## FRAZIER FORECASTS VICTORY FOR BORAH

Idahoan Could Be Elected  
President if Nominated,  
Solon Declares

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Frazier talk of Borah for president on the Republican ticket mingled today with word of plan and endeavor to ward a third party movement.

Senator Frazier (R-IND.) said that the veteran Idaho Republican senator could be elected president if nominated by the party. Regarding the nomination, however, he added: "But it is doubtful because I assume the convention will be controlled about as usual."

Plans for a series of lectures advocating a new party were disclosed by Frazier in a speech at the Amity (N.W.)—chairman of the Commonwealth Federation.

As a result of a Chicago meeting several months ago of groups interested in a third party movement, the Commonwealth Federation and organizations affiliated with it will arrange for the meetings. A 1936 convention already has been agreed upon.

Frazier told newsmen he thought Borah would run.

"He could be elected, because he is very popular, particularly through out the west and middle west," he said. "And even many old guard Republicans—realists—I think, they are going to have to have a liberal if they don't have a liberal."

At a running mate, he said Col. Theodore Roosevelt had been mentioned.

## DENMARK SUGAR CROP INCREASES 14 PER CENT

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Denmark's 1935-36 beet sugar crop, harvesting of which is in full swing, is forecast at 22,000 long tons, raw sugar value, as contrasted with 19,000 tons produced last season, an increase of 13,000 tons or over 14 per cent, according to European statistics received by Lamson's Statistical department.

While this season's sugar beet crop of 100,000 acres approximate the same beet acreage as last year, it is noted that Denmark suffered from one of the severest frosts in its history last year, caused by an extended drought.

Consumption of sugar in Denmark approximately 185,000 tons annually according to Lamson's Statistical department.

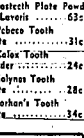

## HIGHWAY HOUSING PROGRAM LAUNCHED

Federal-Belief Agencies Begin Moving Funds to Payrolls

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Two of the work relief programs now being moved by the federal highway division and the bureau of public roads today started transferring their share of the \$400,000,000 appropriation from the treasury to payrolls.

Thomas H. MacDonald, federal civil engineer, announced that \$12,274,750 of the \$400,000,000 allocated for highway construction and grade raising elimination had been made available by approval of the federal public roads engineers.

These projects including highway work in states—Arizona, Arkansas, California, and Colorado, and grade raising construction in 27 states, now are being started without President Roosevelt's formal approval. The state was told how much it would receive, but specific projects had to be submitted.

### New Projects Approved

Consistently the president's approval of projects in six states and the District of Columbia, totaling \$8,828,487, was announced by MacDonald.

Shoreline of state highway commissions in submitting applications—prompted by Henry L. Hopkins' requirement that each \$100,000 advance one man a year's employment—had caused the work relief high command to consider canceling some of the allotments.

The public works housing division, threatened with a further reduction in its present \$100,000,000 program, meanwhile began continuing calling for bids on excavating and foundations for new projects. December 15 is the last deadline for beginning construction, while the collection plans will be provided in advance for five projects, two in Chicago and one each in Charleston, South Carolina, Omaha, and Dallas, Texas.

Demolition of buildings on the city of St. Louis element development at Cincinnati will be carried out by the work progress administration, while bids will be opened November 12 for construction of a project at Atlantic City. Purchases of sites for three new developments at Philadelphia, Oklahoma City and Miami, Florida, also was announced.

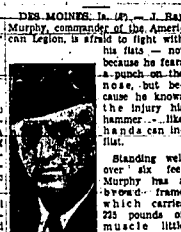
