, however, showed promise of developing into star football performers within the next two years.

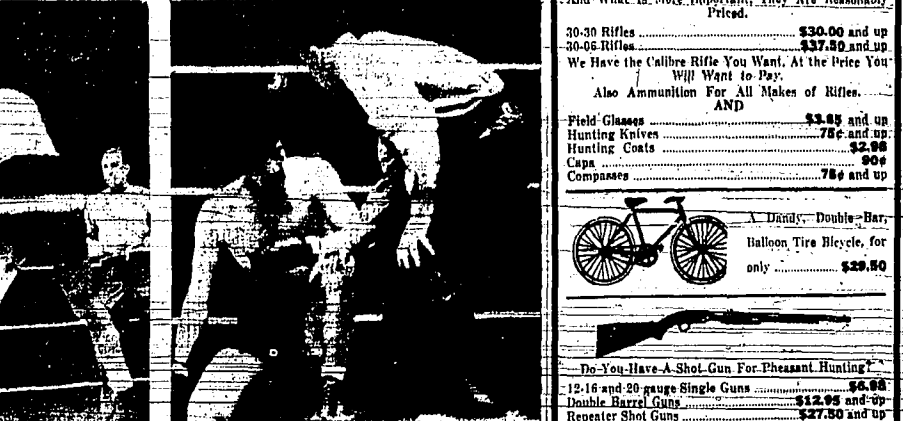

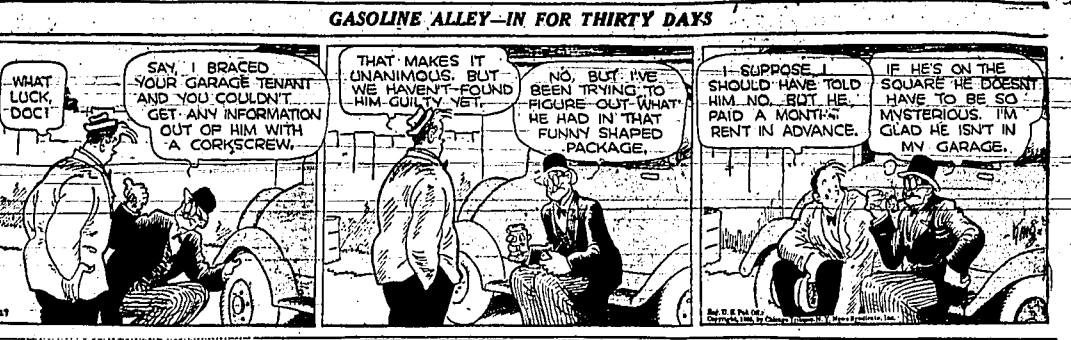
