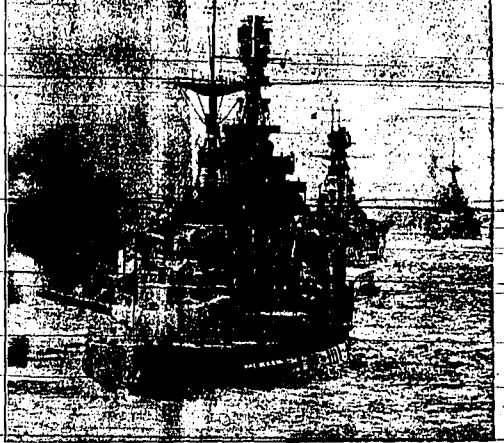

FOR ALCOHOL DEATHS, DEMANDS \$150,000

ENEMY DEFEATED IN IMAGINARY WAR

High Ranking Officers Complete Military Problem in Pacific Northwest

SEATTLE, Sept. 28 (AP)—The military problem involved in an invasion of the Pacific Northwest by a mythical foreign power was ended today with high ranking army officers.

The officers, leaders of one of the four great armies of 540,000 men each that would be mobilized in the United States in time of emergency, were on their way home tonight from the field work placed with the success of their two weeks imaginary campaign.

HEIRRESS TO SHARE MIDVANT'S FORTUNE

Former Barbara Hutton in Line for \$400,000 From Estate

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—To her share of the Woolworth fortune, the former Barbara Hutton today stands heir to \$400,000 from the estate of her former husband, Prince Alexis T. Mdivant.

The prince, who was killed in an automobile accident in Berlin August 17, left a will dividing his holdings equally among his four wives, two brothers and two sisters.

Attorneys who filed the will for probate today declined to discuss the size of the estate, but it was recalled that the Woolworth heiress recently indicated she would amount to approximately \$200,000.

Other reports have placed it as high as \$300,000.

The prince made his will on January 2, 1924, while he still was married to the American girl, who now is Countess Curt von Hugelstadt-Fremberg. They were divorced at Reno last May 15.

In addition to cash and securities, the Mdivant estate includes a valuable real estate portfolio.

After his death, the prince left to his former wife after he had paid off his honeymoon debts. Division of the prince's fortune was completed by the probate process.

While the countess has received a great fortune, for the estate, she said by Paris last month that she had "no claim to it and no intention of trying to get it back."

The brothers and sisters will share the estate with the countess. George Mdivant Sr., formerly of California; David Mdivant of Santa Monica, California; Señora Bousa-dana Serf, wife of the Spanish painter; and Marie Nina Hubertich, wife of a Paris lawyer.

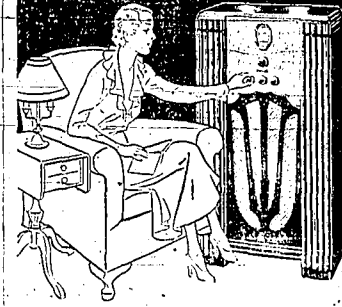

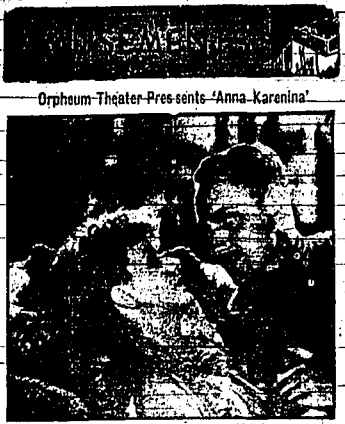

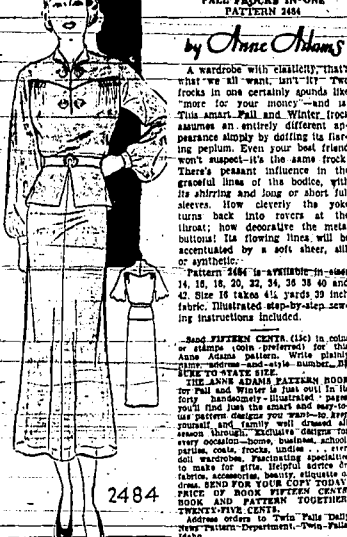

Washington's expected victory came through a sensational long run that thrilled the 16,000 spectators, coasted under a hot sun.

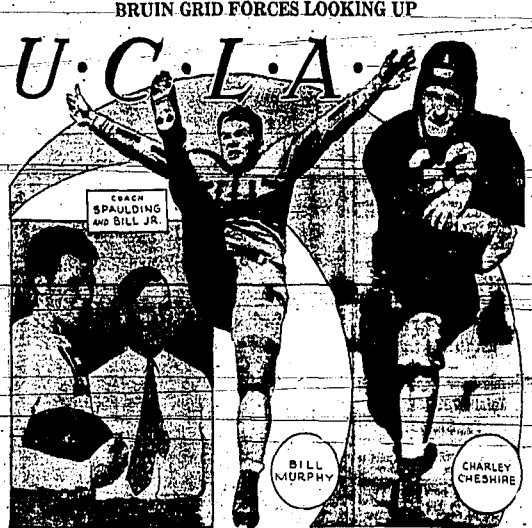

LOSS OF PROJECTS AROUSES OFFICIALS

New Deal Leaders Prepare for Wave of Protests From Communities

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—New Deal officials were all set today for a wave of protests from communities which lost expected projects under the Public Works and slum clearance phases of the relief program.

Armed state and local officials had already been deluging their senators with protests over the tentative rejection of projects they had spent a large sum in the aggregate to prepare.

Final announcement by Secretary Ickes of the 37 slum clearance and low-rent PWA housing projects which are being terminated was expected by many officials to stir "lovers" to storm protest. There were many such in Indiana. Residents had cut the housing fund from \$250,000,000 to \$100,000,000.

On the heels of the \$300,000,000 fund, land had been optioned in many cities for projects which were dropped under the curtailed program.

Return to Washington.

Even before this announcement some vacationing senators had been driven back to Washington, by their storming constituents, to prevent curtailment of the housing and public works funds.

Equal or greater as a cause of the dissatisfaction was limitation of the non-federal public works program to \$27,000,000. States and municipalities had applied for projects to cost several times that.

Curtailment of the two programs was due to figures which were approved the \$400,000 fund would not go around for the projected 3,600,000 jobs. President Roosevelt officials intended to turn the money into the Works Progress Administration field, where the money spent would go directly to jobs.

Jobs involve comparatively low expenditures for materials.

Besides announcing the 37 housing projects, Ickes also made public a list of 446 new public works developments, which have been allotted \$46,737,000.

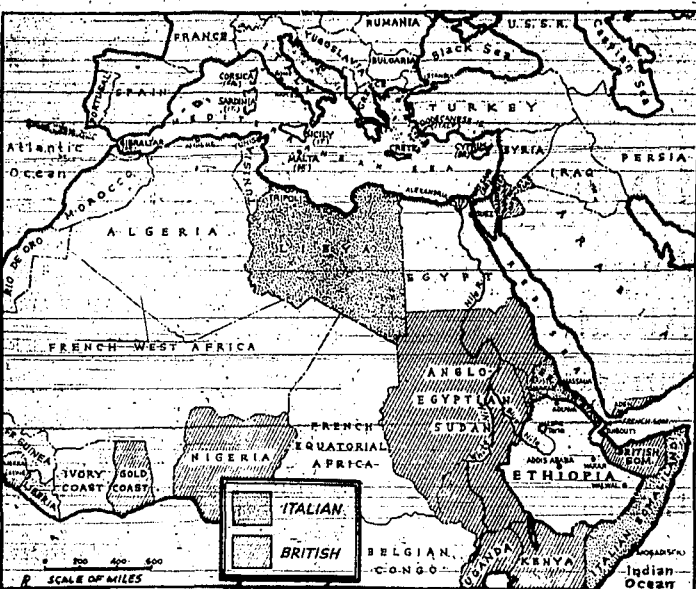
Among other things, the money is for schools, hospitals, sewer disposal plants, water works, sewer systems, municipal power and gas plants, and roads.
