## CUBANS EVACUATE HOMES AS SEVERE STORM APPROACHES

Hurricane Advancing From South Entering Camaguey Province; Destructive Winds Alarm Island

(By The Associated Press)—HAVANA, Sept. 27—The Behn observatory announced a few minutes before midnight that the hurricane approaching Cuba from the south was "entering Camaguey province."

The storm, moving at about 12 miles an hour, was veering slightly eastward. The center of the disturbance was situated where in the Caribbean off the southeast coast of the island, and observers said it would probably reach the eastern part of Cuba early tomorrow.

As the hurricane struck in a region estimated at more than 20 miles east of Havana, residents of the central and eastern portions of the island here hastily evacuated their homes, confounded by the uncertainty of the progress of the hurricane.

Feeling destructive winds and rain, about 50,000 men, women and children fled from the west to the east.

Reports from Behn observatory that the center of the disturbance was 150 miles directly south of Cienfuegos early tonight, that it will force probably would strike somewhere on the south coast during the early morning hours of Sunday.

Cienfuegos, on the south coast, is almost the east-west center of the island.

Gales Sweep Jamaica

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 27—Gales up to 50 miles an hour swept the island, blowing down trees and blowing away roofs.

There was no immediate report of life.

Intensive preparations against high winds were made throughout the island.

The first heavy winds were felt last night.

Rain squalls whipped the few people who remained in the streets. The wind's velocity varied from 50 miles an hour at the west coast to 40 at the eastern tip.

## Swiftly Falling Snow Traps Three Persons On Mountain Summit

Sudden Storm Catches Livestock Unprotected, Menaces Fruit and Garden Crops

(By The Associated Press)—DENVER, Colo., Sept. 27—Swiftly falling snow, muzzling the persons atop Pike's Peak, caught livestock unprotected on morning ranges, wrecked fall-planted trees, shrubs and caused concern for fruit trees and late garden truck in Colorado, Wyoming and Montana.

Freezing temperatures were general last night over Montana, snow fell until mid-morning in many parts of Colorado and Wyoming. It clogged the search for a missing airplane near Sheridan, Wyoming, where a woman and two men were found burned to death in their wrecked ship.

In the Rio Grande valley of southern Colorado potato fields lay under several inches of snow. West of the city of Durango, many trees were threatened.

Springs' Worst Storm

Similar conditions in Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo killed the wheat, broken limbs and foliage of shade trees throughout the residence sections. Park areas were closed.

Caught atop lowering Pike's Peak when the sudden, star-traited snow fell, a woman, a man and two men were trapped on a mountain summit. The woman and two men were rescued by a rescue party.

Forecasters were for more snow and rain today, with temperatures in the area tonight, warmer tomorrow.

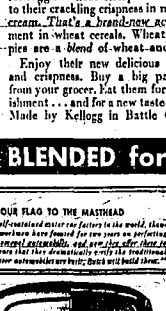

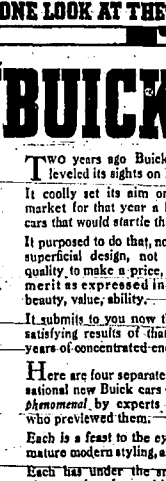

## Indian Summer Is Ideal Time to Stage Barbecue

Indian summer with all its color and beauty is an ideal time for a barbecue. The smoke from the roasting meat blends with the otherwise smoky atmosphere in a more enchanting way. Besides, a barbecue offers one more chance for an outdoor meal before winter begins.

The larger the crowd for a barbecue, the better. In fact, in the old days, when a real old-fashioned barbecue was staged, as much as a hundred pounds of beef was prepared at one time. The meat was cut into twenty-pound pieces, wrapped in at least two thicknesses of checked cloth and one of burlap, and then to be roasting over a bed of coals for ten hours or even more. That hundred pounds of beef could be counted on to serve twenty-two or three hundred people.

Open May be used. When you plan your business, you may not want to serve enough people to warrant digging a trench and pouring the meat into it. If you can't make use of your own yard, you may want to rent a room for the meat already roasted to the barbecue. In planning this barbecue, you may want to serve at least one-half pound of meat for each person to be served.

The rib section is the choice best cut for barbecuing and to facilitate carving, you may want to have this boned and rolled. The length of time of roasting depends on the size of the meat, the temperature and the degree of doneness desired. At a temperature of 325-350 degrees, 18 to 20 minutes per pound is a safe rule. While a well-done roast requires 27 to 30 minutes per pound. Due to the fact that the meat is not served immediately at the end of the cooking time, there will be a certain amount of cooking after the meat is removed from the oven. Therefore, the roasting period may be slightly shorter than the usual.

When the meat is usually served with barbecued tomato beef. A recipe follows:

- 1 large onion
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 cup catsup
- 1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 2 cups tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- Red pepper, black pepper, salt and nutmeg to taste
- Chop the onion and garlic into fine pieces. Strain the tomatoes and add an equal quantity of water. Add the other ingredients, thicken slightly if desired, and serve over roast meat.

## Flavorful Soups Start Meals Right

A dinner that starts with a flavorful, piping hot soup is a dinner that's well on the way to success. These soups are the type to win you laurels as a cook.

- CLAY CHOWDER**
- 2 cups bouillon
- 1 dozen fresh or canned clams
- 1 large lunch celery
- 1 carrot
- 1 turnip
- 1 large potato
- 1 cup tomatoes
- 5 pound bacon
- 1/2 lb. butter
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- Chop the celery, carrot, turnip and potato fine, put into a soup kettle and cover with 2 cups of bouillon water. Cook slowly until the vegetables are tender then add the bouillon. Add the strained tomatoes and bacon which has been cut into small pieces and fried to crispness. Chop the onion and fry it in the bacon fat, add flour, stir until smooth and brown and add to the above mixture gradually, stirring all the time. Add the parsley and season with salt and pepper. Chop the clams, heat them in their own liquor with one large tablespoon of butter and add just before serving.
- EAST INDIAN TOMATO SOUP**
- 4 cups bouillon
- 1 large can tomatoes
- 2 onions
- 1/2 cup cooked rice
- 1/2 cup apple
- 2 slices lean bacon
- 1/2 tablespoon granulated sugar
- 1 level tablespoon curry powder
- 2 whole cloves
- Salt and pepper
- Chop the apple and onion roughly and cook with the bacon, sugar, salt and spices, and the tomatoes in a soup kettle until reduced in a soft pulp. Strain and rub through a sieve. Add the bouillon and cooked rice and heat together.

## The WHY OF GOOD COFFEE

There is real art in the preparation of good coffee and, strange as it may seem, equal success may be attained a number of different methods of extracting this fragrant brew. The amount of success depends upon the care with which each step in every individual method is followed.

First, it is a matter of convenience to have the coffee ground to suit the method you intend to use.

Buy a brand you like and stick to it even though you may be tempted by cheaper blends. However, price is no great feature to be considered, anyway, as coffee is just as good as you can afford.

There are three methods of making coffee: the drip, percolator and boiling.

The standard measurement is 1 rounded tablespoon of coffee to each cup with an additional one-fourth cup of water.

A very simple and highly successful method for making coffee is as follows:

- Place the amount of water needed in a saucepan, and allow to come to a boil.
- Have ready the coffee "measured" into a cup and just as the water boils, throw in the coffee. Allow to boil only until the coffee is "boiled" with the water—about 10 minutes.
- Turn out the flame at once and add salt after adding a dash of cold water. Cover for a few minutes and strain into a cup, for table.

- 1 tsp. finely chopped celery
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp. catsup
- 1/2 tsp. Tabasco sauce
- 1 tsp. prepared horseradish

This is sufficient for one serving. Mix the ingredients in the order given and chill until ready to serve. Mix in the clam cocktail as directed on the label.

MUSHROOM SAUCE

- 1 tsp. prepared horseradish
- 1/2 tsp. catsup
- 1/2 tsp. Tabasco sauce

FISH COCKTAIL SAUCE

- 1/2 cup tomato catsup
- 1/2 cup of lime, strained
- 1/2 tsp. onion juice
- 1/2 tsp. prepared horseradish

Mix the ingredients together and chill well before serving. Serve over flaked fish.

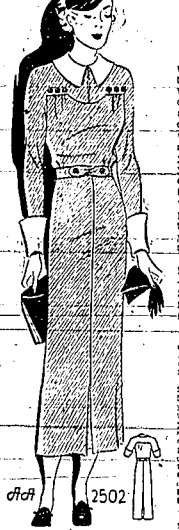
