WILLS WEAVE AS EARTHQUAKE ROCKS WESTERN MONTANA

Intermountain—College at Helena Reports \$1,000 Loss From Broken Glass And Shattered Plaster

(By The Associated Press) HELENA, Mont., Oct. 12.—An earthquake that apparently destroyed the recording instruments in the neighboring states was locally without aid of science early today by western Montana residents who jumped from their beds as walls veined and chimneys cracked.

St. Louis University's seismic apparatus registered a disturbance at 1:30 a. m. somewhere in Utah. It was probably north of the Canadian border, where University of Washington reported a tremor at 9:15 this morning.

All described the shock as "mild" but the residents of a dozen Montana towns, on both sides of the Continental divide, were from slumber shortly after midnight, were, for the moment, unable to locate the adjective.

College buildings damaged. Damage, however, was small. There was no loss of life. The city's state capital, apparently free of the shock, the state house, a few hundred yards away, estimated \$100,000 loss from broken glass and shattered plaster in one dormitory building.

"GRASS ROOTS"

A virile and healthy interest in the trend of government is manifested by the "Grass Roots" convention at Boise and an element more or less new in the councils of the Republican party is making itself apparent.

In all probability the convention will result in an infusion of new blood which cannot help but prove beneficial. Old time Republicanism may have been well enough in past years but it is going to take a different kind of tactics to establish the necessary degree of confidence to insure party victory.

Apparently there is a growing conviction that many of the features of the New Deal are bringing about a sort of surface prosperity which constitutes a mortgage on the future which some day must be paid. Yet it will not do to assume that the trend is all embracing or that it is ever likely to become poe.

AMENDING THE CONSTITUTION

Go slow with constitutional changes. Amendments to the federal Constitution should be made with regard to the far future rather than handled as emergency measures to meet temporary problems.

As a matter of fact, our amendments to the federal Constitution have usually observed this rule. Hardly any of them were adopted in a hurry except the group constituting the "Bill of Rights" that were added during Washington's administration.

WAR CRUMBS

Musolini, talking to a world audience that may have been a couple of hundred millions, was quite frank about Italy's real reason for invading Abyssinia. It was because, when Italy had joined the Allies in the World War, after much hesitation and bargaining, and had helped them win, at the peace table she got only the crumbs from the rich colonial booty.

At a recent conference of teachers, one of the most interesting remarks was made by a teacher who had just returned from a trip to the States. He had been to a school in the States where the teachers were all women.

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In the World War as a business enterprise rather than a defensive war of free peoples to preserve their freedom, Italy was cheated. Such a view, however, doesn't excuse this war against Abyssinia, which country had nothing to do with German aggression or allied promises to Italy.

The morals of the Italian position are obviously low. Yet it can not be denied that Italy has a grievance, as long as the allies who at Versailles took for themselves that rich colonial booty persist in keeping it.

The booty is mainly the German colonies in Africa assigned to Great Britain and France under "mandates." They have been treating those great rich areas as if they actually owned them instead of merely being stewards for them.

The Germans had already had the use of the Bible in their language, rising to Luther's great translation in 1534. English translations of portions of the Bible, a labor for which he was to be jailed and, in 1536, to be executed. 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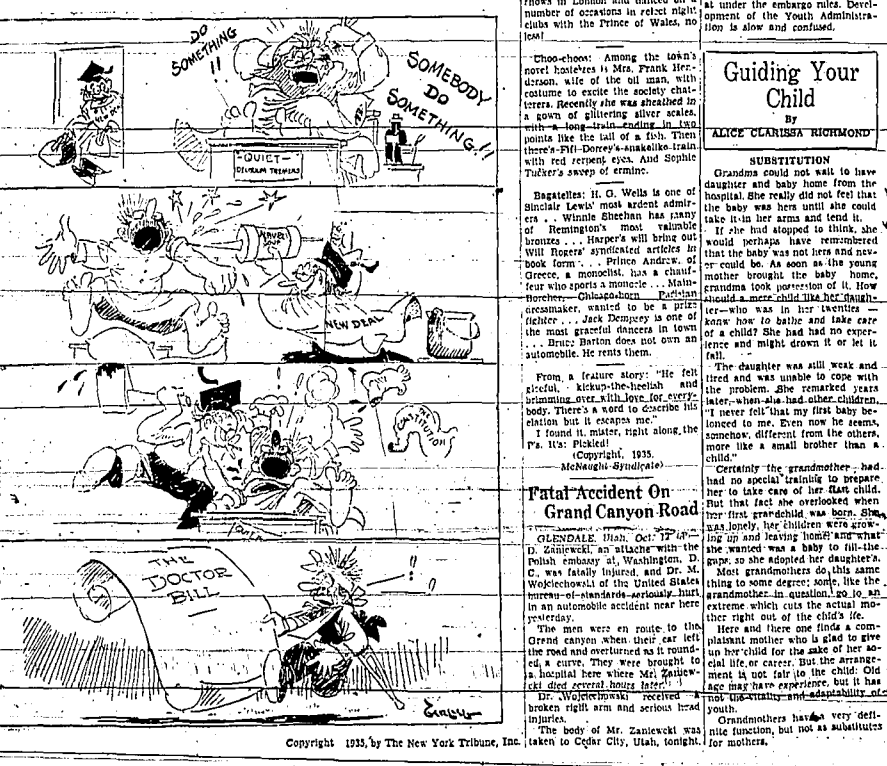

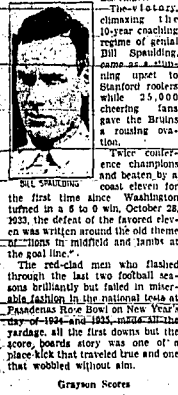

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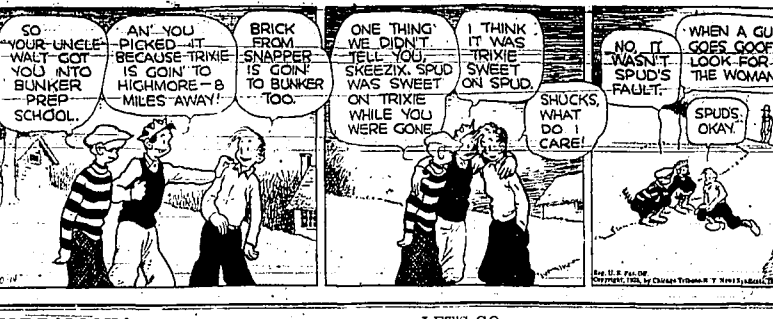
