### VICTIM OF BULLET CLINGING TO LIFE

#### George Byard of Kimberly Given Chance to Recover After Shooting

KIMBERLY, Oct. 2.—George Byard, 21, of Kimberly, who was struck by another hunter's bullet while hunting deer on Loom creek, 30 miles north of Hialeah, last Saturday, has a fair chance of recovery, according to word received here today.

A Kimberly physician, Dr. J. N. Davis, a nurse and his parents are with him at Boyle's ranch on Salmon river, where he was taken after the accident. His condition was reported to be too serious to permit of his being brought home for several days.

#### Deer Between Hunters

It was learned here today that Byard was struck by a bullet fired by Russell Anderson, who was hunting a deer that passed between him and Byard, who was resting on one elbow, eating a sandwich, about a mile away. Investigators brought a deputy sheriff from Challis and an Adams-forest-superior, found that Anderson could not have seen Byard from where he stood when shooting at the deer, which got away.

Shot through the shoulder and lung, Byard made his way alone for some distance down the hill until he met a party of hunters who took him to a good camp from which he was removed to Boyle's ranch. The bullet, fired from a 25-35 calibre rifle, lodged in Byard's arm after passing through his body.

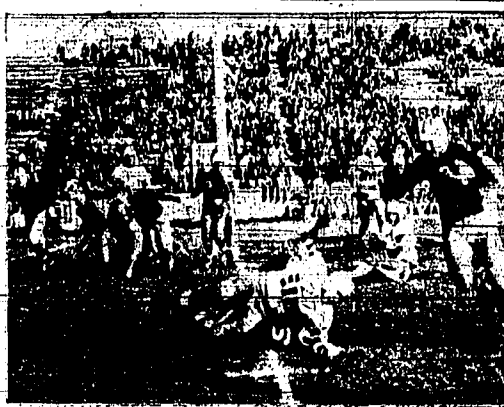

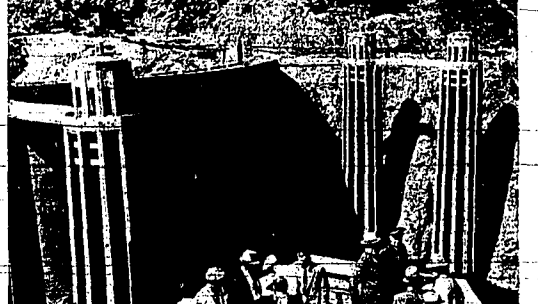
