### MICHIGAN'S TAX ON CHAIN-STORES UPHELD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The validity of the Michigan chain store tax was in effect upheld today by the supreme court.

At the request of counsel of all parties to the controversy, the court dismissed an appeal by the Smith company and 20 other corporations and 15 individuals challenging the tax.

No explanation was offered of the reason for the dismissal. The Michigan supreme court had sustained the graduated annual license tax on chain stores running from \$10 each store in excess of one, when not more than three are operated under the same ownership of control, to \$250 for each store in excess of 25.

DEBTS

Debts are comparatively easy to acquire in private as well as in public life but it is a mistake to lose sight of the fact that debts have to be repaid with interest. The national debt of the United States is considerably in excess of thirty-billion dollars, the highest in the history of the country and in excess by seven or eight billion of the sum owed by America at the conclusion of the World War.

The "grass roots" convention which adjourned Saturday night at Boise, therefore calls attention to a very necessary reform in government when it warned against any increase in the country's national debt. Apart altogether from any question as to the necessity throughout the worst years of the depression of raising more and ever more Federal funds as a means of restoring prosperity, it should be apparent that the wholesale spending of borrowed money can help the situation only temporarily.

Unemployment has not been materially reduced, price levels, particularly in agricultural lines have not moved upwards. New taxes have been assessed and must be still further increased. The country's "overhead" is probably greater today than would have been supposed possible just a few years ago.

AMERICAN "SANCTIONS"

British diplomats seem to have been sounding out the United States government on the question of helping to apply League of Nations "sanctions" to Italy. This is, punitive or restrictive measures meant to deter Italy from her war on Abyssinia. Our government, while friendly to Abyssinia and critical of Italian procedure, can not join in any such move. America will hardly try to apply any pressure not authorized in the Kellogg Pact, or in other treaties which both Italy and America have signed.

Any other course would be perilous at a time when the fires of war are threatening the world again. We have our national responsibilities and other nations have theirs. One of our duties if the rest should embolden themselves again, would be to preserve our independence and our resources so as to be able to pick up and put together the pieces of a wrecked civilization when the war ended.

In any event, the United States, having repudiated the Versailles treaty, can not make itself responsible for maintaining the status quo set up by the treaty. This is especially true regarding the German and "Austrian colonies" disposed of by assigning them under "mandates" to allied powers, chiefly Britain and France. It is largely for lack of what she considered a fair share of those territories that Italy is now trying to seize Abyssinian territory. America can hardly go farther than suggesting a new deal with regard to those lands and their raw materials, as a timely contribution to world peace.

IN MARK TWAIN'S HONOR

The centenary of Mark Twain has been observed all through this year in many ways and places in this country and in foreign lands. Probably no other American writer

has been so widely known or his works so widely read and honored. The National Mark Twain Centennial Committee now asks the governors of the forty eight states to designate November 1 as Mark Twain Day, to be observed in all public schools. Here is the best way for the schools to do their part.

Let every school child of America who hasn't already made the acquaintance of Tom Sawyer, Huck-Finn—the Prince and the Pauper, and other Mark Twain characters be introduced right now. Once brought together, Mark and the kids will get along all right without any formal help from committees, teachers or parents.

ITALY IS JUSTLY PEEVED

Italy has a perfect right to feel aggrieved. She has gone ahead with a pro-peace and visionary campaign to make Italy something better than a second-rate world power. She has watched other more important nations show that she was to be taken for granted without getting into anything except trouble that comes with taking something away from somebody else.

Now that Italy has followed the pattern set for her by other ambitious nations, she finds herself plunged right up against Article XV and Article XVI of the League of Nations covenant. Just as she is right to feel contemptuous at the League of Nations, so she is turning against her without any provocation. Italy saw, not so many years ago, Poland carve out a slice of Lithuania and keep it as a necessary bulwark against Russia. She saw Japan walk in and nip Russia for a slice of Manchuria and she saw the United States take in the Grand Canal and make a lovely province, and give her access to a seaport which she didn't have before. To all of these the League of Nations was politely agitated, but nothing more. The league felt hurt that blood should be spilled, turned its head so its stomach would be soothed. This was all.

Now Italy, seeing how other nations operate, decides that Ethiopia would be a nice place in which Italy could play the same game. And suddenly the league of nations (after Italy has gone so far in East Africa she can't back out except to "lose face" and "lose it" in a big way) comes to life, says Italy is "an aggressor" and goes to it to cut off all economic relations with her. My, even will put into action more drastic reprisals. But all this, readers in North America, is just how the league of nations operates. There's no precedent for it. There's no unanimity of thought or action. It's a matter of force or impetuosity. It's an impromptu exert about Latvia and Poland mandatories. Those that did care about China would rather have had Japanese in charge than Chinese. Paraguay and Bolivia were just South American names. But Ethiopia—that sounded like control of the headwaters of the Nile. It sounded like a power in the East Africa that might make a power in the British Empire of the empire. It might mean trouble for French Somaliland. The Red sea might be changed, economically, politically and geographically.

This was something, Italy therefore, becomes the league's first real goal. And she has a right to protest just as loudly and just as indignantly.

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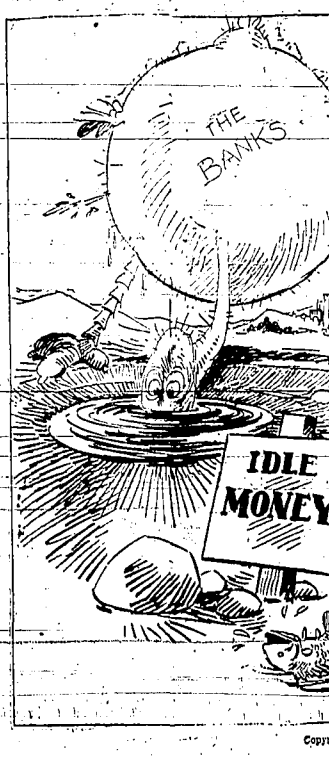

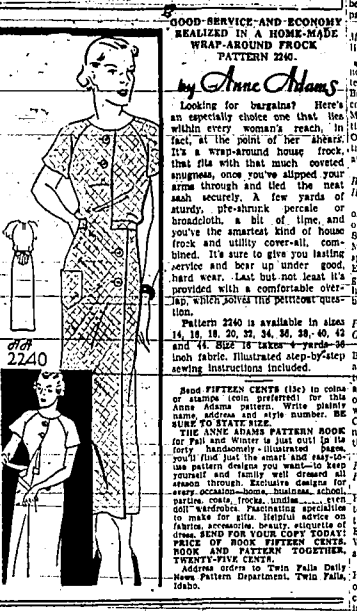

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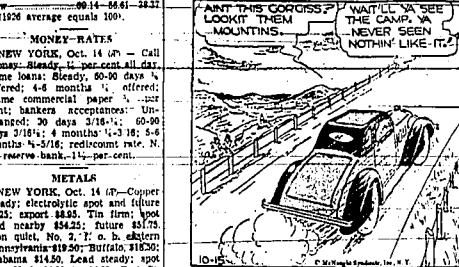
