Arizona Militia Commander Orders Constant Watch on Airports as Apprehension Spreads on Border

(By The Associated Press) MAGDALENA, Mexico, Oct. 15 (AP)—Aeroplane raid spread through the border district today because of the potential menace of rebel Mexican raiders.

BRITAIN-PARADES FLEET FOR EGYPT

Demonstration of Seapower League of Nations' Action Strikes at Mussolini's Military Power

(Copyright, 1935, Associated Press) ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Oct. 15 (AP)—Near Admiral Sir William Fisher, sea dictator of Egypt's fleet of battleships directed today the biggest naval maneuvers yet held off the shores of this ancient kingdom, as Egyptian politicians and military strategists pointed against being tied to Great Britain's apron strings.

The maneuvers were held off the coast between Alexandria and Port Said, at the north end of the Suez canal, in an area which naval experts said would be Italy's first objective in case of closing of the canal.

"We believed the men of war would put back into port Friday, but this apparently was based only on the fact that previous summer British maneuvers had also closed that day."

(The British government has declined to conform to suggestions in the French press that the fleet be divided into two, the first and similar requests from Italy. London observers said there was no reason to believe the fleet should not remain in the Mediterranean as long as Europe is quiet.)

Italy Faces Shortage Of War Materials

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, Oct. 15 (AP)—League of Nations agents today assumed a form designed by League leaders tonight to strike a mortal blow at the capacity of Premier Mussolini to make war. A League of Nations' economic subcommittee, mapping the first stage of an economic boycott, began to draw up a list of essential key products which League countries will be asked to deny Italy.

League leaders said they believed in an embargo upon their exports to Italy is really water-tight, the effects on Italy's capacity to continue the war will soon be seen. The list includes such things as zinc, aluminum, manganese, lead, iron, ore, tungsten, and nickel.

Several delegations present from important countries who are not members of the League of Nations urged the committee to actually put into force. This committee is anxious concerning the policy to be pursued by the United States, Germany, Japan and Brazil.

While the economic sub-committee was at work, another group met to plan the placing of financial sanctions against Italy, approved by the committee.

Fascist Legions Advance on Both Ethiopian Fronts

Haile Selassie Gathers Forces for Holy War Against Invaders on North and South

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 15 (AP)—Fascist legions advanced on both Ethiopian fronts under the cover of aerial bombardments or scouting flights today and the League of Nations moved toward economic sanctions to choke off the African warzone.

A tense situation on two continents saw a huge British fleet hold maneuvers off the shores of Alexandria, near the mouth of the Suez canal.

Italian airplanes commanded by Count Galeazzo Ciano, son-in-law of Premier Mussolini, bombed Ethiopian troop detachments at the key city of Makale on the northern front, where the left wing of the Italian army advanced from the north—press dispatched by the north—press dispatched by the north—press dispatched by the north.

Harar Falls to Italians—The Fascist flyers were reported to have destroyed an ammunition dump near the town of Asmara. Frightened by the sudden appearance of Il Duce's air squadrons, a population of the important southern city of Harar fled in panic to the hills when the planes flew overhead.

An American military missionary said he had treated a soldier—presumably an Italian—who had been severely injured but, he considered either explosive or dum-bull. Italy Ready for Fight in Europe—League of Nations Spokesman Dismisses Offers of Terms to Halt War

ROME, Oct. 15 (AP)—Italian government spokesmen said today that Italy would keep her course in Africa regardless of League of Nations sanctions and would fight "even a European war" if compulsory. These declarations, in which the spokesman, however, declined to predict war in Europe—came after the League of Nations spokesman said that Italy's capacity to continue the war will soon be seen.

LONDON, Oct. 15 (AP)—The claim that "surrender" of Ras Haile Selassie Gugga, Emperor of Ethiopia, by the second Italian army corps under General Pietro Badoglio, and in which Italian war correspondents in the Sudan, South Africa, Ethiopia, and elsewhere reported the surrender of Ethiopian Christians and their tribes.

Rome halted the "cordeal reception" which Emperor Haile Selassie reported officials of the Coptic Christian church at Aksum as indicating a definite split between Emperor Haile Selassie and the Ethiopian church. Official spokesmen here appeared confident "the rest of the world" would eventually come to the Italian side.

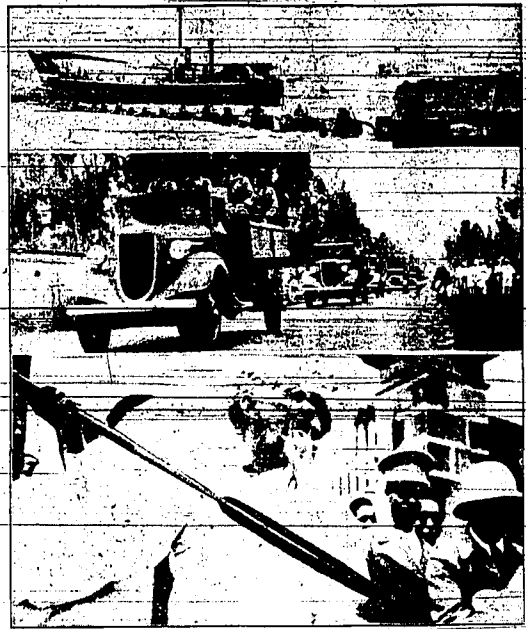

RED CROSS ACCEPTS TWIN FALLS CHAPTER

In accord with the spirit of the Treaty of Geneva the International Committee of the Red Cross, immediately on the outbreak of hostilities, made inquiry whether the assistance of their sister societies was desired by the Italian Red Cross and the Ethiopian Red Cross in the care of their sick and wounded. Mrs. D. L. Alexander, chairman of the Twin Falls chapter, American Red Cross, announced: "The Italian Red Cross will be expressing sincere thanks and great appreciation for the generous and fraternal offer of aid has informed the international committee that the means of relief at its disposal are sufficient for eventualities in East Africa and that it does not require assistance from other Red Cross societies. Ethiopia Needs Aid. The Ethiopian Red Cross has responded stating that it is in need of assistance and that there is a lack of essential supplies and material for the care of their sufferers. The American Red Cross, therefore, will receive from the Ethiopian Red Cross contributions of funds which may be used in whatever way may be found most effective for assisting the Ethiopian Red Cross in its relief work growing out of the present hostilities. The American Red Cross does not contemplate sending American personnel to the zone of operations. Due to the great difficulties of transportation and the fact that only the most carefully selected and specially packed materials can be used, the American Red Cross is able to accept contributions only in the form of funds. Contributions may be made to the local chapter or sent direct to National Headquarters, Washington, D. C., Branch Office, San Francisco, California, and each contribution should be clearly designated for assistance to the Ethiopian Red Cross."

Then it urges people to make the indicated repairs and improvements to avert these hazards. Human forethought is to be stressed, too. People will be reminded of the perils of toys left on floors or stairs to be stumbled over in the dark, and of tubs filled with scalding water in rooms where toddlers may fall into them.

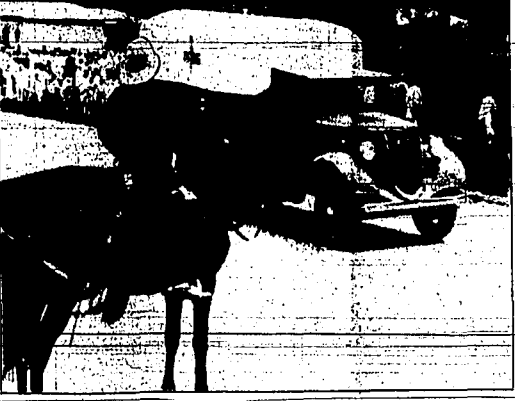

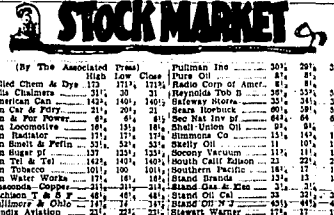
