# COUP SEALS DOOM OF GREEK REPUBLIC

## National Assembly Decries Return of King George From Exile

ATHENS, Oct. 10.—Greece elected her 11th assembly today in the snap election held in a swift royal coup d'état, capped by a resounding vote in the national assembly to decrie the monarchy.

Amid scenes of wild rejoicing in the national assembly building—once the royal palace—the national lawmakers decried the return of a dapper, monogamous King George II from exile in England.

Despite the approval of restoration, the assembly decided to go on with the nationwide plebiscite on the monarchy.

George II, who had fled the throne in 1924, was a swift and bloodless stroke today, was made king and will perform the duties of the throne pending his return.

In approving the new government's decree abolishing the Republic, the assembly formally re-established the constitution of 1911.

NATIONAL REPRESENTATIVES "BUDDEN," "BYO" AND "FRUDDEN" New York, Oct. 13 (AP)—The three men who were arrested for their part in the "Byo" and "Frudden" cases are being held in New York.

LEAGUE TEST This is the first big test of the League of Nations. It is the first time the present crisis with its attendant prestige, its permanence may be assured.

The League so far has been mostly an international debating society and a collector and distributor of statistics. Its severest critics will admit that along these lines it has done much useful work.

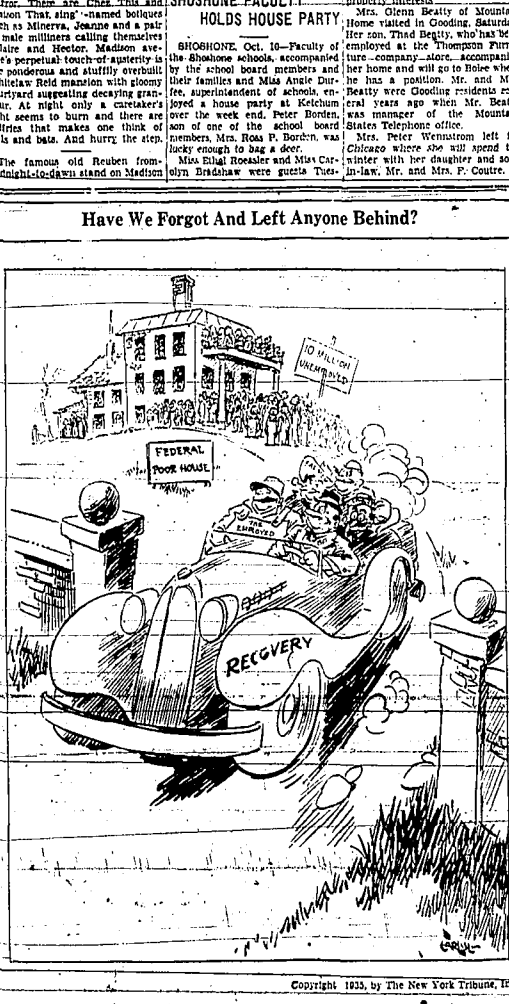

### WAR TRADE-RISKY. HULL EMPHASIZES

Secretary Stresses Business Possibilities Inherent in International Peace

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Obviously seeking to discourage trade with warring Italy and Albania, Secretary Hull today projected to America the "profitable" economic opportunities embraced in world peace.

"Such risky and temporary trade as Americans might maintain with the combatants be sought to contract promptly with the business possibilities inherent in international peace."

Then the secretary of state added, in carefully phrased language, that President Roosevelt's warning against "transactions of any character" with Italy and Albania, certainly was not intended to encourage transactions with belligerents.

"I repeat that our objective is to keep this country out of war," he said.

Hull's words, coupled with his reminder that only arms were embargoed legally, were interpreted by diplomatic observers as adding new emphasis to a course already being pursued against the combatants. They came at a time when the League of Nations prepared to enforce financial and economic sanctions against Italy.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—An increase in sugar beet production this year of nearly 1,000,000 tons over 1934 was predicted today by the agricultural crop reporting board.

The board said a probable production of 4,633,000 short tons of sugar beet was indicated by Oct. 1 reports. Last year's production was 3,640,000 short tons, and the 1933-1934 five-year average was 4,118,000 short tons.

The acreage remaining for harvest this year was estimated at about one per cent more than was harvested in 1934, and the yield per acre is expected to be approximately 10 per cent higher.
