#### A HEALTHY SIGN

There will be a good deal of quiet satis-faction over the decision of the highest court in New Jersey affirming the death sentence imposed by the trial court upon Bruno Rich-ard Hauptmann for the kidnaping and subscquent murder of the Infant son of Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh. Not primarily because of the conviction of Hauptmann but because the outcome constitutes a justification of the American system of criminal jurisprudence. The trial itself partook more of the nature of a public spectacle than anything else and it must be said that it drew well. But it was the kind of a trial which did not enhance public respect for criminal procedure and, in a sense criminal court procedure has been on trial in the public mind ever since.

The decision of the Court of Errors and Appeals should have the effect of instilling fresh confidence in the machinery of justice, in New Jersey and elsewhere. Certainly it serves notice upon all and sundry that an American jury is not apt to be misled by any auch line of factics as that indulged in by the defense in the case. The jury could not be induced to overlook the evidence ad-duced and the court of appeal was swayed not at all by the extra legal activity of the defense following the verdict of the trial

It is a healthy sign.

#### HOT POTATO


