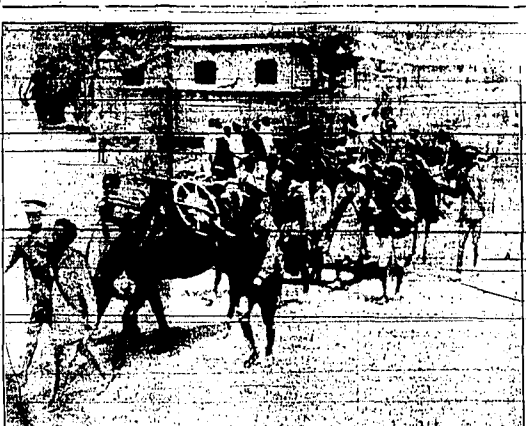

### LEGION'S ADJUTANT AT NEXT CONVENTION CITY

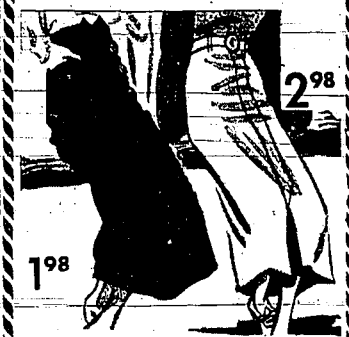

# JOHNSON CALLS FOR CENSUS OF JOBLESS

## Former Head of NRA Declares Employment Efforts Ineffective

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 3 (AP)—Declaring the unemployment situation is a "potential peril" to the "continued existence of the form of government," General Hugh S. Johnson urged last night that a census of all unemployed in the United States be immediately undertaken.

The former NRA administrator, who recently has been outspoken in his criticism of the WPA and the WPA, asserted in an address broadcast from the grounds of the California International Center that efforts to solve the problem of unemployment have not been effective.

Expressing the belief that efforts up to the present have been busy and without "team work," General Johnson suggested the census of the unemployed as a first step in a thorough approach to the problem and indicated his opinion that shorter hours and higher wages for labor must be the solution.

### "Cuddling Ourselves"

"For five years we have been kidding ourselves about this cancer in our body politics," Johnson said. "Like a sick man who puts off going to the doctor because he fears bad news, we have said 'wait long enough and it will get all right again.' We have been able to suffer the pain without proxoxym only by doing ourselves up with the dangerous opiate of spending billions of dollars that we haven't got to put to work this potential peril to the public peace and even to the continued existence of our form of government."

Formerly outstanding in the new deal administration, General Johnson spoke only a few hours after President Roosevelt had addressed a huge gathering here.

Apparently referring to the views of the president that "this country intends to remain at peace with all the world," General Johnson said:

"No president ever acted more wisely than has Franklin Roosevelt in keeping us safe from assault from the sea."

"It is of a more pressing danger than I want to talk," he added, however, saying the danger could be expressed in the few words—"ten million bread-winners without jobs."

"For at least one-third of the population," he continued, "our system is not insuring that right of bread-winning now, and more than five years it has failed to do it. That single fact is an indictment under which the term of government is 'long' is justified."

Although he stressed he does not favor riot or revolt, Johnson said:

"For slighter causes than that we revolted against British rule and suffered the bitterest war in history."
