CABINET MEMBER DEFENDS NEW DEAL

Secretary Roper Denies Attempt to Set Up Socialistic System

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Secretary Roper said tonight the new cabinet program, including the AAA, was not a socialistic system based upon tried and tested precedents.

"In radio talk he denied any 'deliberate' attempt to supplant the present democratic system with a socialistic system or that the Roosevelt administration is 'pulling rabbits out of a hat.'"

"The application of this program (new deal) to an all-embracing emergency, the secretary asserted, was not created in a category of new precedents and procedures upon which we can build with safety and stability toward a better future for all."

"The liberalist aim 'Where reactionary conservatism wishes to retain the old law and the old government, the new government affirms the wisdom and necessity of eliminating those factors which have proved unnecessary in the crucible of our national experience and of substituting new methods and mechanisms to replace the old and outworn machinery of a changing conditions. ...'

"Roper said the agricultural adjustment act 'fits both economic and legal precedent in the grain laws act and in the Packers' and Cattle laws."

"The new deal is 'substantially a continuation of the elements of previous administration, which have proved necessary and progressive in the regulation of various phases of our industrial life, while the social security laws embody the principles of laws which have been in effect for years in several states of our country, and in over 30 foreign nations."

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LEGION ASKS LABOR TO JOIN IN WAR TO STAMP OUT COMMUNISM

### PRICE OF COAL IN IDAHO UNCHANGED

#### Increase in Cost at Mines Offsets Recent Freight Rate Reduction

BOISE, Oct. 9 (AP)—Idahoans, who will buy approximately 600,000 tons of coal in the next few months, will pay about the same price for fuel this winter as they paid last spring. Z. H. Coffin, president of the Idaho State Coal Dealers' association, said today.

The freight rate reduction of 37 to 48 cents a ton announced yesterday by the Idaho Public Utilities commission will be offset by an increase in cost of about 50 cents a ton at the mines, Coffin said.

The increase at the mines was necessitated by the higher labor costs that resulted from the last national coal-miners' strike, he explained.

Most of Idaho's coal comes from Utah and is shipped to the distribution by about 475 dealers, 400 of whom are members of the association.

"Trade is not quite up to normal for this time of the year, because of the same reasons," Coffin explained, but business is good and many winter coal buyers are beginning to say in their respective areas," Coffin added.

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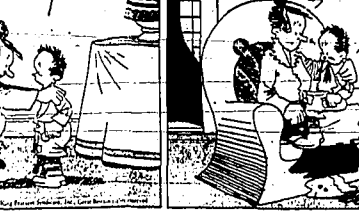
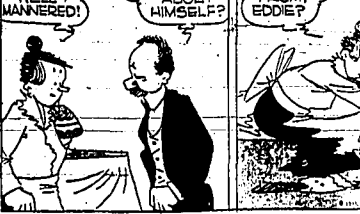

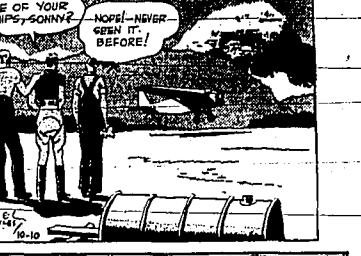

### Nebraska Huskers Tackle Gophers In Football Headliner

#### Oregon Eleven, Hailed As Possible Rival For Stanford As Coast Champion, Runs Into California Bears

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—The football campaign is only three weeks old, yet the turning point for several of the mightiest squads in the country, highly favored in pre-season predictions, looms as early as this Saturday.

There's the case of Minnesota, the mountainous Gophers rated at least on a par last fall with Alabama's Rose Bowl champions, faced all of a sudden with the tremendous task of beating Dana Bink's Nebraska Cornhuskers in the top game on the national schedule.

A. Alphonse, last of the Gopher back carrying stars who trimmed Pittsburgh in one of 1934's greatest "upsets," has been doctored, and Minnesota was an ordinary looking team beating North Dakota State in its last game. It is expected to be a list to the old powerhouse plays, many of which are being played in Minnesota's own state, with the "Big Red" halfback Lloyd Cardwell carrying the ball as a star.

The team that was labeled "TNT" because of every coach on the Pacific coast, Oregon, possibly will be the "Big Red" coast conference champion and Rose Bowl candidate, runs into the team favored to win the national title, California, conqueror of Slip Madigan's St. Mary's Gaels, 10 to 0 last Saturday. There, too, great hopes may come to a sudden end and new ambitions take jolly flight.

In the south this new power at Auburn, victor over Tulane 10 to 0, meets an unusual Tennessee eleven that took an embarrassing whipping from Carl Gray's winning North Carolina.

Another of Andy Kerr's always tricky and dangerous "Hoosiers," perhaps his best since the undefeated, untied, unscathed, uninvited eleven of 1933—except the crossroads of the "Hoosier" and Iowa's speed demon, headed by the Negro flash, Ollie Simons, and one being called Dick Crayne.

Most interesting of all the eastern "underdogs" is the climbing steadily back to football's top third, again the most powerful Pennsylvania team in years, a "wire" array that had the Princeton Tigers beaten for three quarters before losing finally 7 to 0.

The bulky machine Jim Crowley has moulded at Fordham meets its first big test in Purdue, 7-0-0 conqueror of Northwestern. Dies a new regime at Harvard comes under heavy pressure for the first time against Ivy Cross, one of the most dangerous looking squads in the east. At New York University, where Dr. Mal Everitt, former Yale head coach, is slugging the neck Carnegie Tech, unexpectedly tough for Notre Dame, brings all sorts of disquieting possibilities into the picture.

Temple, possibly the east's best this year under the veteran Pop Warner, already winner over Cornell and Texas Agra, meets another tough southern foe in Vassar and Cornell at Fairleigh Dickinson. Another match cause Louisiana State more grief in another inter-sectional struggle here, and southern California meets a "Tartar in Illinois, but the pressure is off most of the other big ones.

Notre Dame looks for little trouble with Wisconsin; Duke rates well over Clemson; and Stanford has an opponent bulge on U. C. L. A. Ohio State hasn't much to fear in Drake, the way the Buckeyes are poised.

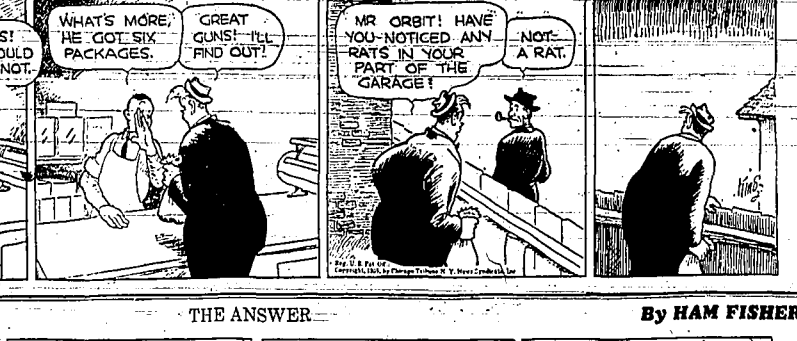

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### STABBING CHARGED MAN TELLS STORY

#### Jury Sees Scars of Wounds Attributed to Buhl Electrician

On trial on a felony charge of stabbing Jack Stewart in an altercation at Buhl last March 30, Leslie G. Nelson, Buhl electrician, testified in the district court here yesterday that he had drawn his knife when he saw a rock in Stewart's hand and that he did not remember what happened after the fight started.

A parade of character witnesses testifying that Nelson's reputation was good, started after Judge T. Bailey Lee denied a motion for a "disorderly" acquittal. Nelson's attorneys urged when the state completed the introduction of its evidence shortly before noon yesterday, the third day of the trial.

Both sides had rested when court recessed last evening until 9:30 o'clock this morning, and the jury is to receive the case after hearing attorney's final arguments and receiving the court's instructions.

#### Jury Views Scars

Nelson's attorneys yesterday prevented introduction in evidence of the scars on Stewart, allegedly were during the altercation, but prosecuting Attorney Edward Sabo succeeded in showing to the jury the scars on Stewart's shoulder and back and side where, the state charges, Nelson had slashed him with his knife.

The altercation, evidence indicated, started after Nelson attempted to start a radio at a Buhl cigar store, and Stewart allegedly refused to permit him to reach the instrument.

State's witnesses called to testify yesterday included besides Frank Stewart, Gerald Hopkins, Arthur Jones, Harry Stewart and Dr. E. L. Berry.

The list of defense witnesses included Harold R. Harvey, Frank Fisher, Jack Moss, James Cannon, Harry Bennett, Harold L. Yeaman, Andrew J. Meeks, Frank Mowbray, O. P. Duncan, A. W. Yeaman, P. F. Owens, Grant Bankhead, Mrs. Bernice Barron and George L. Jennings.

None of them had witnessed the alleged stabbing.
