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OHIO'S GOVERNOR CHARGES FOOTBALL SQUAD ON PAYROLL

Davey Defends \$1,266,500 Cut in University Budget Against Disruption of Bid for Gridiron Honors

By The Associated Press. COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 11.—Governor Mark Wherry today pictured football today as "the supreme purpose of higher education" and said most of the Ohio state university gridiron squad is on the state payroll.

James E. Fenwick, director of athletic publicity at the university, said 14 of the 47 members of the football squad were employed by the state. Many of them have part-time jobs. The personnel office of the state highway department said, however, one of the 14 ended his services in June, was now at Fish of Mansfield, a fullback, who had received \$45 a month as a part-time clerk in the highway department.

In a formal statement bristling with sarcasm, the governor said his latest move to prevent the nullification of winning legislative nullification of \$1,266,500 he made in his biennial appropriation.

His statement was prompted by University officials' assertion that depleted funds might force closing of the school within 10 days and the disclosure that such a shutdown might force Ohio state to abandon the hope of winning the Ten and national football honors.

L. W. St. John, director of athletic at the university, said players on the state payroll are working for the money they receive and their eligibility is not endangered.

Pettygrove Named on Committee at Boise Convention

BOISE, Oct. 11 (AP)—Fourteen prominent Idaho Republicans were chosen this afternoon to serve with Frank Burroughs of Boise, general chairman of the "grass-roots" convention here, on the resolutions committee that will report to the floor of the meeting here tomorrow.

The first district group is composed of Donald Callahan of Wallace, Tom Peasey of Lewiston, Ed Johnson of Orofino, J. W. Reed of Bonanza, Perry State Senator B. E. Whitten of Idaho City, Robert Allen of Grangeville and Carlton Allie of Coeur d'Alene.

The second district group is Nicholas Hill of Pocatello, Dr. V. E. B. Bowers of Boise, and L. E. Rockwell of Bellevue.

The convention was formally opened by Frank Burroughs, Boise, veteran Republican leader, who described the purpose of the meeting to be a general expression of state-wide national governmental affairs, and a conference on the possibility of a return to common sense in government.

He introduced the permanent chairman, former District Judge Hugh A. Baker of Rupert, who, after a brief address, attempted to win departures from the principles of American citizenship.

Plural Wife and Two Men Held After Witnesses Reveal Bizarre Beliefs of Short Creek Cultists

During the day the search for the wreckage of the plane centered in the vicinity of an oil spot on the island of Hawaii.

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Addis Ababa Receives Rumors Of Victories

Ethiopian Capital, With Communication Lines Broken, Lacks Information

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 11.—Unverified reports that Ethiopian warriors had swept down on Aduwa under cover of darkness, recapturing that epochal battle site and seizing Italian cannon, arms, and ammunition, reached this capital today.

The Ethiopian suffered heavy losses, the rumors said, but managed to take back the village, scene of an Italian military rout 39 years ago and site of the 1935-36 Italian-Ethiopian war.

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BORAH LAUNDED FOR FIGHT ON LEAGUE

Judge H. A. Baker, at Grass Roots Convention, Praised Idahoan

BOZEMAN, Oct. 11 (AP)—The 30-year-old Senator William E. Borah against American entrance into the League of Nations was related by former District Judge Hugh A. Baker of Rupert, permanent chairman of the Republican "grass-roots" convention here today, in the keynote address of the two-day session.

He announced the Democratic administration for disregard of the constitution, and voiced optimism as to the future of the Republican party.

Noting that the "league was clothed in an attractive form," he said that "the purpose was to make it impossible through the coercive influences of the national press to resist."

With the league nightmare of the World War immediately behind us, the humanitarianism of the appeal almost converted us to that cause.

Thanks to Borah "But thanks to the difference of Senator Borah and his purpose to look at substance instead of form or areas, we were saved from a commitment which would have nearly cut our job with that of Europe—a commitment which would have made us an actual enemy of the world."

"If we had gone and mine are not asked to endure the agonies, to face the perils and to face the death which was the lot of the millions of the United-States."

"The members of the United-States are to be spared the anguish they knew during the long and dreary days of the World War."

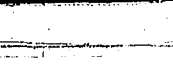

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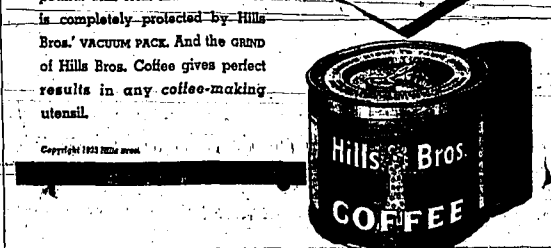
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SEASONABLE FOOD SUGGESTIONS

SERVE RAGOUT IF YOU'RE IN DOUBT

Stews in Any Language Are Welcome Variations for Autumn

In every land and language, stews are a great favorite and whether they are known as "ragout" in French, or as the typical Hungarian goulash, they hold a prominent place on the menu. Stews may be stews, yet entirely different from one another, as can be readily seen in traveling from one country to another.

The difference may be a matter of seasons, or it may be a difference in the selection of the vegetables. Look for a moment at the following recipes for stews. They are foreign recipes adapted to the seasons and vegetables available here.

When you serve "Carriou" you bring a Spanish atmosphere to the table. Cut two pounds of beef chuck into one-inch cubes. Place in a baking dish. Season five large potatoes over it, chop two onions, one tomato and one green pepper, and fry them in two tablespoons of hot fat. Add one teaspoon paprika and season. Then add three tablespoons peanut butter, and pour two cups of milk slowly, over the mixture, stirring constantly until it thickens. Add meat and potatoes, cover, and bake very slowly until done, about two hours.

French Lamb Ragout is for those who like the mingling of thyme, bay leaf and parsley. Cut two pounds of lamb shoulder—cut into one-inch cubes. Dredge these with flour. Cut six slices of bacon in quarters and cook until crisp. Brown eight small onions in the drippings. Remove them and brown the meat. Add three tablespoons flour and mix together with water. Then add the "bouquet garni" made of one stalk celery, three sprigs parsley, one bay leaf and one sprig thyme tied together, and six or eight whole cloves. Cover and let simmer for one hour, then add the browned onions, potatoes and carrots. Let cook until the vegetables are done.

Now for an "Hungarian Goulash." Cut into one-inch cubes two pounds of beef chuck, dredge with flour and season with salt and pepper and brown in hot fat. Slice six small onions over and cook until they are soft. Add one and one-quarter teaspoons paprika, four tomatoes peeled and quartered, and the neck stock or water. Cook slowly for about one hour. Add one-quarter cup barley and a little more warm water, and let cook very slowly for thirty or forty minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent burning.

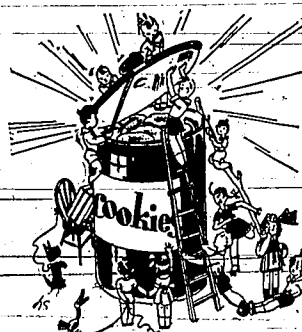
8 slices bacon (2.2 cup)
4 tablespoons chopped onions
4 tablespoons chopped green peppers
3 cups boiled rice
2 eggs tomatoes
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
Place bacon, salt and pepper in pan. Cook until edges curl up. Add and brown onions, peppers and rice. Add rest of ingredients. Simmer 10 minutes.

Stuffed Pear Salad
4 halved pears
1 cup cottage cheese
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 cup salad dressing
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos
Mix cheese, celery, 2 tablespoons of dressing, salt and pimientos. Chill. When time to serve, stuff chilled pears, serve on lettuce and top with remaining dressing.

Salad Dressing
8 egg yolks
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
1/2 cup sugar
2/3 cup vinegar
1/2 cup water
Beat yolks, add dry ingredients. Add rest of ingredients. Cook slowly, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Beat well and cool.

Pumpkin Pie Filling
1 1/2 cups pumpkin
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup dark brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
2.3 teaspoon nutmeg
2.3 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk
Mix all ingredients. Pour into

WHAT'S one of the immemorial prerogatives of childhood? So prevalent is it, in fact, that the vast cookie baking industry has been built up to keep all the cookie jars in the country comfortably full so that children can exercise that prerogative.

But, after all, it's fun to surprise them. They all know the contents of the innumerable cartons of delicious cookies that have modern inventiveness to much preparation and baking. But when they plunge their eager little fingers into a real old-fashioned cookie jar—which they know contains cookies made at home, the pleasure of originality as to the nature of their treat is added to their anticipation of something delicious.

APRICOT TARTLET
Almond Apricot Squares: Cream one-half cup shortening and one-half cup sugar; add one well-beaten egg, and then one-fourth cup apricot puree. Mix together

COCONUT BUNS: Cream one-half cup shortening and three-fourths cup sugar, add one well-beaten egg and then one-third cup canned raspberries, mashed but not strained. Mix together one and one-half cups pastry flour, one and one-half cups flour, one and one-fourth teaspoon soda and one-fourth teaspoon salt, and add one cup of coconut, one cup of raisins, one cup of currants, and one cup of nuts. Drop by small spoonfuls on a greased sheet. Bake in a moderate 350 degree oven for about ten minutes. Makes three and a half dozen cookies.

These Meat Dishes Help Food Budget

If it is difficult to stretch the food budget until the end of the month, instead of reducing the amount, try using some of the less-demanding cuts of meat. They lack neither nutritive value nor flavor, and when properly prepared make a main dish which needs no apology.

As a rule, the less-demanding cuts need long slow cooking to make them tender, and the longer they are cooked the better. If cooked in water, they should be allowed to simmer, never boil; if cooked in a casserole, the oven regulator should be set at 300 to 350 degrees, never higher except for a short time in rare cases when quick broiling is desired or for basting bologna on top of a meat pie.

Among the less-demanding cuts are beef chuck, brisket, plate, neck and Shank, shoulder of pork, and lamb shoulder, neck and ribs, as well as sundries, such as heart, kidney and liver, are also in this group, so three admissible variety "cuts" as well as in method of preparation. Directions for preparing several of the less-demanding meats are given below.

Sweet Sour Casserole of Beef
2 pounds beef chuck or brisket
1 onion sliced
1 lemon
1 bay leaf
2 tablespoons sugar
1 cup hot water
Salt and pepper
A little oil, as desired

Have the beef cut into pieces as for stew. Place in a baking dish. Add the onion, sliced very thin, and the seasoning. Sprinkle sugar and lemon juice over the top. More sugar and lemon juice is desired may be used if a more pronounced sweet-sour flavor is desired. Also oil may be added as desired.

Four hot water over all cover and let cook in a slow oven (300-350 degrees) until done, about two hours.

Braised Lamb Neck Slices
Six slices neck, 1-inch thick
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
2 eggs, beaten
2 tablespoons lard
1 cup tomato juice
Salt and pepper

Remove the bones carefully with a small sharp knife. Roll each slice into a round, cutted shape and fasten it with a skewer. Rub surface with salt and pepper, dip into beaten egg and then into fine dry bread crumbs. Let stand in refrigerator for one hour if time possible. Brown slices on both sides in hot lard, pour tomato juice over them, and let them simmer slowly on top of the stove or cook in a slow oven (300-350 degrees) until done, about one hour. Remove slices to a hot platter and thicken the liquid for gravy.

Stuffed Beef Heart
1 beef heart
1 cup bread crumbs
2 tablespoons onion juice
2 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 cup meat stock
Salt and pepper
Cayenne pepper
2 tablespoons lard

Wash the beef heart. Stuff it with a dressing made of bread crumbs seasoned with onion, salt and pepper, and a bit of cayenne pepper, and moisten with meat stock. Brown it in hot lard, add 1 cup water, and let simmer slowly until it is done, about two hours.

BOISE, Oct. 11 (AP)—Ezra F. Benson of Boise, university extension economist, announced tonight that 150 Idaho growers and shippers of potatoes to whom questionnaires recently were mailed, 75 per cent have indicated that they are in favor of some sort of federal marketing control program for their 1935 crop.

The men who were asked for their views on the question are representative dealers and growers and agents for potato growers in the state, Benson said. He completed the type of control was not indicated, but the questionnaire was sent out merely for the information of the extension service, he said.

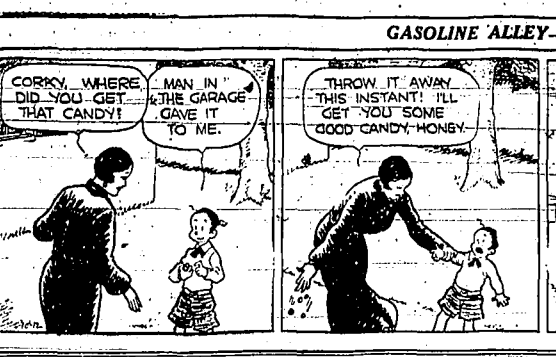
