RELIEF AGENCY IN MARKET FOR WHEAT

IERA Encounters Difficulty In Persuading Idaho Farmers to Sell

BOISE, Oct. 1 (UP)—The commodity division of the Idaho Emergency Relief Administration has been authorized to purchase and sell 125,000 bushels of wheat during October, W. W. Godfrey, director of the IERA division, announced tonight.

Originally, Idaho purchases were set at 440,000 bushels, but when 280,000 bushels had been bought and purchases could no longer be made at the 80-cent-a-bushel maximum set to the farmers, the IERA division was forced to go into Oregon and Washington in an attempt to fill the quota, Godfrey explained.

In those two states an additional 250,000 bushels were available. The quota still was short 125,000 bushels, the amount that now is to be purchased, it can be bought at not more than 80 cents a bushel net to the farmer, Godfrey explained.

Farmers are holding their wheat for higher prices, so the possibility loomed that the additional amount could not be obtained, Godfrey noted.

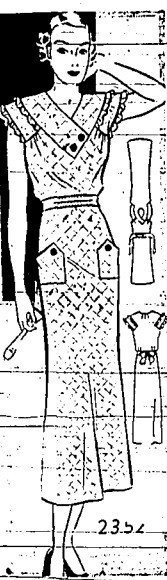
The program is being underlain by the agricultural adjustment administration in an attempt to raise the price of wheat and at the same time assist in relief work.

The maximum price which the IERA division can pay for what is fixed at Washington, D. C., Godfrey explained.

He will leave tomorrow morning for Lewiston to complete arrangements here for carrying on the purchasing program.

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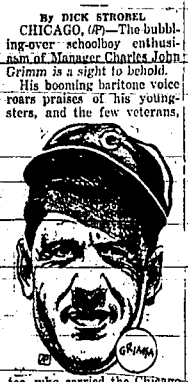

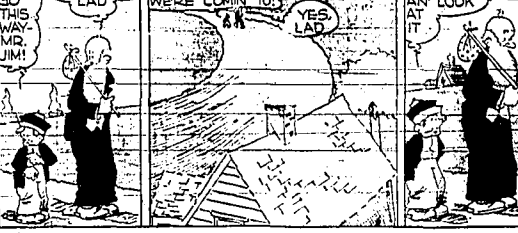

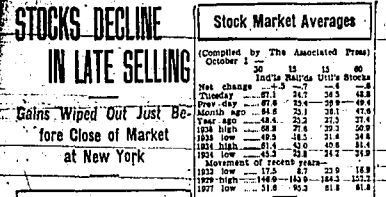
