Tropical Disturbance Claims Lives Of 14 Bahamans; Passengers And Crew Of Grounded Ship Transferred

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 30—(By The Associated Press.)—Blatant reports of loss of life in the Bahamas from a weekend storm which whirled out of the Caribbean were repeated tonight as the disturbance passed up Bermuda and headed toward the Atlantic shipping lanes.

Advises which told of 14 deaths in islands of the Bahamas group reached Nassau shortly after approximately 450 passengers and 260 crew members of the liner Rotterdam, grounded in the Caribbean 60 miles southeast of Kingston, Jamaica, were transferred to a recent vessel.

The deaths in the Bahamas were added to the toll of the tropical disturbance which, started in Jamaica Friday night with the loss of two lives and injured through three Cuban provinces, killing 40 and leaving hundreds homeless.

Belief Vessel Leaves

Of the Bahamas victims, 10 were reported killed in Grand Bahama and four at Cornubahn, also with property damage heavy in both localities. 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CUBS CLAM EDGE OVER DETROIT PITCHERS

'Rowe Is Right,' Says Fiery Manager Of American Leaguers

Spectacular 21-Game Winning Streak Features Sensational Work By Chicago Mound Staff

Warneke, Root, Lee And French Hold Slight Margin

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—The 21-in-a-row Chicago Cubs, one of the youngest pennant-winning teams in baseball history with an age-average of but 27 years, haven't a pitcher who ever won a world series game, but they figure to hold an edge over Mickey Cochrane's moundmen.

Up until September 4 before the Cub hurlers topped the great winning streak that has made the Tiger-pitchers, who then had cased up on their superb run, stand up as the better mound staff.

But the comparative finish to the win has been great contrast.

Pitcher of Charlie Grimm's pitchers in the 21-game winning streak has been sensational. That his mound mates were able to follow the full route in 18 out of 21 engagements. Over the spectacular streak, Grimm's mound staff has been holding the opposition to a combined average of 2.28 runs a contest, and as a result, the Cubs can't defeat the Cub 'big four,' Len Warneke, Charlie Root, Lee and French.

The Pitching Record

Before going into a man to man comparison of the mound staffs, let's check the sensational records of the Cub hurlers over their winning streak.

Three right handers, Warneke, Root and Lee, and one southpaw, French, are the pitching staff for the Cubs in the series against the Tigers. Grimm and Crowder, both teams are well equipped with pitching reserves and probably will center the relief jobs on Lou Gehrig, Roy Henshaw, Cubs, and Rosta Lewis, the rookie who pitched stoutly in the first game of the American league game this season.

Comparing them:

Warneke and Auer: Warneke, a cool workman with a lightning fast ball, is the chief reliance of the Cub staff and a hard man to beat. Auer, one of the big surprises of the season with his comeback, delivers a tricky underhand ball that undoubtedly will bother the Cubs as they "hunt" a pitcher like him in the National league. Root had earned an average of 3.51 in the season just closed.

French and Crowder: Tummy may be Cochrane's best bet. When he's right with his great curve, he's a winner. Root has pitched the range ball that made him famous years ago, but he may be Hank Greenberg's home run pitcher. Root's earned run average for the season is 3.75 to Bridges' 3.75.

Lee and Rowe: Rowe, flashing his 1934 form again, has the edge if he stays "hot." He's very thing when right. Lee throws a low, fast ball and is one of the fastest improving pitchers in baseball. Lee has three glants with a world of speed, the percentage pitching champion of the National league with 100 victories, six defeats and an earned run average of 3.89 compared to 19.13 and 7.0 for Root.

French and Crowder: Neither may be trusted with a starting assignment, but both are fine workmen. French won 17 and lost 10. French's earned run average was 3.42. Crowder's 4.7.

Hardy Cub Fans Wait In Line For Series Tickets

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—Disdainful of the risk of head colds, aching backs and bent arches more than 1000 hardy Cub fans tonight stood in line and waited for 2 1/2 hours until world series tickets go on sale tomorrow morning.

The game with the "dew" and with every hour their number increased. Young and old, men and women, some warmly dressed and some not so well handed but all good-natured, they waited for 8 o'clock tomorrow morning when money and tickets start to change hands at the Wrigley field box office.

There were two lines. One stretching from the windows where box seats and grand stand reservations will be sold. That was the long line. The other consisted of two semi-professional standers-in-line, Art Felsch, Milwaukee, and Harry P. Thomas, whose vigil will last until Friday morning.

When the sale of the \$110 baseball seats opens, Thomas probably had a monopoly on one distinction—he is a Cub fan from Detroit.

A foursome, consisting of Gus Swanson, Edwin Brummett and Peter Peterson, all of Chicago, and Robert Sinclair, Chesterton, Ind., started the line of those with \$10.00 to spend for a three-game strip of box seats tickets, or 50 for grand stand strips. They were followed by an elderly man and wife who declined to give their name.

American Golfers Win Ryder Cup

U. S. Professionals Defeat British Team, 9 to 3, at Ridgewood

RIDGEWOOD, N. J., Sept. 30.—(AP) Emphasizing that it is the "home" team always, the world's professional golf team triumphed in the United States Sunday when a band of American shotmakers defeated a British side, 9 to 3, and recaptured the \$10,000 golf international Ryder cup.

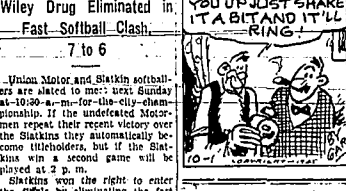
